

C. T. Moorman was born in Richmond, North Carolina, August 21, 1863, and moved to Texas in 1870. In 1890 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Bowman, and 1914 they moved to Gorman. For a number of years he was engaged in farming and cattle raising and was considered one of the most successful farmers of this section. During the past fifteen years he had been in declining health; and several weeks ago he was put to bed which he was un-

able to leave for more than a few hours since that time. When about forty years of age,

he was converted and joined the Baptist Church. He was always staunch member of the local church and served in many capacities, never refusing to accept responsibilities when called upon.
