Carbon School

The Federal Government WPA grant has been made to the Carbon Independent School District to the amount of \$51,753.00, their share in the school building program. The citizens of the district have voted and sold the bonds necessary to pay their share of the cost of the project which is \$27,-206.00. The bonds were sold at par value and accrued interest Everything is in readiness to begin work immediately.

The project calls for the rehabilitation of the present brick building, construction of additions to the building, construction of pump house and installation o a water pump, septic tank, disposal field, play grounds, tennis courts, walks, drives, track and football field, installation of gas, electricity, sewer and water lines. grading, sodding and landscaping grounds.

This new plant is constructed for a 12 grade school system. The lower floor will accomodate the eight grammar grades to a maximum enrollment of three hundred students. The second floor will house the entire high school to a maximum of 300 students. The 300 persons.

NYA Youths Are Project To Start Working on Army **Sponsored Projects**

AUSTIIN, April 2.-Approximately fifteen hundred boys and girls in Texas are assigned to NYA Projects sponsored by the United States Army, according to J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator. Of this number 1,151 are boys asd 269 are girls.

This work, which is non-military in nature, consists of assisting in sheet metal, motor, machine, and electrical shops and of acting as helpers in carpentering, painting, bricklaying, plumbing, refrigeration, steamfitting, laundry, warehouses, clerical work, and hospital work. Through these NYA Projects the regular Army men are left free to devote all of their time and energy to strictly military duties.

Urges Passage of Sanatorium Bill

AUSTIN, April 2.-Expressing the hope the future would provide district tuberculosis sanatoriums for all section of Texas, Dr. J. B. McKnight, superintendent of the State Sanatorium at San Angelo, urged the legislature to pass the Southwest Texas sanatorium bill which is scheduled for a hearing before the Senate finance committee Wednesday.

Of the 2,737 young men rejected for military service, or placed in limited service groups, 967, or 10.17 per cent of the total draftees, were placed in Draft Classification 1-B as having minor physical defects, perhaps remediable, which would make them adaptable to the regular military service, but, if necessary, would allow them to be placed in limited service. The additional rejections for various other physical defects brought the total of Class 1-B rejectees to 967.

Classification IV-F (permanent rejection because of physical defects) numbered 1,770 persons. Out of this number, 540 were rejected because of skeleto-muscular defects, 235 because of syphilis; 189 because of impaired vision; 162 because of diseases of the nervous system, 126 because of the Intelligence and Operations heart trouble; 87 because of hernia; 85 because of teeth; 78 eye, ear, nose and throat diseases; and 378 persons rejected for other physical defects.

It is impossible to know without consulting the case histories Mr. and Mrs. Harold Pittman of each individual rejectee to what his physical unfitness can be attributed. It can be established that there are many indications of improper childhood care, of harmful and debilitating personal health habits, of malnutrition and lack of attention to positive health

> The above figures are not without significance to every thinking citizen. They reveal that in the period since the World War the tremendous advances made in the field of medical science and public health have not had as positive an effect on the health of the public at large as is desirable or necessary if we as a nation are to have optimum health.

One obstacle to translating this knowledge into gains in health for the average citizens has been the difficulty or providing local public health services so that health control measures are available to all our communities, regardless of size, location, or per capita income. The work of public health units is limited primarily toward the emphasis on positive, radiant Federated Clubs held in Ballinger health, and in this manner contributions are made to the national

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


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
