Spring Lawn Maintenance
Mid March is the perfect time to get your lawn in
With the warm temps and rain you may have noticed shape. With the warm temps and rain you may have noticed some green up in your yard. Most of the green up however could be broad leaf weeds. If you see dandelions, chickweed
and others, an application of Ortho Weed Be Gone Max will help. As always follow recommended rates found on the la

In late March to early April scalp Bermuda asess Augustine, and Zoysia lawns. NOTE: Make sure you are past the las freeze date before scalping. (Our average last froo
is March 17th.) Once the lavn has been scalped, then sta mowing the lawn at the recommended height as soon as the grass starts actively growing. Note, you will have to remove
all the clippings when scalping. Do not send this material to the dump ground. Either compost this yard waste in your ow compost pile or send it to another site that has a composting facility. In the spring, mow bermuda grass lawns at 1.0 to 1.5
inches, St. Ausustine grass lawns at 2.0 to 25 inches and Zoyinches, St. Augustine grass lawns at 2.0 to 2.5 inches and Zoy-
sia grass lawns at 1.0 to 1.5 inches. If you can only mow once per week, raise the cutting heights slighty. It is important to mow the lawn often enough so that you never remove more than 30 to $40 \%$ of the leaf blade.
A good rule of thumb....... is to fertilize grass after you
have mowed your grass twice. Fertilize St. Augustine and ber have mowed your grass twice. Fertilize St. Augustine and Ber-
muda lawns in mid to late April based on soil analysis or with muda lawns in mid to late April based on soil analysis or with
a $3-1-2$ ratio fertilizer at a rate of 1.0 pound of actual nitrogen a $3-1-2$ ratio fertuizer at a rate of 1.0 pound of actual nitrogen
per 1,000 square feet (using a slow release source of nitrogen). per 1000 square feer (using a slow release source of nitrogen).
This would be equivalent to 5 pounds of a $21-7-14$ or 7 pounds of 15---10 per 1,000 square feet. Water the lawn thoroughly
after applying the eertilizer. If iron chlorosis is a problem; apply iron sulfate, iron chelate or liquid iron. NOTE: Iron will stain surfaces such as wood, concrete, metal, etct. Always fol
low label directions no matter which source of iron is used. low label directions no matter which source of iron is used.
Treat lawns with a bait for control of fire ants. If mounds
are present in the lawn, treat the mounds with an insecticide

## A Word for Lay Christians By Wesley J. Wildman, Stephen Chapin Garner

Your pastoral leaders and your churches would be lost
without you. Without you there is no community. Without you "Jesus" is an empty word rattling about in the corridors of his-
tory. Without you the church is a lifeless shell. The measure of the tory. Without you the church is a lifeless shell. The measure of the
church's success is directly related to how you, the lay members church's success is directly related to how you, the lay members
of your community, love one another and live out your faith in
your daily lives. Remember that Jesus' call was not to a bunch of your daily lives. Remember that Jesus call was not to a bunch of
ordained clergy. Jesus called fishermen, businessmen, hated tax
collectors, feared soldiers, mothers, widows, prostitutes, the able collectors, feared soldiers, mothers, widows, prostitutes, the able-
bodied, the infirm, people with faith, and people without faith. Jesus' call was for everyone to follow him. You have as much right
to follow Jesus as anyone else. Your pastor, your church council to follow Jesus as anyone else. Your pastor, your church council,
your bishop, your church boards do not have a higher claim on your bishop, your church boards do not have a higher claim on
Jesus than you do. So take your role in the church and in the world Jesus than you
very seriously.
very seriously.
What does that involve? Love, tend to, and work to strengthen your pastor, your church, and your church leadership. Help your community to keep its focus. When you sense that
something is amiss, speak up and make your case lovingly. Too something is amiss, speak up and make your case lovingly. Too
often when the going gets tough, lay people get going and hightail
it right out of church. Church is messy, come it right out of church. Church is messy, community is messy, and
life is messy. You can't get in the habit of running from it because life is messy. You can't get in the habit of running from it because
the mess will follow you until you deal with it the mess will follow you until you deal with it. Remember, the
church is yours and you are the church. Stick with the body of church is yours and you are the church. Stick with the body of
Christ in sickness and in health, in plenty and in want, in joy and Christ in sickness and in health, in plenty and in want, in joy and
in sorrow as long as you live. This calling to faithful unity and participation can be
challenging for liberal-evangelical Christians because we are not always easily identified or categorized. We can become frustrated in church because we don't feel we fit. We are not always sure
where to find our place. We do feel lost at times, and it is hard to where to find our place. We do feel lost at times, and it is hard to
believe that any of our well-dressed, well-pressed, and well-spobelieve that any of our well-dressed, well-pressed, and well-spo-
ken neighbors in the pew next to us are as confused as we are. But ken neighbors in the pew next to us are as confused as we are. But
in fact many of us feel lost in the middle. Most of us are uncertain in fact many of us feel lost in the middle. Most of us are uncertain
about our faith, at least some of the time. We are all searching for
something we have yet to find. We try to follow Jesus, we try to something we have yet to find. We try to follow Jesus, we try to
love God, we try to love our neighbors, and we fail much of the love God, we try to love our neighbors, and we fail much of the
time. But that is not a reason to quit. We are aware that we are lost
in this life, and we engage in Christian community in the hope of in this life, and we engage in Christian community in the hope of
being found.
The first great test of the liberal-evangelical church, and
of your moderate antid radical Christian faith, occurs when you of your moderate antid radical Christian faith, occeirs when you
face conflict and difference in your commnity. Can you sit next face conflict and difference in your community. Can you sit next
to someone who will vote oppositely to you on the question of to someone who will vote oppositely to you on the question of
gay marriage and still move forward together to celebrate Comgay marriage and still move forward together to celebrate Com-
munion? Can you participate in a Bible study or a faith discussion group and genuinely strive to understand in depth the person who has a different view of salvation through Christ than you do? It is
so easy to shut down in the face of such disagreements. But that so easy to shut down in the face of such disagreements. But that
is when you and the church both lose. Church can't be only about comfort and agreement, and that is doubly so for the liberal-evangelical church, with its Christ-centered commitment to radical in-
clusiveness and the principle of agape love Divine love shines clusiveness and the principle of agape love. Divine love shines
when you stay connected, especially when it feels like a major effort to do so. Strive for the spiritual maturity to place love ahea of personal comfort and your church's witness will flourish. The second great test is whether you will commit your-
self to the practices that build up the church and your faith. In self to the practices that build up the church and your fath. In
particular, will you look for educational opportunities within your particular, will you look for educational opportunities within your congregation and strive to deepen your understanding of your faith? Will you encourage your church to centralize practices such
as the Eucharist that bind differently minded people together in as the Eucharist that bind differently minded people together in
the name of Christ? It takes work to learn, and it is often uncomthe name of Christ? It takes work to learn, and it is often uncom-
fortable to have our existing beliefs broadened and to make new discoveries. But commintting to the journey of learming is spart of
discipleship and it can be incredibly exciting if you stick with it, discipleship and it can be incredibly exciting if you stick with it.
If we have a dream for liberal and evangelical laity, it would be for you to know that you are not alone, There are countless people of faith who struggle just like you do, who are filled
with longing just like you are, and who desire a Christ-centered with longing just like you are, and who desire a Christ-centered
and radically inclusive community just like you do. The more you and radically inclusive community just like you do. The more yoar
speak your faith, share your vision for your church, and take leading roles within your community, the more room you will make
for people who find themselves lost. You don't have to remain lost in the middle. You can be found in the middle, too, and learn to feel at home.
