## Panthers To Host Baird Bears Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers of 1994 open their regular season this Friday night when they play host to the Baird Bears at Brogdon Field at 8 p. m.

The Panthers are coming off of a good showing in their two scrimmage games with highly rated Jin Ned Indians and the Tolar Rattlers.

Last season was rather difficult season for the Big Red as they only won three games out of a ten game schedule. The Big Red, normally a contender for the playoffs, had troubles throughout the season with several inexperienced players and other problems.

This season could be a turn-around with 10 players with starting experience, including seven who started on defense last season.

Another point in the Panthers favor is a new district. The Panthers are now in District 13A with holdovers Rising Star, Evant and Cross Plains, plus newcomers Santa Anna and Lometa, up from Six-Man.

Jim Curlee, new head coach for the Panthers has put the Panthers on a diet of good ole' fundamental blocking and tackling, and the

Panthers have really taken to the new system. Curlee stated that the team will be young, but a lot of the players saw action as sophomores. Gorman has several outstanding athletes on the squad.

Nick Guthery returns at quarterback, and Jeremy Sanders, Marco Herrera and Don Mauney, a three-year letterman, are in the backfield.

The line includes veteran ends Toby Gilder and Tom Bynum, tackles Jerry Krause, also a three-year letterman, and Chris Carlton, center Nic Burleson and guard Jason Rich. The Panthers will have a larger line than last season.

Defensively, the secondary returns intact with Sanders, Guthery, Bynum and Herrera, but Mauney is the only linebacker and Rich and Burleson are the only experienced linemen.

We could have a solid team, barring injuries and the maturity of the young players will play key roles, stated Coach Curlee.

Other new coaches this season are Bill Roark and Barry McMichael, along with Eddie Pettit, who has coached for the Panthers the past few seasons.

New players expected to help the Big Red this season are Shannon Mauney, a 210 pound freshman guard and linebacker, and Paul Petree, a 155-pound junior running back and linebacker.

Also there are several players up from Junior High who could make a contribution to the team.

The season opener will kick off at 8 p. m. Come on out and show your support for the Panthers of 1994 and back them all the way.

## Attention All Hunters!

With the hunting season upon us we need to be reminded that SAFETY COMES FIRST. Let's all follow the Ten Commandments of Safety.

1. Treat Every Gun As If It Were Loaded. Don't assume the firearm you are carrying is empty. Give it the respect you would give a loaded gun.
2. Don't Load Before You Are Ready. Take down or have all actions open before traveling. Make sure firearms are unloaded while in their cases.
3. Police Your Target Practice. Control your line of sight. Make sure your backdrop is more than adequate to protect unseen bystanders. Avoid targeting hard, flat surfaces or bodies of water.
4. Watch Your Muzzle. Know and control the direction of your muzzle at all times. Never pull a gun by the muzzle toward you.
5. Watch Your Step. Never climb fences, jump ditches or make awkward moves while holding a loaded firearm.
6. Know Your Target. Make sure you identify your target before firing. Prepare yourself before hunting.
7. Keep It Serious. No matter how enjoyable, it is, hunting is no game. Avoid horseplay, and never point a

gun where you don't want to shoot.

8. Inspect Your Firearms. Before loading, inspect your barrel for obstructions. Check ammunition to make sure specifications match those of your gun.

9. Store Firearms Safely. When not in use, store unloaded firearms separately from ammunition. Keep all out of reach of children and inexperienced users.

10. Never Drink and Hunt. Never consume alcoholic beverages or other moon-altering drugs before or while hunting.

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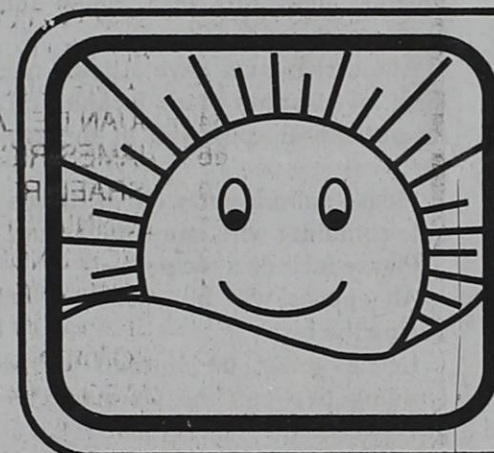

