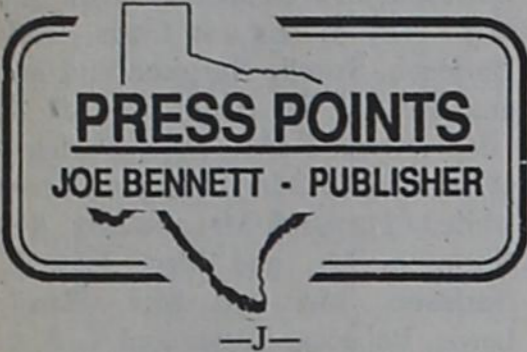

## Denman Stanfield Visits In Finland and Russia

We flew non-stop (8 hrs) from Kennedy Airport in New York, then to Brussels, Belgium, and on to Helsinki, Finland. After three days of sightseeing in Helsinki, we took a tour bus to Turku, Finland. We stopped enroute at a lovely hotel on a river for lunch. We then took a boat ride up and down the river to see the sights. In Turku we checked into a first class hotel which was to be our home for the next ten days while we participated in the World Veterans (Masters) Championships.

There were over 5,000 athletes from all over the world who participated in the different events, i.e., poll vault, discus, high jump, hurdles, shot put, javelin, steeple chase, distance running, etc. There were 458 participants from the U. S. There were 241 in my age group 70-75. All of the athletes participated in their own age bracket starting at age 40-45 in five year age segments through 95-100. There were 50 who participated in the 80-85 age and 5 age 90-95, and 2 age 95-100.

I was going to run the 5K(3.1 miles) but decided to take an overnight ship to Stockholm, Sweden. While in Stockholm we saw many old churches, cathedrals, etc. We also went through the Vasa Museum which consisted of a wooden ship that had sailed in 1628, and sank before it could get out of the harbor. The ship was retrieved in 1961 from the deep water. The tour guide explained that the amazing part of it was the wood and all the other items on the ship remained the same for all those years due to the water composition.

In Turku, I ran the 10 kilometers (6.1 miles) and my official time was fifty-eight minutes and four seconds. We ran 25 times around the track. We had a number on right hip and our times were counted by a computer as we passed it. A bell rang when we had one lap to go. I also ran a 10K11 (6.1 miles) Cross Country race in the country on a very hilly challenging course. My time was one hour, four minutes and twenty seconds.

From Turku, Finland, I, along with 47 other Americans, accompanied the Russian athletes on a Russian ship to Leningrad, Russia. We were in Leningrad for two days and were taken by tour bus all day long to see the interesting points in and around Leningrad. The tour bus took us to the hill where the Germans had all the big guns that destroyed Leningrad fifty years ago. We went through the Hermitage Museum with all of the original paintings. While in Leningrad I ran about 45 minutes three mornings in a very poor section of the city. I felt much safer there than when I ran in Central Park in New York a couple of years ago. One thing that caught my eye in Leningrad was the many women working in pairs sweeping the streets with homemade brooms made from branches of trees. This was only in Leningrad, Russia. In Helsinki and Stockholm the streets and even the sidewalks are kept clean with the latest machinery.

From Leningrad we went by train to Moscow. For three full days we went by tour bus to see all of the interesting sights in and around Moscow. Leningrad has a population of five million, where Moscow's population is nine million. One night we all went to a World Famous Circus. You have to see the acts the Russians perform to believe it. I was told that they start very young training to work in the circuses, and that they take a lot more chances than other nationalities. One night we took the subway back to our hotel, which was about 15 miles from downtown Moscow. I was amazed how clean the subways were at each stop.

All of our meals were eaten at the hotel where we were staying. There was always Vodka and usually champagne at the evening meal. We were in Moscow the same time as President Bush. We went through the Kremlin the day after Mr. and Mrs. Bush went through it. I was told we did not see everything that the Bushes saw. Well, I saw enough. Red square was very interesting with all of the government buildings, etc.

In Russia it is against the law to use dollars. One must go to the bank and exchange dollars for rubles. I never made it to the bank and bought some souvenirs on the black market by exchanging t-shirts and dollars.

The highlight of my trip to Russia was running in the U.S.S.R. Veterans Track and Field Championships on August 3 and 4th. I have been running for over 20 years and participating in races for about 15 years. I have won many trophies running at different distances. However, I won my first medals in Moscow. I won a gold medal in the 800 meter race, a silver medal in the 500 meter race, and a bronze medal in the 3.1 mile race. It was a great thrill. The opening and closing ceremonies were the same as in the Olympics.

The next World Veterans Championships will be held in Japan in 1992. I hope to attend.

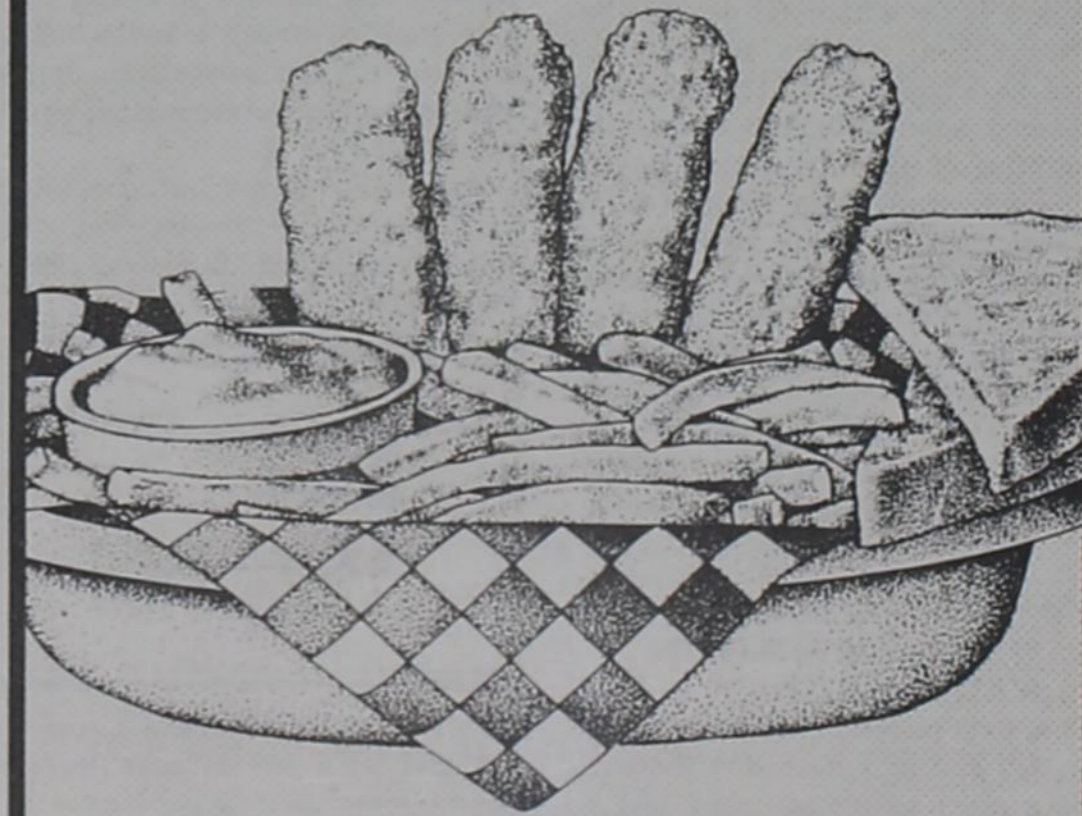
