# **Eastland County Burn Ban Reinstated As of January 23rd**

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF EASTLAND

### ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS. The Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County that all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county to begin January 23, 2012, at 8:00 a.m., for 90 days from the adoption of this Order, the same being April 22, 2012, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

Adopted this 23rd day of January, 2012, by a vote of 5 Ayes and 0 nays.

# USDA 2012 DCP & ACRE Sign-up Starts January 23

The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) announces that sign-up for the 2012 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) and the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program starts on January 23, 2012 and continues through June 1, 2012.

Eligible DCP participants receive a direct payment and/or a counter-cyclical payment. Direct payment rates are established by statute regardless of market prices. FSA reminds producers that the 2008 Farm Bill does not authorize advance direct payments for 2012. Counter-cyclical payments vary depending on market prices, and are issued only when the effective price for a commodity is below its target price (which takes into account the direct payment rate, market price and loan rate).

# **Commissioner Staples' Statement On Denial Of Keystone Pipeline Permit**

AUSTIN - Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples commented on the decision to deny the permit to build the Keystone Pipeline.

"Denying Americans this reliable oil source also denies American jobs and energy security at a time when our country needs them most," Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said. "Through responsible pipeline development, we can protect private property owners' rights, protect the environment and provide the energy resources our nation desperately needs.

"At a time when we need private sector investment and hiring in our country, our President is closing the doors of opportunity. Texas farmers and ranchers also will suffer from this unreasonable decision as agriculture producers depend on low-cost energy to be competitive.

"This policy fails Texas, the United States and our neighbors in Canada. Furthermore, this decision increases our dependence on energy from an increasingly unstable part of the world."



ACRE protects producers from farm market revenue declines when revenue triggers are met for a commodity at both the state and farm level. Farms that are already enrolled in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP) for a crop year can elect to switch to ACRE before the end of signup.

Both DCP and ACRE participants must sign annual contracts to be eligible for program benefits. All signatures of producers who will receive a share of DCP and ACRE payments must be on file by the June 1, 2012 deadline.

# Dean Davis Enrolls at McMurry University

Dean Davis of DeLeon, TX, has enrolled for the Spring 2012 semester at McMurry University in Abilene, Texas.

Beginning in the fall of 2012, students may enroll in a Master of Nursing program through the Patty Hanks Shelton School of Nursing. It is anticipated that a second master's program in Education in Curriculum and Instruction with an English as a Second Language Endorsement (ESL) will be launched in the fall of 2013 through the School of Education.

This past summer, the NCAA officially announced that McMurry University has been accepted into a NCAA Division II candidacy period, bringing back scholarship athletics to the institution for the first time since the 1976-77 school year.



## Exercising During Winter - The Key to Staying Fit!

It is winter and it is cold outside. Getting up early in the morning to exercise when it is dark never seems like a very good idea at this time of the year. Staying in bed where it is warm seems much more appealing. So how can you continue your exercise program in the winter and not lose all the progress you have made? Make up your mind to be more active each day. It has to be a priority. Set a time and do not let anything get in the way. It does not have to take long periods of time. Studies show that several sessions of physical activity during the day give benefits similar to one longer session. If time is limited sneak in a quick 10 minutes in the morning, take a 10-minute walk at lunch and another 10 minutes in the evening. The recommendation is at least 30 minutes of physical activity daily in order to obtain health benefits such as decreased risk of heart disease and better blood sugar control for diabetics. For weight loss the recommendation is about one hour of exercise every day.

Exercising outdoors in the winter can be invigorating. Dress in layers of breathable clothing to provide insulation that can be adjusted as you get warmer. Do not forget to drink water. You may want to warm up indoors in you can. Do a little exercise to increase your body temperature, and then go outside. Exercising at home, consider purchasing some inexpensive exercise equipment such as weights, an exercise ball or jump rope or exercise programs on video or DVD. It probably is not a good idea to purchase expensive equipment unless you are sure you will use them. Vary the types of exercise to help maintain your enthusi- America to go to work and lower energy costs asm.

For example, walk on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. Then try Pilates, bicycling or another activity that you enjoy on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday. Set your goals so that they are achievable. If they are too high you might get discouraged and give up. In addition to exercising be aware of what and how much you are eating. It is very easy to eat too much of the high calorie foods that are available during the winter months. Overeating and inactivity are a recipe for weight gain. Include vegetables, fruits, whole grains, low-fat dairy products and lean meat choices as much as possible. Watch portions - try filling half of your plate with vegetables, a quarter with meat and a quarter with starch. Eat fruit for dessert. Make what you eat count towards the needed servings from the food guide pyramid. Keeping active and fit all year round may not be easy, but it is possible if you set your mind to it. The benefits are both physical and psychological. If your goal is be more fit by summer, exercise, healthy food choices and portion control will help you to achieve it.

