Gorman and area churches will present the special music program for the services.

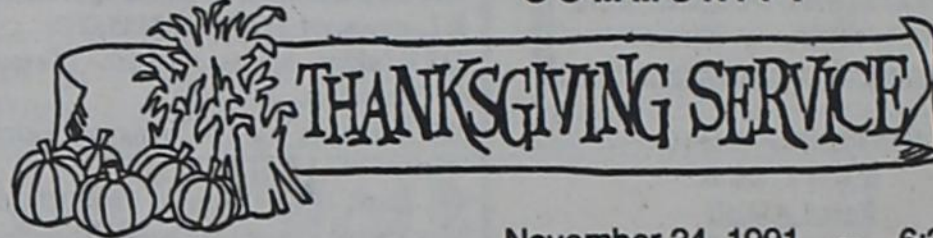
Rev. Clarence Wilson, pastor of Kokomo Baptist Church, will be guest speaker.

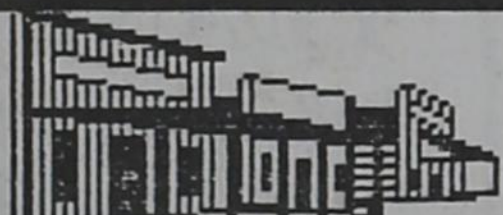

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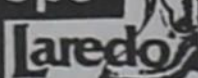

Farmers Advised To Report Loose Shelled Peanut Kernels

"Loose shelled kernels removed from peanuts before the peanuts are inspected by the Federal-State Inspection Service must be accounted for and reported to our office," David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Mr. Martin said some peanut producers may be cleaning their peanuts on the farm or at a cleaning plant to remove loose shelled kernels and foreign material, before the peanuts are inspected. Loose kernels removed from a lot of peanuts and retained on the farm, or left at the cleaning plant, or removed by a handler and retained for the service performed, are considered as marketings of quota peanuts and must be reported to ASCS.

Mr. Martin explained that loose shelled kernels may be marketed as additional peanuts, in which case they are not considered quota peanuts.

Both the producer and the handler are liable for any penalties that occur because the handler fails to record these marketings or if marketing the loose shelled kernels results in quota marketings greater than the effective poundage quota for the farm.




ASCS will spot check records of producers and handlers to determine whether loose shelled kernels removed from the farmer's stock peanuts before marketing were properly recorded.
