Gorman Teams Place 1-2 in De Leon Tourney; Host De Leon

The Gorman Panthers took top honors in the De Leon Tournament on December 17-18-19, while the Pantherettes placed second in their bracket. In action on Thursday night the

Pantherettes defeated the Lingleville girls by a 41 to 35 margin.

The Pantherettes jumped out to a 12-6 lead in the first period, then added 10 more for a 22 to 16 lead at halftime. They added 4 and 15 points respectfully in the third and fourth for the 41 to 35 victory.

Annette Love led the Pantherettes with 16 points. Laci Sharp hit 13. Kathy White had 8 and Jennifer Eaves got 4. Huston led Lingleville with 13.

In the boys bracket the Panthers enjoyed a 17 to 6 margin in the first period, then added 11 more in the second for a 28-16 margin at halftime. They put up 15 more in the third and 16 in the final period for the 59 to 45 win.

Henrik Bodlund led the Panthers with 20 points. Neely Carter hit 15. Jonray Childers got 8. Noah Landa had 6. Jade Warren hit 4, and Herrera and Chris Laminack had 3. Don Mauney got 1 point. Schultz led Lingleville with 20.

In Friday's action the Pantherettes edged Hico 34 to 33. The Pantherettes had a 7-3 advantage in the first period but fell behind and trailed 17 to 13 at halftime. But in the third the Pantherettes added 12 more and then got 9 in the final period for the win.

Laci Sharp led the Pantherettes with 15. Kathy White hit 9. Angela Treadway got 6, and Annette Love and Jennifer Eaves each had 2. Everett led Hico with 11.

In the boys action the Panthers trailed 14 to 10 in the first period, and got further behind in the second being outscored 13 to 11 for a 21-27 deficit at halftime. 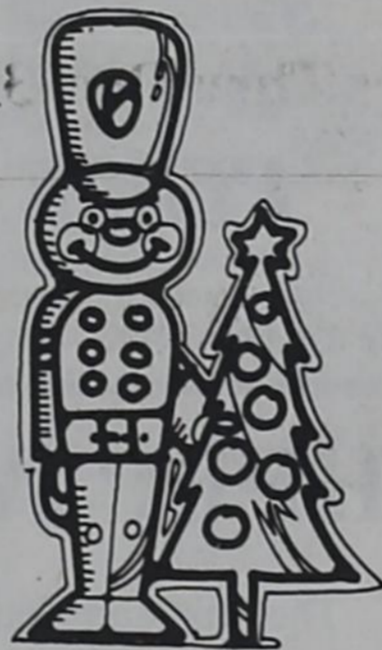

