

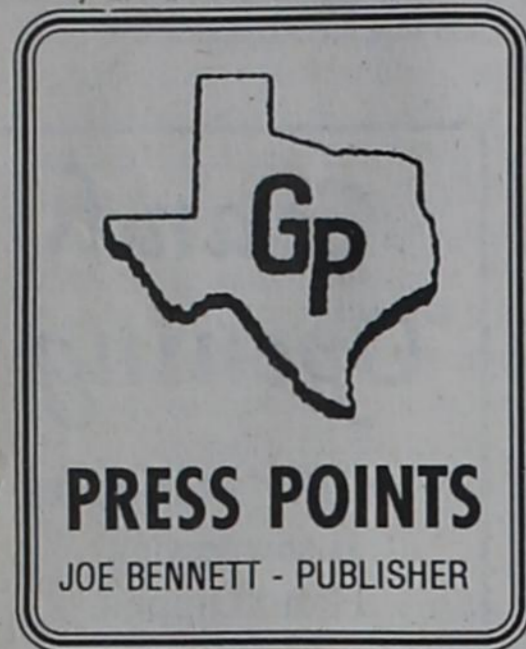

USDA Announces Price Support Level For Peanuts

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the average price support levels by type, quality and location for the 1996 peanut crop. The figures are based on national price support levels of \$610.00 per short ton for quota peanuts and \$132.00 per short ton for additional peanuts.

The quota support level by type for an average grade ton of 1996-crop peanuts will be:

- \$604.78 for Virginia -type peanuts
- \$614 for Runner - type peanuts
- \$565.56 for Spanish-type peanuts
- \$604.78 for Valencia-type peanuts from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting, and,
- \$565.56 for other Valencias.

The method of computing the price support levels for 1996-crop peanuts and the grades within the types is the same as last year.

For each percent of sound mature kernels in a ton, including sound split kernels, the support level will be:

- Virginia-type peanuts \$8,797;
- Runner-type peanuts, \$8,624;
- Spanish-type peanuts, \$8,581;
- Vaencia-type peanuts in the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$9,140;
- Other Valencias, \$8,581.

The loan value for additional peanuts is 21.64 percent of the applicable quota support level. The factor represents the ratio of the \$132.00 per short ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$610.00 per short ton national support level for quota peanuts.

The deductions and discount schedules that were applicable to the 1995 crop peanuts will be used for the 1996 crop, except for transfers of the Segregation 2 and Segregation 3 additional peanuts to quota loan status, which will now be supported at 70 percent of the quota support rate, as required by new legislation.

The actual price support level for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of the kernels in each ton of peanuts and other factors.

New Law Affects SS Benefits For Stepchildren

Beginning July 1, 1996 a stepchild can receive SS benefits on a stepparent's earnings record only if hte child depends on the stepparent for at least one-half of his or her financial support. This dependency requirement is the result of a laaw enacted on March 29.

The new law also requires that the stepchild's benefits end if the stepparents becomes divorced from the child's parent after June 10, 1996. The child's benefits terminate in the month following the month the divorce becomes final.

The divorce must be reported to Social Security as son as it becomes final. Each year the SS Administrator will notify the stepparents who have a child (or children) receiving benefits on their record to remind them that benefits will be terminated in case of divorce:

If you need to report your divorce, call or visit any Social Security office, or call the toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on business days, the lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so it's best to call at other times.

Special efforts are being made to arrange for hay buyers and users to be present at the meeting. This may be an excellent marketing opportunity for hay producers.

Farm Credit Reports First Quarter Results

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) and the 64 federal Land Bank and Production Credit Associations in the Tenth Farm Credit District today reported combined net income of \$27.6 million for the first three months of 1996, compared with net income of \$19.6 million for hte same period a year ago.

Contributing to the improved income for the first quarter were a \$3.7 million increase in total interest income, a \$3.4 million decrease in total interest expense and a \$3.0 million increase in gains on other property owned.

During the quarter there was an increase in loan loss provisions in response to low cattle prices, widespread drought conditins, and the possible adverse effects the recently passed Farm Bill may have on farm income.

Loan volume at March 31, 1996, was \$3.76 billion, down less than one percent from year-end 1995 but an increase of \$164 million from the same period a year ago. While production lending experienced a \$57.1 million decrease in volume in the first quarter due to seasonal payment patterns inherent in agricultural operating loans, mortgage lending posted a \$44.9 million increase from year end, its strongest quarterly increase in recent years.

During the first quarter, total high-risk loans declined by \$3.0 million and nonaccrual loans were reduced by \$5.3 million. However, accruing loans more than 90 dyas of past due and formally restructured loans both increased, by \$1.4 and \$9 million respectively during the quarter, reflecting the negative effects on borrowers of record low cattle prices and drought conditions.

"While we are monitoring the cattle and drought conditions closely, the district as well positioned to weather these adversities," said bank CEO Arnold R. Henson. "We are strongly capitalized and have the ability to provide for potential loan losses. This isn't the first time agriculture has faced tough times, and it won't be the last. As we have in the past, we intend to do everything we can to help our borrowers through this period."

Nationwide, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$354 million for the quarter ended March 31, 1996, as compared with combined net income of \$294 million for the same period last year.
