Proctor Dam - Gas Field To Boost Areas Economy

It was learned last week, thru the Dublin Progress Extra, that sufficient funds had been approved for land purchases to begin in August prior to the construction of a giant \$17,100,000 Proctor Dam.

(The following are excerpts from the Dublin Progress Extra): The area surrounding Proctor is expected to get a boost in its economy.

There will be many industries and businesses which will eye the prospects which could be derived. . . No one city within the immediate area is expected to gain more benefit than another.

In all areas where dams are constructed for the purpose of surface water storage, the cities surrounding have seen their economy greatly expanded due to the drawing power of such a project.

There will be need for housing on a scale unparalleled in the history of this section of the state, and this will, in turn, call for bigger and better business establishments. With the tourist in mind several business men formerly from this area have already made arrangements to return.

GAS FIELD

There is also prospects for a big gas gathering plant to be constructed in the Rising Star area. The Coastal States Gas Producing Co. of Corpus Christi and the Lone Star Gas Co. have been negotiating a 20 year contract under the terms of which the Lone Star will buy the gas and construct a gathering system in the area.

The acreage in Brown, Eastland, Comanche and Erath counties is estimated to have reserves of more than 267 billion cubic feet of proven gas and more than four million barrels of condensate.

Included in the acreage mentioned above is the well drilled on the Greenwood tract that was described in the Progress about three weeks ago.