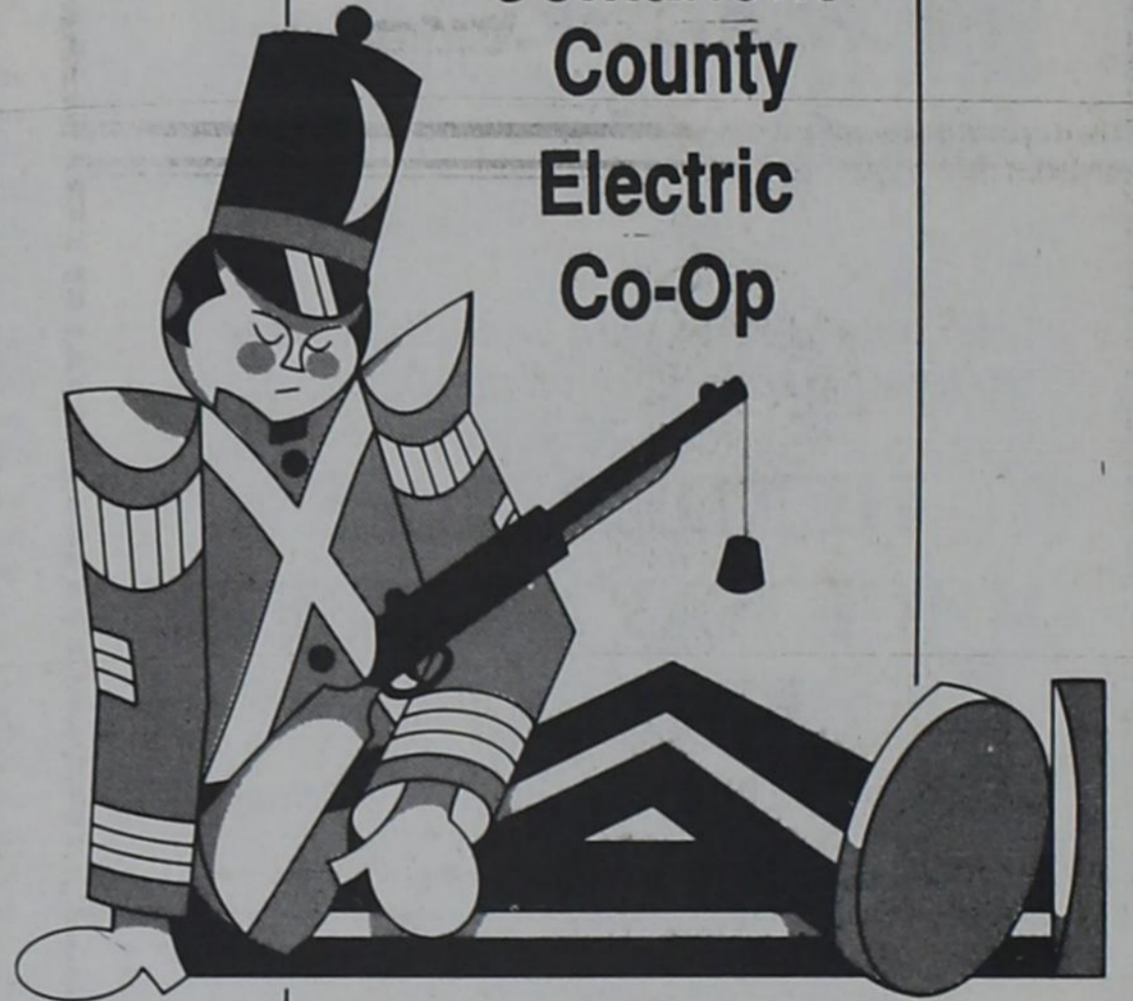

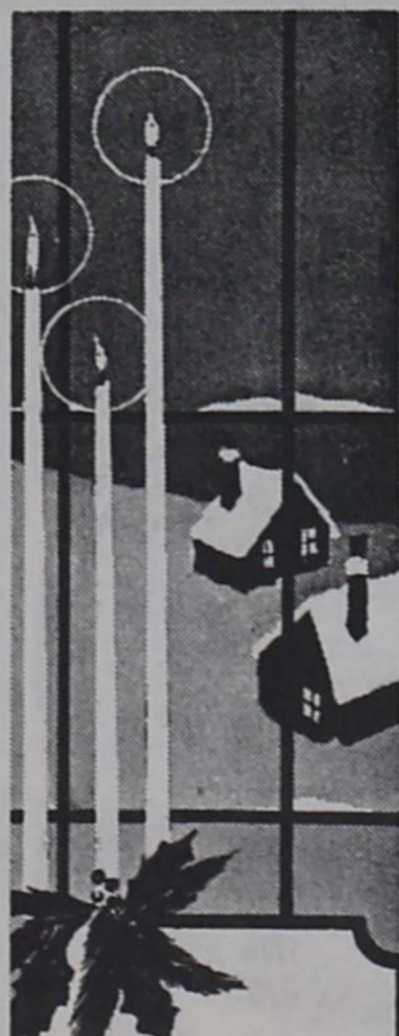

The Eastland County Sheriff's Office, with the full support of members of our county-wide judicial system, has begun development of a Teen Court program for young persons residing in Eastland County, aged 10-16 or currently enrolled in school. Cases involving traffic viola-

tions and misdemeanors such as minor in possession, shoplifting, truancy, vandalism and disorderly conduct will be brought before the Teen Court for sentencing by a jury of peers.

Teen Court is an alternative adjudication process which offers limitless

possibilities for both the youthful offenders and the community at large. In use throughout several cities and towns, and over a span of several years, it:

- * Offers a way for first time offenders to keep their record clean without taxing court costs or fines.

