P. marketing quotas on peanuts for cionship Rodeo Stock will be rounded up and brought in from the Lightning C ranch thirteen miles from Dublin. The Lightning C. operated by the World's Chamcionship Rodeo Corporation which supplies stock to the Boston Garden and Madison Square Garden Rodeos, is the largest ranch in the world devoted exclusively to rodeo stock, brahma bulls, bucking horses, brahma cows and calves, Mexican steers and long-

The quota will remain in effect The menus are furnished the 25th only if approved by two-thirds of each month for the following or more of the peanut farmers voting in the referendum. The vote is for a three-year period affecting the crops of 1941, 1942, and 1943.

> Under the quota, a farmer who plants within his peanut acreage allotment may market all he produces without penalty. Peanuts marketed in excess of the farm marketing quota are subject to a penalty of three cents per pound. However, payment of the penalty is not required if the excess peanuts are delivered to an agency designated for handling excess peanuts. In this case, the farmer receives for his excess the price for oil, which usually is considerably lower than the market price

> "The use of marketing quotas," said R. M. Evans, AAA Administrator, "is the means by which each farmer can receive his fair share of the available market Peanut acreage which has been expanding rapidly in late years, with the result that farmers are now producing more peanuts than they can sell on the open market at profitable prices.

"The new law provides that, if marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, either a loan or diversion program, or both, becomes mandatory.

"Producers of cotton and tobacco already market their crops under the quota system, and have received loans which help to stabilize prices. Now peanut growers will decide for themselves, through the democratic procedure of the referendum, whether they want marketing quotas for handperformance, encouraging these ling their crops. The marketing quota is simply a part of the regular AAA Form Program which is ready to be put into use whenever the situation calls for it."

Who May Vote In Peanut Referendum

All farmers engaged in 1940 ia he production of peanuts (meanng peanuts picked and threshed by mechanical means) are eligible o vote in the referendum to be held on peanut marketing quotas Saturday, April, 26th. Any person who shared in the 1940 crop of peanuts or the proceeds thereof is owner (not landlord of a fixed rent tenant) tenant or sharecropper is considered as having been engaged in the production of peanuts.

No person shall be eligible to vote in any community other than the community in which he resides except under certain conditions. There shall be no voting by mail (except by persons residing outside of the county in which they are engaged in the

production of peanuts in 1940). The County Agricultural Conservation Committee shall be responsible for the proper holding of the referendum in each county.




