## Defense attorney says Carpenter's confession illegal

The attorney for capital murder suspect Joseph Doyle Carpenter is attempting to get crucial state's evidence ruled inadmissible.

Daniel W. Hurley, Carpenter's court-appointed attorney, filed a motion in October to suppress a partial confession his client gave to Muleshoe police.

Hurley claims Muleshoe police violated his client's constitutional rights.

A pre-trial hearing was held last month in the 287th District Court to determine its admissibility

No ruling was made on the motion during the two-day hearing, which ended with District Judge Jack Young ordering a recess of up to 60 days, accord-

ing to court documents.

Young issued a gag order shortly after Carpenter was ar-

Carpenter is accused of the April 13, 1997 beating death of his next door neighbor, 20year-old Faviola Mendoza.


The 35-year-old Muleshoe man has been free on a \$100,000 bond since June while awaiting trial.

Carpenter's attorney argued in court documents the confession his client allegedly gave police was gained illegally and cannot be used against his cli-

Muleshoe police contend that Carpenter admitted having sex with the victim and striking her with a stick, according to court documents.

### Cattlemen get boost from ag secretary

WASHINGTON — Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman this week announced that USDA will purchase up to \$30 million of beef products to help improve prices for cattle producers and the livestock industry.

The additional beef purchases will be distributed to recipients in federal food assistance programs through food banks and other charitable institutions.

'Right now, producers are operating below break-even levels," said Glickman. "Even though USDA has already purchased \$141 mil-

lion of beef for the 1997-98 school lunch program, it's in the best interest of everyone to maintain a viable livestock industry. These additional beef purchases will help offset a surplus supply of fed cattle which is depressing prices to ranchers, farmers, and feedlot operators."

In addition to the beef purchase, Glickman also announced two other measures to support the industry

First, USDA will add meat to several existing export credit guarantee programs, such as Brazil, the Phillippines, and Thailand, and will work

to include meat in any new programs that may be announced. Through March 15, more than \$160 million in sales have been made using USDA's export credit guarantee programs. In addition, USDA will also send a trade team to Asia to promote the movement of additional quantities of U.S. meat and other agricultural

"Maintaining and expanding export markets is critically important for American farmers



### **Combest holds meeting** on electricity deregulation

WASHINGTON D.C.— U.S. Congressman Larry Combest held a hearing this week to discuss the possible effects of electric industry deregulation on rural areas and discuss ways to protect these

communities from its ill effects. "Since electricity is something that is very basic to everyday life and is also very essential to doing business in agriculture, I believe that it is vital that we examine changes in the structure of this industry very closely," said Combest, chairman of the House agriculture subcommittee on forestry. resource conservation, and re-

"It is incumbent upon us to discuss any ideas for how rural areas may need to be treated under a deregulated scenario and what it would take for this situation to not have a negative impact on these areas," Combest said.

"Changes as to how the electric utility industry is regulated - either at the state or federal level - must yield real benefits to residential and small business customers. Americans in small towns and on the farm deserve proof positive that any

#### Police: fake money not funny

HOBBS — A high school student's project on phony money turned a little too real.

The 18-year-old Hobbs High School government student created fake \$1s, \$5s, \$10s and \$20s by scanning real money into her home computer, then making a printout of the currency on regular-grade paper. It was part of a project on counterfeiting.

She mounted her bills next to real money on a poster board and challenged other students to tell the difference, police said. They said she also handed out sample bills to her classmates.

Police said three high school boys have been questioned about the bills. In addition, Hobbs police alerted the Secret Service that beginning Friday, six fake bills were passed at local businesses — including one owned by the police chief's wife and brother-in-law.

While lighter in color and somewhat blurred, the fake money locked in the police department's evidence room has the general texture of crumpled cash and is comparable to authentic currency, except for duplicate serial numbers on each bill.

and ranchers," Glickman said, "and we will continue to aggressively explore opportunities to use all of the tools at our disposal to promote U.S. agricultural exports around the world."

Glickman also announced several actions that USDA will take to address concerns about concentration and fair trade practices in the livestock and poultry industries. First, Glickman outlined a plan to strengthen the ability of USDA's Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration (GIPSA) to ensure fair competition in the market-place.

"USDA is committed to protecting farmers and ranchers from unfair trade practices," Glickman said, "and this new plan will enhance our ability to conduct investigations and combat unfair or anti-competitive practices in the marketplace. But to get the job done, the Congress must provide us with the resources to make this plan a reality for American farmers and ranchers," Glickman said, noting that the Administration's FY 99 budget calls for \$3.8 million to strengthen and restructure GIPSA.

Under the plan, GIPSA field office consolidations will allow more resources to be located in regions where beef, pork, and poultry production

changes made to the most affordable and dependable electric utility system in the world will benefit them as much as they would benefit Alcoa, U.S. Steel, or the Ford Motor Company," said Glenn English, CEO, National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

Rural Americans rely on safe, reliable, affordable electric power. USDA Rural Utilities Service Administrator Wally B. Beyer and Mr. English expressed concern to the Members of the Subcommittee that derugulation could have detrimental effects on consumers and small businesses in rural areas due to the higher cost of serving sparsely populated areas.

Legislation has been introduced in Congress to deregulate the the electric industry by the year 2000. The House Commerce Committee debated this legislation extensively, and it has been tentatively scheduled for floor action in late April.

and processing are concentrated, and the field offices will be strengthened with additional expertise in economic, statistical, and legal issues to more effectively conduct investigations of alleged anticompetitive practices and financial and trade practice violations.

Glickman also announced two regulatory actions to address producer concerns about concentration and fair trade practices.

First, GIPSA will publish an Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking in the Federal Register seeking public comment on a regulation which would make purchasing or selling livestock, with the condition that the price not be publicly reported, a violation of the Packers and Stockyards Act.

Second, GIPSA will also publish a proposed rule which would require that accurate feed weights be provided to contract growers when those weights are used in determining producer compensation. "These regulations will help to ensure that farmers and ranchers are treated fairly in today's

concentrated agricultural marketplace," Glickman said.

Finally, Glickman announced two additional actions to improve the market and price discovery information available to the livestock industry. First, Glickman announced that USDA will issue a proposed rule to add beef and pork to the weekly "U.S. Export Sales" report. The proposal would require exporters to report weekly on the quantity, destination, and the marketing period of their export sales of beef and pork.