- * Has proven to keep young people out of trouble by improving self-esteem, developing motivation for self-improvement as well as a healthy attitude towards existing authority.

- * Is designed as a purely voluntary program - at any time throughout the process, the defendant reserves the right to return to the standard court.

- * Generates revenue for the county - both in lessening the juvenile caseload in an already overburdened court system and in the potential for thousands of dollars worth of community service hours rendered.

Volunteers for the Court are solicited primarily through schools in the county. Orientation and training sessions for the position of juror, bailiff, and attorney will be held for the youths by local judicial figures. However, as part of sentencing, offenders will be required to serve at least once on the jury panel and, historically, most continue to support the program by their participation.

HOW TEEN COURT WORKS

Juveniles reach the ECS Teen Court in a series of steps calculated to allow the youth a clear comprehension of the judicial process. This is done in order to challenge the youth to perform within the system as well as educating them as to their responsibilities as an individual and as a citizen of the community.

After receiving their citation, the youth is directed either to a municipal (city) judge or justice of the peace. When appearing before the appropriate court (with parent or guardian present), if the defendant pleads "guilty", he or she will be eligible for Teen Court, which is then explained as an option. Should the defendant plead "not guilty", the case is scheduled for trial.

Once a referral to Teen Court has been obtained from the judge, the Coordinator will meet with the youth and parent or guardian (who must attend both the interview and trial). A court date will be set at that time.

The youth will be assigned an attorney drawn from a pool of teen volunteers on the night of the trial. Potential jurors are also viewed by the defendant to assess prejudice or discrimination. All participants are given an oath of confidentiality.

When called to court, the youth will be sworn in by the acting judge (the only adult participant in the trial procedure) and the case proceeds. Upon completion of testimony and questioning of the defendant, the jury retires to deliberate. Guilt or innocence is not determined by the jury as a guilty plea has already been entered. Sentencing will consist of community service and jury duty on the Teen Court panel only. The young person is given a list of available community service projects to choose from and a time frame in which to complete the sentence is established.

Upon completion of the sentence, a written notification is supplied to the referring judge and the youth's case is dismissed.