Science shows that consuming at least three servings of milk, cheese or yogurt every day helps people meet their daily calcium, potassium and other nutrient recommendations and may help reduce the risk of chronic diseases such as osteoporosis, hypertension and obesity. During holiday cooking, substitute low-fat dairy options to get the same vitamins with fewer calories. Consider options like low-fat or fat-free cheese, lowfat or skim milk and fat-free plain Greek yogurt.

"Even people with lactose intolerance do not have to miss out

According to the National Pest Management Association (NPMA), more than half of homeowners are concerned about pest damage to their homes and property - and rightfully soon att

"Increased moisture from melting ice and snow can create cracks and holes in roofs and foundations, allowing pests easy access," said Missy Henriksen, vice president of public affairs for the National Pest Management Association. "Ice dams, which form on roofs and prevent snow from melting, are especially problematic as they can damage walls, ceilings, insulation and drywall, with resulting moisture attracting pests such as termites and carpenter ants."

If pests have already found their way indoors, immediate action is recommended. "Homeowners should deal with a pest problem right away since household pests breed relatively quickly. A small pest problem can re-sult in a full-blown infestation in a matter of weeks, posing serious health risks to homeowners and their families," advised Henriksen.

## It's Tax Time. Are You Taking All the Deductions Allowed?

(NU) - Here's a scary number to keep in mind if you're just getting your tax receipts together: \$1 billion.

No, it's not the amount that Warren Buffet's secretary - let alone Buffet personally - paid the IRS in her lifetime. It's how much taxpayers approximately wind up forfeiting each year to the government because of self-inflicted tax errors like: failing to claim tax credits and deductions legally due them; choosing the wrong filing status; and not bothering to send in a return at all.

Well, guess what? A slew of recent changes in the tax law won't make things any easier this year.

'At a time when taxpayers are hurting, it really doesn't make sense to leave money on the table," says Elaine Smith, master tax advisor at H&R Block, the giant tax preparation firm (www.hrblock.com).

Here are some things - good d bad - to watch out for



Smith, "you can claim a \$500 credit. Unless, that is, you'd already

maxed out in prior years." • Expiration of the tax credit for hybrid cars. If you bought a Prius last year, you did so without the feds' help. ## **2012 Residential Homestead Exemptions**

Eastland County property owners wishing to sign up for property tax exemptions and/or special use valuations for 2012, may obtain the necessary applications from the Eastland County Appraisal District which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse Annex Building at 102 N. Lamar in Eastland. Applications may also be requested by telephone; the number to call is 254-629-8597.

There are several tax exemptions and/or special use valuations available to property owners. A partial list of some of those available will be given at the end of this article. If a property owner has a question as to his or her eligibility; they should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance

Homeowners may be eligible for a residential homestead exemption. As much as \$15,000 in appraised value may be deducted from your local school property tax value if you qualify for a residential homestead exemption. The completed residential homestead application form should be filed by May 1, 2012 if you wish to apply. This type of exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If you already have been receiving this exemption and still reside in the same residence; there is no need to re-apply.

An exception to this would be for the homeowner who has turned sixty-five (65) years of age since last year or will turn (65) during the 2012 year. He or she should reapply as they are eligible for an additional exemption amount as well as a tax ceiling in some cases.

Additionally, if you are an over sixty-five (65) residential homestead owner and you are moving to another residence within the State of Texas; you may be eligible to transfer your present over 65 tax ceiling percentage to your new residence.

If you have a question as to whether you are already receiving a homestead exemption or as to your eligibility for one of the available exemptions or special valuations; please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District at (254) 629-8597 in Eastland, Texas.

Among the partial exemptions and/or special use valuations available are:

Residential Over Sixty-five (65) and/or Disabled Residential Homestead Exemption Service Connected Disabled Veterans Exemption And Special Use Valuation of Open Space Land (Ag Use).

TEMPLE, TEXAS, Jan. 23, 2012- USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) District Conservationist ShaMarie Tamminga reminds agriculture producers that the ranking period cut-off date for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is February 3, 2012. Producers interested in EQIP should submit applications to the Eastland County NRCS office by the deadline so their applications can be considered during the first ranking period of 2012.

EQIP — one of the largest programs in the Farm Bill is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environmental quality and assists producers to meet local, state and federal regulations.

"EQIP is a valuable tool to help Eastland County's agricultural producers implement conservation practices that provide environmental benefits to help sustain agricultural operations," said Mrs. Tamminga.

EQIP is a continuous sign-up program that allows landowners or operators to apply for financial and technical assistance for the application of specific conservation practices; but the deadline for the first 2012 funding is February 3, 2012. Contracts are offered periodically depending on budgetary allocations. Applications made after the deadline will be considered in the next funding cycle. Higher priority will be given to those applications that address national, state and local priorities and provide higher cost efficiency.
