



ORDINANCE NO. 1999-01

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS; DEFINING TERMS; CREATING OFFENSES FOR MINORS, PARENTS, AND GUARDIANS OF MINORS, AND BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT BY THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, PROVIDING FOR WAIVER BY THE MUNICIPAL COURT OF JURISDICTION OVER A MINOR WHEN REQUIRED UNDER THE TEXAS FAMILY CODE; PROVIDING FOR REVIEW OF THIS ORDINANCE TWELVE MONTHS AFTER THE DATE OF INITIAL ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE: PROVIDING N EFFECTIVE DATE; PROVIDING AN OPEN MEETING CLAUSE; WAIVING THE RULE REQUIR-ING THE READING OF ORDINANCES ON TWO (2) SEPARATE DAYS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, The City Commission has determined that there has been an increase in juvenile mischief by and against persons under the age of 17 in the City of Gorman.

WHEREAS, persons under the age of 17 are particularly susceptible by their lack of maturity and experience to participation in unlawful and mischievous activity or are likely to be victims of crime committed by adults or other youths;

WHEREAS, the City of Gorman desires to provide for the protection of minors from each other and from other persons, to promote parental control over and responsibly for children, in order to protect the general public, and reduce the incidence of juvenile criminal activities; and

WHEREAS, a curfew for those under the age of 17 is in the interest of the public health, safety, and general welfare and will help to attain the foregoing objectives and to diminish the undesirable impact of such conduct on the citizens of the City of Gorman.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, THAT:

Part 1: The following curfew requirements for minors are hereby adopted:

CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS

(a) Definitions: In this ordinance, the words and phrases listed below have the meanings provided herein:

(1) CURFEW HOURS means:

12:00 a.m. Monday thru Friday 12:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday

(2) EMERGENCY means an unforeseen combination of circumstances or the resulting state that calls for immediate action. The term includes, but is not limited to, a fire, a natural disaster, an automobile accident, or any situation requiring immediate action to prevent

(3) ESTABLISHMENT means any privately owned place of business operated for a profit to which the public is invited, including by not limited to any place of amusement or entertainment.

(4) GUARDIAN means:

serious bodily injury or loss of life.

(A) a person who, under court order, is the guardian of the person of a minor, or

(B) a public or private agency with whom a minor has been placed by court.

(5) MINOR means any person under 17 years of age. (6) OPERATOR means any individual, firm, association, partnership, or corporation operating, managing, or conducting any establishment. The term includes the members or partners of, an association or partnership and the officers of a corporation.

(7) PARENT means a person who is:

(A) a natural parent, adoptive parent, or step-parent of another person; or

(B) at least 18 years of age and authorized by a parent or guardian to have the care and custody of a minor.

(8) PUBLIC PLACE means any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment houses, office buildings, and shops. (9) REMAIN means to:

(A) linger or stay; or

(B) fail to leave premises when requested to do so by a police officer or the owner, operator, or other person in control of the

(10) SERIOUS BODILY INJURY means bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death, serious permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the functions of any bodily member or organ.

b. Offenses. (1) A minor commits an offense if he or she remains in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city curfew

(2) A parent or guardian of a minor commits an offense if he or she knowingly permits, or by insufficient control allows, the minor to remain in nay public place or on the premises of the establishment during curfew hours.

(3) The owner, operator, or any employee of an establishment commits an offense if he or she knowingly allows a minor to remain

upon the premises of the establishment during curfew hours. c. Defenses.

(1) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (b) that the minor was:

(A) accompanied by the minor's parent or guardian;

(B) on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian, without any detour or stop;

(C) in a motor vehicle involved in interstate or intrastate travel;

(D) engaged in an employment activity, or going to or returning home from an employment activity, without any detour or stop;

(E) involved in an emergency:

(F) on the sidewalk abutting the minor's residence or abutting the residence of the next door neighbor if the neighbor did not

complain to the police department about the minor's presence; (G) attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Gorman Higginbotham Funeral Home in Gor-

a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor, or going to or returning home from, without any detour or stop, an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the City of Gorman, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor,

(H) exercising first amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right to assembly; or

(I) married or had been married or had disabilities of minority removed in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code. (J) a student in a private or parochial school, including a home school, or any other student, who is exempt from the compulsory attendance requirement under section 21.033 of the Texas Education Code.

(2) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (b) (3) that the owner, operator, or employee of an establishment promptly notified the police department that a minor was present on the premises of that establishment during the curfew hours and refused to leave.

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that an offense has occurred and that based, on any response and other circumstances, no defenses in Subsection (c) is present. In assessing punishment for either a minor or a parent, the Municipal Court Judge may consider a community service.

(1) A person who violates a provision of this ordinance is guilty of a separate offense for each day or part of day during which the violation is committed, continued, or permitted. Each offense, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine of not more than \$500.

(2) When required by Section 51.08 of the Texas Family Code, the municipal court shall waive original jurisdiction over a minor who violates Subsection (b) (1) of this section and shall refer the minor to juvenile court.

Part 2: The declarations, determinations, and findings declared, made and found in the preamble of this ordinance are hereby adopted, restated and made a part of the operative provisions hereof.

Part 3: If any provision of this ordinance or the application of any provision to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provision of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Part 4: This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Gorman, Texas, and it is accordingly so ordained.