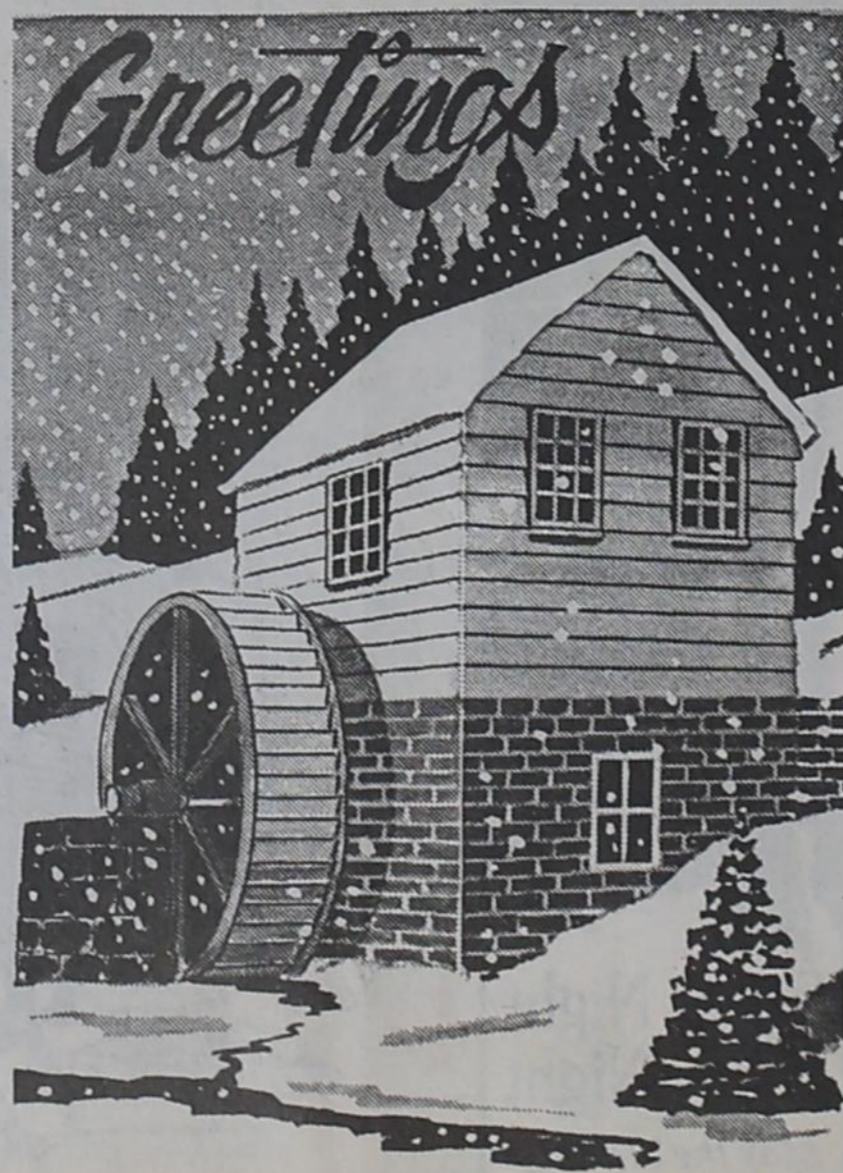

When you think of a person getting disability benefits from the government, what image comes to mind? You probably think of a person who has lost the ability to work as a result of a medical condition or injury. Although that is a possibility, it hardly paints a complete picture. For example, there are about 6 million people with a variety of physical and mental impairments who receive disability benefits from Social Security. About 3 million of them are getting Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits and more than 450,000 of current SSI beneficiaries are children with disabilities.

SSI, which is administered by Social Security, makes monthly payments to people with low incomes and limited assets who are 65 or older, or to people who have a disability, including children. Of course, most children don't have income and assets of their own, but we consider those of the parents for children under age 18 when deciding if they are eligible for SSI. The SSI payment rates vary on a number of factors and can get quite complicated so I suggest anyone with limited income and resources who has a child with a serious disability should contact our office.

A child is considered "disabled" for SSI purposes if he or she has an impairment that limits his or her ability to function and perform daily activities similar to those that healthy children in the same age range usually do.

Disability claims can take several months to process. But there are

special rules that allow us to make immediate payments to parents of children with severe disabilities.

There is also a possibility that children who were turned down for SSI in the past may now be eligible. If your child was turned down for SSI disability benefits between January 1980 and February 1990, or if your child's benefits were stopped for medical reasons, check with our office about having the claim reviewed again using the new rules.

You can apply for SSI for your child by calling our office at 698-1360 for an appointment. You can expedite the claims process if you have the child's Social Security number and birth certificate available when you apply. You also will need to provide records that show your income and assets. In addition, bring along the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all doctors, hospitals, clinics, and other specialists your child has visited.

Watch For Ice On Bridge Signs To Remain Up

In an effort to save taxpayer money and increase winter motorists safety, the Texas Department of Transportation will leave ice on bridge warning signs up throughout the winter months.

In the past, the department displayed the signs - which, when folded down, read "Watch for Ice on Bridge" - only when freezing weather was imminent, and folded them back up after the weather passed.

The new plan calls for the warnings to be displayed seven to 14 days before the first expected freeze in each county and remove them seven to 14 days after the last freeze.

Clyde Braddock, Eastland County maintenance supervisor, said that DxDOT crews displayed the signs in Eastland County on November 9th and they will fold them back up in late March. Braddock said this method will be much more efficient since it eliminates the cost of time and money for TxDOT personnel to travel to and from the 102 sign locations in the county at irregular intervals throughout the winter.

Brownwood District Engineer Wes Heald said leaving the signs on diapsly allows department employees to concentrate on maintaining roadway safety and protecting the road's surface.