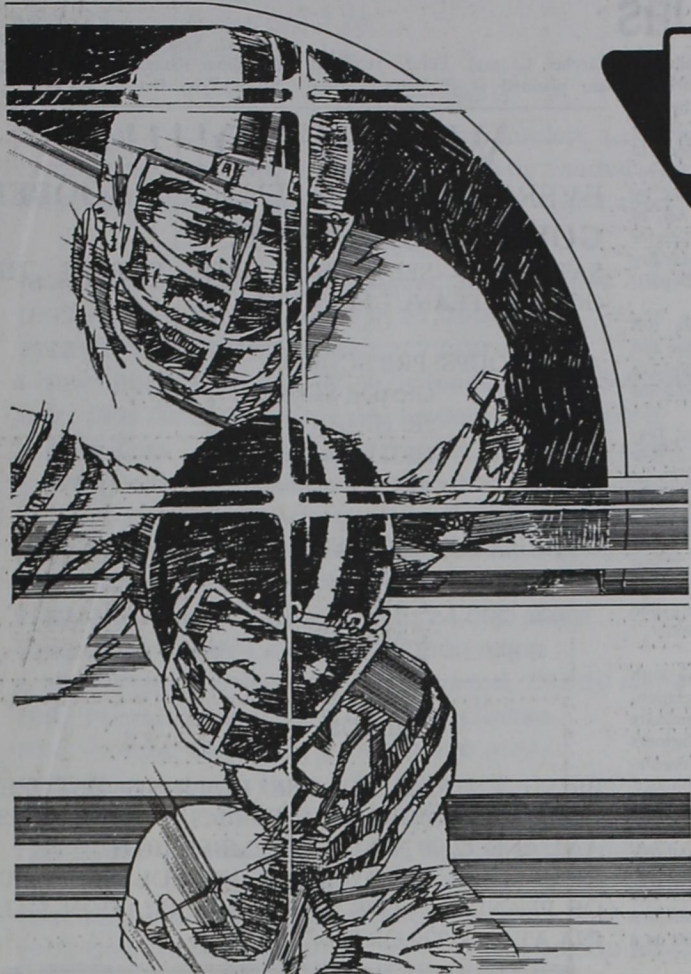

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## Stenholm Votes Against Revised Crime Bill

Washington, D.C. — Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) voted against the amended conference report on the crime bill when it was brought before the House late Sunday, August 21st. The bill passed by a vote of 235 to 195.

"While the amended version of the crime bill was better than the original conference report, there were not enough substantive changes to the bill to gain my support," said Stenholm.

The conferences on the crime bill had met continuously over the weekend to work out a compromise bill that could gain enough support to pass the House. The conferees cut spending by \$3.3 billion, shifted some of the specific prevention program monies into block grants, and strengthened the language on sexually violent predators.

"Obviously, I am disappointed by the outcome of this vote. It has been my belief throughout this entire process that we should have killed this bill and started over next year with a more targeted approach," said Stenholm. "We should aim to fix things that are broken and not propose these omnibus bills which include everything but the kitchen sink."

In addition to opposing the ban on assault weapons which gives the

Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (BATF) the expanded authority to add to the list of banned weapons, Stenholm opposed the bill because of the unfunded mandates it places on state and local law enforcement officials.

"The law enforcement folks tell me that they know what the problems are in their jurisdiction and they are handling these problems at the local level," Stenholm said. "They see this crime bill as another misguided attempt by the federal government to try and mandate solutions for state and local problems."

Stenholm cosponsored an alternative crime proposal which would have provided grants to correctional facilities to expand prison capacity, grants to state and local law enforcement, and funding for border enforcement. Additionally, this proposal would have required truth-in-sentencing, abolished luxuries for prisoners, required prison work, stopped the endless appeals process for death row inmates and convicted felons, and would have provided a "good faith" exception to the exclusionary rule which would end the practice of setting criminals free based on technicalities. This alternative failed to gain the necessary support in the House.

