
Spirit Socks

Panthers Outrun Rattlers 35-10; Host Santo Wildcats Friday



The Gorman Panthers travelled to Tolar on Friday night to take on the Rattlers and came away with a 35-10 victory. The Panthers held a 14-7 margin in the first quarter. The halftime margin was 21-10. Then the Big Red defense held the Rattlers scoreless in the last half, while the offense added 7 in the third and 7 in the final period for a 35-10 victory.

The Panthers took the opening kickoff but fumbled on the first play. The Rattlers defense grabbed the fumble on their own 49 and Zane Bishop returned the bobble for a score with 11:38 on the clock. Caleb Williams added the point after and Gorman was behind 7-0.

But the Panthers came right back and took the ball on their own 36 and scored in 8 plays with Matt Underwood running for the score from 7 yards out with 7:37 left in the first. Swanner booted the point after and the score was knotted at 7-7. The drive featured runs of 4 and 13 by Underwood and 6 and 18 by Tyson Swanner and a 18 yard pass to Keifer Wilson.


The Big Red defense held the Rattlers on their next possession and intercepted a pass on the Rattler 47. From there they scored in 4 plays with Swanner getting the final 2 yards with 3:17 left in the half. Swanner added the point after and Gorman led 14-7. The drive featured an 18 yard run by Swanner and runs of 3 and 3 by Underwood. The drive was helped by a 15 yard penalty on Tolar.

The Rattlers came back with a field goal by Williams of 15 yards and the score was 14-10.

Then just before halftime the Panthers added another score when they got the ball on an interception at the Rattler 10. After an incomplete pass and a 6 yard run by Underwood, Swanner ran it in from 4 yards out with just 42 seconds left in the half. Swanner added the point after and Gorman enjoyed a 21-10 mar-

Underwood led the Panthers with 126 yards on 22 carries and Swanner got 122 on 18.

Texas Star Gardeners Tour Clark Gardens

The Texas Star Gardeners toured the Clark Gardens Botanical Park in Mineral Wells recently. These gardens are open daily year-round and offer glorious displays for the visitor. What began as a small private garden in 1972 is now a 35 acre scientific and educational facility that opened to the public in the year 2000. More than 50 different gardens of native Texas and Texas adaptable plants embrace waterfalls, lakes, ponds and winding pathways. The park has been selected as an All american Rose Selections Test Garden, one of only 26 such gardens in the United States. The group also toured the rose facility that that is an official test site in the National EarthKind® Rose Trials. Created by Texas A&M University Extension Specialists, the purpose of this innovative environmental research project is to identify roses that deliver superior landscape performance with minimal care and provide maximum protection for the environment. These trials at Clark Gardens are in partnership with the Parker County Cooperative Extension Office and Parker County Master Gardeners.