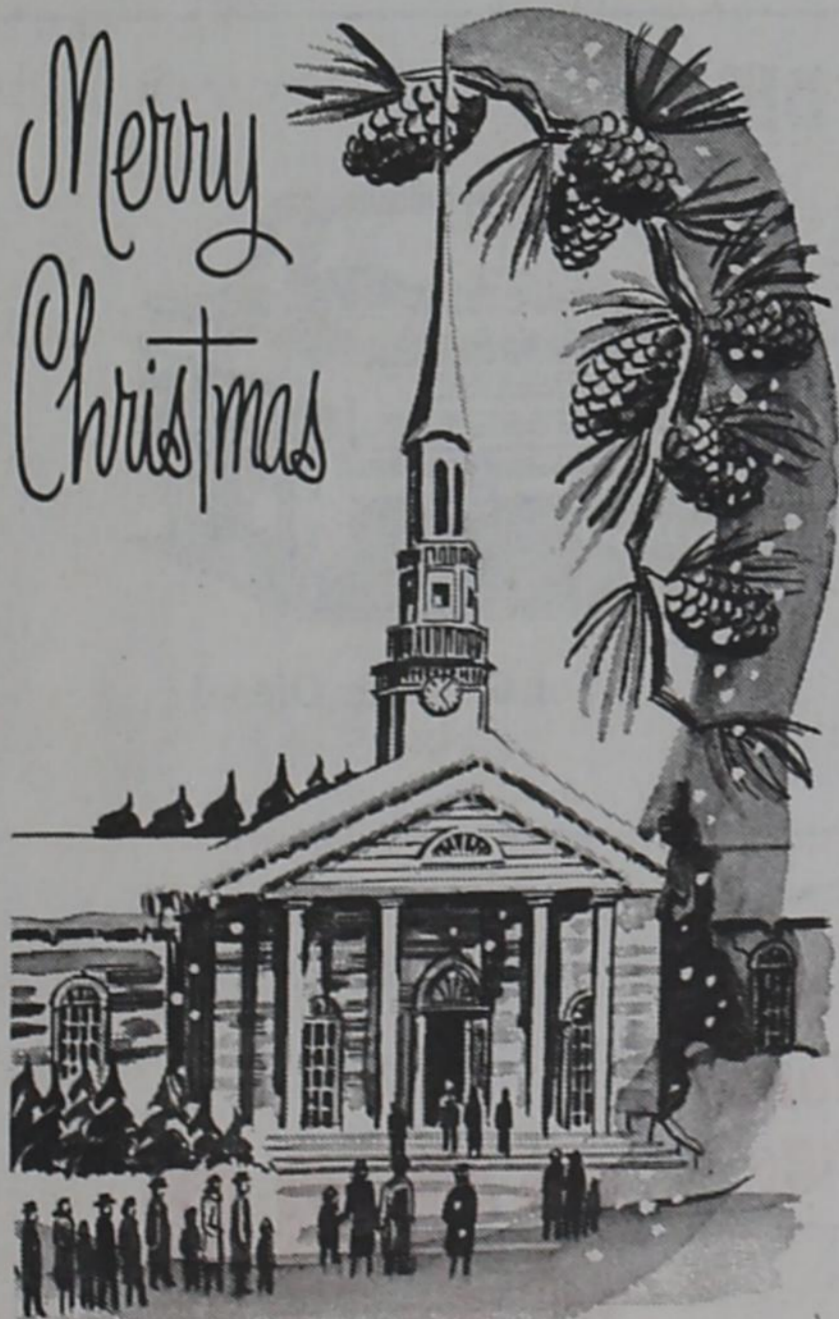

across the state with celebrities making appearances throughout the evening.