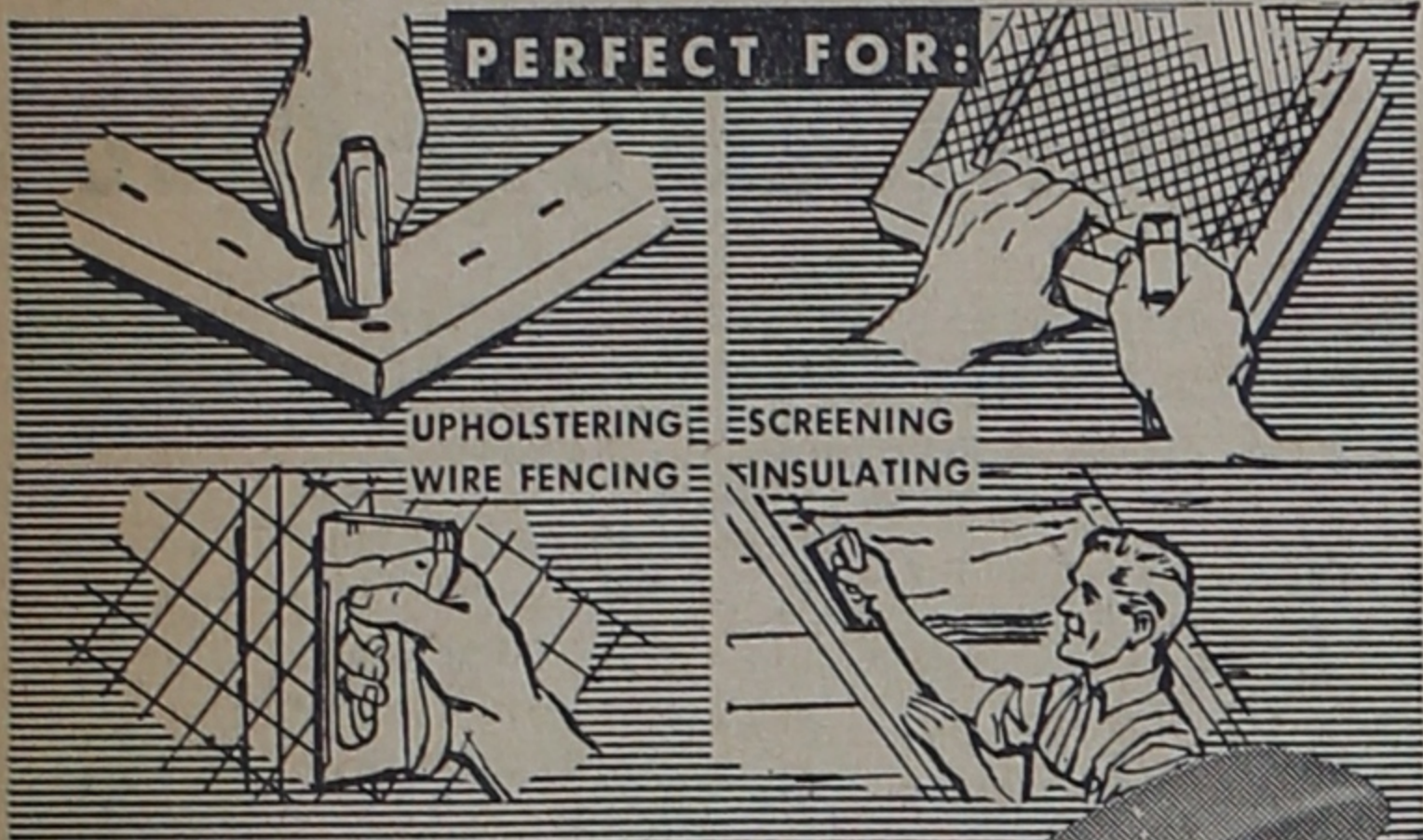

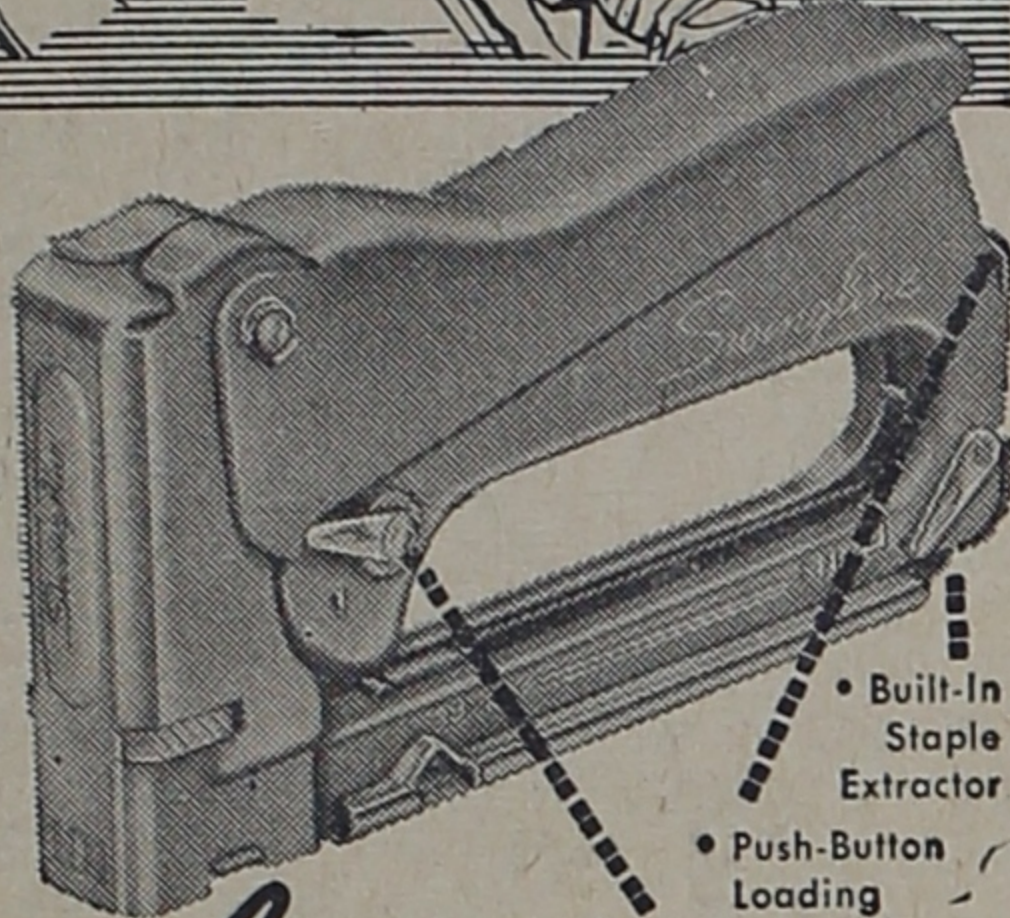

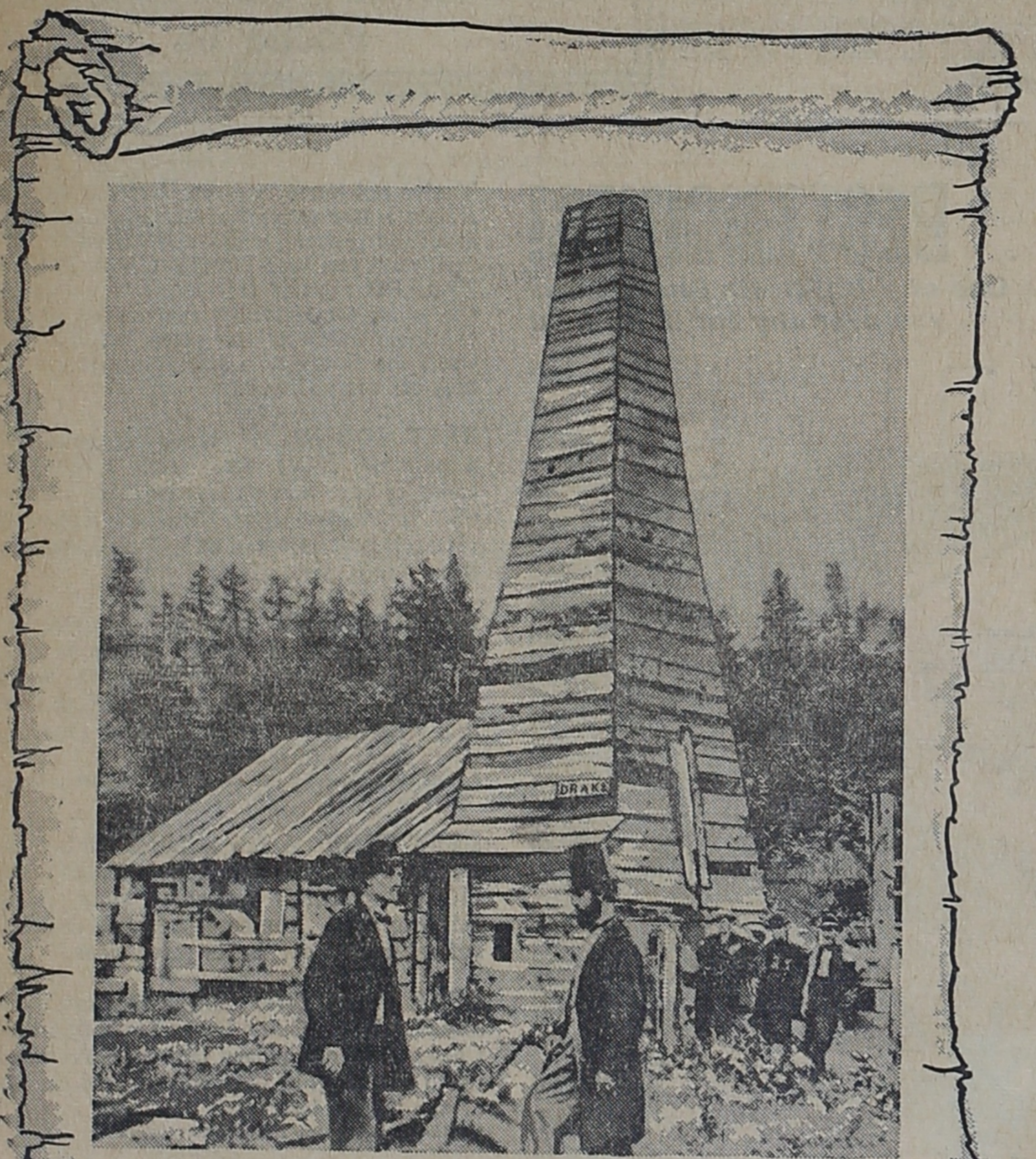

Pastures must be repopulated with better grasses before we can again have the grass production which made this country famous for good stocker cattle. The early spring of 1957 was the beginning of our period of moisture build-up now making range restoration possible. Since

Cattlemen practicing good range management are aware of this fact. They know they must remove all of their livestock from those pastures needing natural reseeding.

This year many stockmen, keeping their eyes on their native grass lands, have made provision for their stock during this period by seeding temporary forage crops on cropland fields. As one travels about the country he sees field after field of succulent sudan, sarghum ualm, and Johnson grass. These fields are ideal hames for their stock while native grasses are being rested from grazing to produce a seed crop for better grass in years to come.