## Battle of Bulge Veterans To Mark 50th Anniversary

December 16, 1994, marks the 50th anniversary of the commencement of America's greatest land battle—the Battle of the Bulge. This battle took place from December 16, 1944, through January 25, 1945, in the bitter cold and snow of the heavily-forested Ardennes Forest of Belgium and Luxembourg.

More than one million young men took part in this bloody World War II battle—600,000 of them American. There were 81,000 American casualties, including 19,000 killed.

Those who fought and survived the Battle of the Bulge will never forget. Those who sacrificed their lives will be remembered by survivors and others December 16, 1994, with memorial services and the

dedication of a plaque at the Soldiers Memorial Military Museum in St. Louis, Mo. The USA World War II Commemoration Committee has designated St. Louis as the site for the national commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge.

Many other activities are being planned in connection with the 50th Anniversary Commemoration to be held December 15-18, 1994, in St. Louis, Mo. Complete information regarding these ceremonies is available from the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, Inc. (VBOB). VBOB is an international, non-profit organization founded in 1981 to perpetuate the memory of the sacrifices involved in this battle and has enrolled over

## Penalties For Misuse Of Diesel Fuel To Be Enforced by IRS

Waco — Agricultural producers beware: if you drive any farm or ranch machinery powered by tax exempt and dyed diesel fuel on the highways you will be subject to penalties administered by the Internal Revenue Service as provided by the Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993, advises Ned Meister, director of Texas Farm Bureau's Commodity and Regulatory Activities Department.

Diesel fuel for agriculture (off road) use is exempt from excise and sales tax. Fuel for this use is dyed to distinguish it from diesel sold for other "on road" use.

"IRS officials have informed Texas Farm Bureau that the laws as now written says no untaxed, dyed diesel fuel can be used by farm or ranch vehicles on the road. If an IRS enforcement officer stops a farmer and draws a sample of diesel containing dye, that producer would be subject to a fine of \$10 per gallon or \$1,000, whichever is greater," Meister stated.

Texas Farm Bureau, along with the Texas Oil Marketers Association, is sponsoring diesel fuel seminars across the state to inform farmers and ranchers about the tax regulations. The seminars will be conducted by the IRS and the State Comptroller's office.

Meister said there are undoubtedly agricultural producers who are unaware of these regulations and could be fined should they drive a piece of agricultural equipment on a road for any reason.

"The state regulations allow for the movement of equipment within a 10-mile radius of the farm. The federal rule has no allowances for moving equipment from field to field or farm to farm. We hope to convince the IRS that these regulations are not reasonable," Meister said. "Until then, producers could be fined."

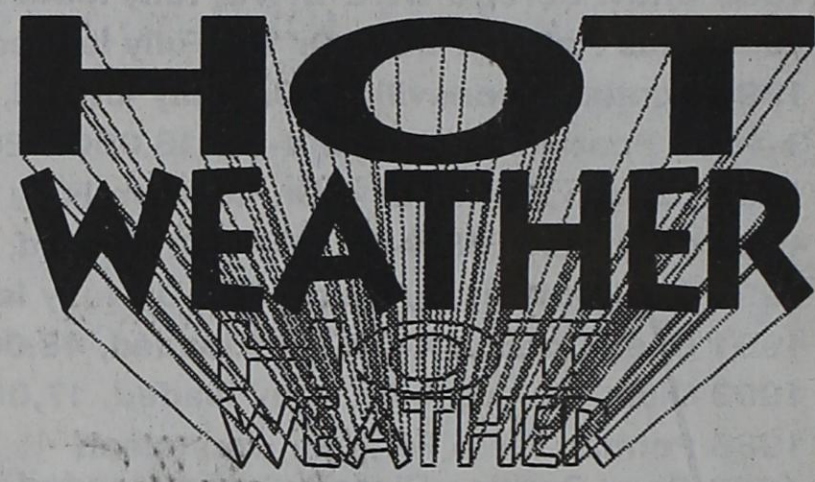