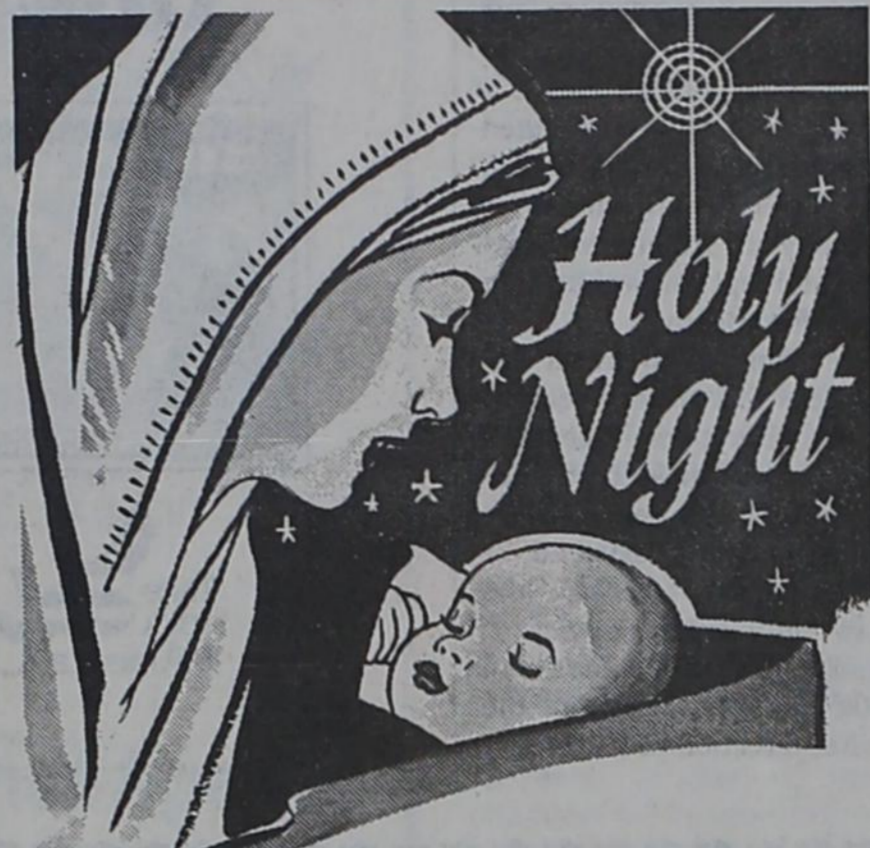

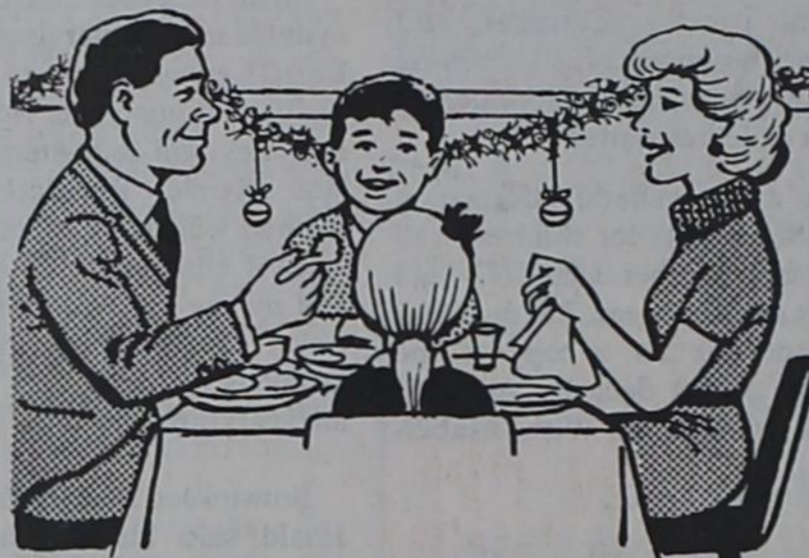

Cong. Stenholm Receives Golden Plow Award

Gramm Warns Of DWI Tragedy On Eve of 1993

Alcohol-related driving deaths have declined steadily since 1982, according to U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who called for Texans to take special care on the highways during the holiday season.

"According to a Nationwide study by the Center for Disease Control, drunk driving fatalities are declining -- and that's great news," Gramm said.

"But with the approach of New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, the two days each year which generate more drunk-driving deaths and injuries than any others, the time has come to take special care," he said.