Part 5: That twenty-four months after the effective date of this Ordinance, this Ordinance shall expire and be of no further force and effect. That twelve months after the effective date of this Ordinance, the Chief of Police shall review this ordinance and make a report of his or her recommendations to the City Commission concerning the effectiveness of and the continuing need for, a curfew ordinance. Part 6: It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed was open to the public as

required and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act. Part 7: That the requirements imposed by the Charter of the City of Gorman that this ordinance be read on two (2) separate days shall be waived by the affirmative vote of four (4) members of the City Commission to pass this ordinance through more than one reading on a single vote.

Part 8: That an emergency is apparent and is hereby declared to exist for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety, and general welfare, which emergency requires that this ordinance become effective immediately upon its passage.



On a suggestion from my dear friend Estelle Craddock, I asked my friends at Heritage Manor what they remembered about hats when they were kids.

Hats, caps, bonnets (split & regular starched), berets, toboggans, straw hats, "towns," we talked about them all. Even some "old wives time, it'll make you go bald.

I also learned that Hope Joiner makes (by hand) bonnets and gloves for my friends.

Most mothers wore bonnets. Fathers wore felt hats in winter and straw in summer. Most but not all. Jack Bellows' dad always wore (summer or winter, rain or shine) a black, felt, John B. Stetson, with a narrower brim than a cowboy hat. It had a single crease in the top and a black silk band, no feather.

Ladies hats, especially the big straw ones, were held in place with either a large hat pin, or tied under the chin with the scarf like strap.

S.D. Gilmore remembered wearing a leather, short billed cap in the wintertime. The type that had ear flaps that would fold up and tie on top of the head. It was lined with sheepskin.

Almost everybody wore a head covering of some type, even little kids wore crocheted hats. A lot of hats back then were home made. Even the short billed caps with the button in the middle of the top.

One type, a "town," my friends had trouble describing. I understand it to be similar to a flat, straw beret, worn on the side of the head. I can't visualize this. Can you add anything to the description? 'til next time, Brother Bob

AN AGENDA FOR TEXAS

ith the impeachment trial going on in Washington, Texans were right to wonder if their representatives in Washington will be able to address other matters. Both Congress and the President have agreed that we must. With Texans at the doorstep of the next millennium, I have developed an agenda that expands economic opportunity and security, provides innovative ideas for excellence in education and addresses fundamental aspects of our national security.

One of my priorities is to eliminate the marriage tax penalty, one of the most unfair elements of the federal tax code. Some 21 million American couples pay an average of \$1,400 more in taxes, simply because they are married, than they would if they were two individuals filing as singles. I want to stop forcing people to choose between love and money. The first bill I introduced in the 106th Congress, on January 19, would eliminate this inequity.

We need more tax relief, too, and none more so than in the oil patch. The jobs of hundreds of thousands of Texans who make their living there are in jeopardy as oil prices have fallen to the lowest level in decades. At a time when we're importing more than half our oil, we're in danger of exporting thousands of jobs overseas. I have introduced legislation that would offer tax incentives to those who are willing to re-open abandoned wells or maintain marginal wells, those that produce 15 or fewer barrels a day. This will help a beleaguered industry, keep jobs in America and increase our own national security by reducing our dependence on foreign energy.

We also need pension reform, especially for women, who live seven to eight years longer than men and have to make their retirement savings last longer. Fewer than a quarter of women of retirement age receive pensions, and the value of their pension benefits is on average about half that of men.

Our tax system encourages employer-provided pensions, with the worthy objective of spurring the private sector to supplement Social Security income. Unfortunately, current law penalizes women who drop dut of the labor market to have children or who change jobs frequently.

I will offer legislation to encourage personal and portable pensions that travel with people in and out of the labor market, without discriminating against those who switch jobs frequently, work part-time, or interrupt their careers to raise children.


We must also look for innovative ways to maintain the quality of our public schools. I have introduced comprehensive K-12 education reform in a bill I call the "Options for Excellence in Education Act of 1999." Its most important element is the establishment of Student, School and Teacher Excellence Grants, to encourage states and public school districts to be creative. In addition, this bill would make it easier for retired professionals with career experience in fields where there are teacher shortages to enter the

My bill will untangle a web of federal program regulations and requirements that cost billions in compliance, taking away scarce dollars from

Finally, while I support a defense system against ballistic missiles and other modern weapons systems, our first defense priority must be to recruit and retain the finest young people in our armed forces. This means honoring our promise of health care coverage for them and their families. We have tales," like: If you wear a hat all the reduced the facilities available to them with the downsizing of our military. This affects both the active duty force, in which there are more service members with families than ever before, and retired military personnel who are living longer. Our military health care system can no longer accommodate all those eligible to use it.

I have introduced an amendment to a Senate military pay raise bill that would raise reimbursement levels for Tricare, the military health-care delivery system, to attract and retain more participating doctors to the program. It also will expedite and reduce the costs of Tricare claims processing, which has been a thorn in the side of both beneficiaries and providers. It will require portability of benefits between regions, making it easier for military personnel to get their health-care needs met as they move from one duty station to

Economic growth and opportunity, options for educational excellence, a strong national defense that honors the commitments we've made to our troops: This is the agenda of the people of Texas, and one that I plan to carry in the United States Senate.