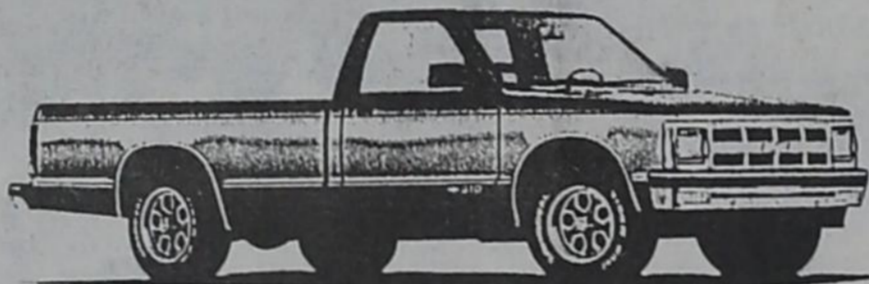
Gramm and police officers from across Texas and Mothers Against Drunk Driving this year are repeating the successful public education campaign against drunk driving that they have staged annually.

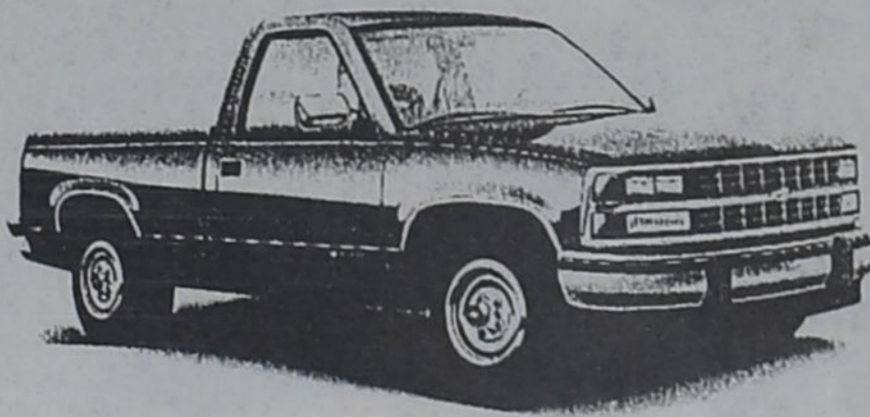

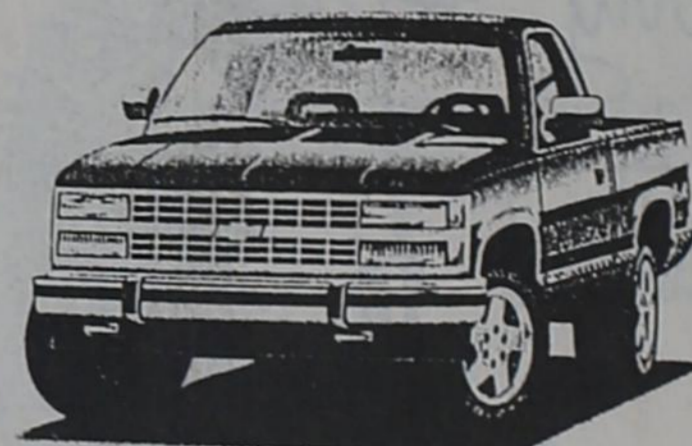

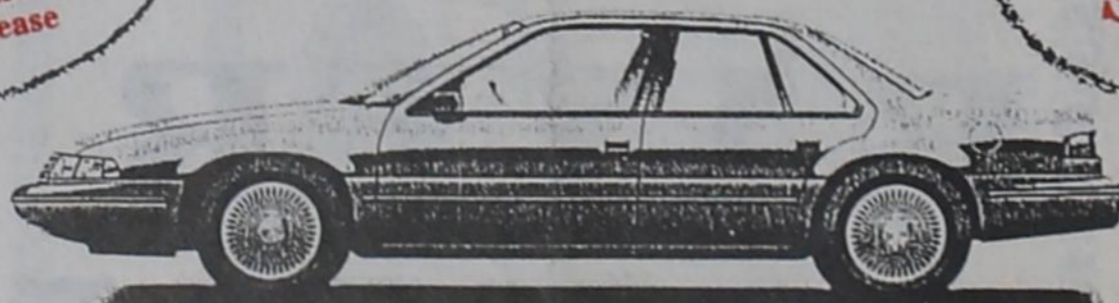
