With the 1941 kite flying season at hand, L. D. Stewart, manager for Texas Electric Service Company, issued today his annual appeal to parents to warn children flying kites to keep away from electric lines. in the business district which will

"That the innocent pastime of be broadcast by a powerful sound kite flying can be exceedingly dangerous is brought out forcibly by the fact that, over the nation, many accidents occurred in the year just past because of children getting metalized kites tangled in power lines, although here in Gorman we were fortunate in that local boys and girls were careful and the only damage that occurred was a few broken kites," according to Mr. Stewart.

"As we've warned before, too often children use metal wire in the place of kite string and when this wire comes in contact with a power line the result is instantly disastrous. Even plane kite strings sometime carry current, especially if the string is wet. The best idea, regardless of how the kite is built or what kind of string is used is to see that it is flown in open spaces where no electric lines are located.

"If a kite should become entangled in electric lines, children should not climb the poles or use long sticks to get the kite down. This does not include orders for naterials and supplies and many subcontracts which are now being andled in this State.

The Governor has written personal letter to the principal officer of each primary contractor in the United States, putting at their service the industrial capacity and supplies and materials available in Texas.

A manual on locker storage is now being compiled and will be ready within a few weeks for distribution to industrialization commitees in 237 Texas towns and to others interested in the matter. This manual is being prepared

in collaboration with the research bureaus of Texas A. & M. College, The University of Texas, and other agencies of the state.

Emphasis is being placed upon the decentralization of industry throughout the state, the governor said. He expressed interest in seeing many small industries located in Texas.





World's First "Adjustable Highway"



Wide applicability not only to peacetime requirements but also to problems of defense is claimed for the traffic divider which M. F. Norris, Chevrolet executive, is inspecting above. It has just been placed in service on the newest stretch of Chicago's famous Outer Drive, and is vide lanes of varying width, so that the road becomes, in effect, an adjustable highway.

Three parallel dividing-curbs are recessed into the pavement, so that its 100-foot width can be split into four 25-foot lanes. The mechanism operates hydraulically. Control stations like that at which George Van Dorpe and Michael Gorun, Chicago city employes, are standing (upper left inset) make it possible to retract each divider flush with the pavement surface, or raise it eight inches to the position shown in the larger photo. Each control operates 600 feet of divider, in 12-foot sections, raising it in 111/2 seconds. Cross-section diagram shows construction of divider, and inner arrows point to glass bull'seyes through which light shines when curb is raised.

The lower diagram shows cross-section of road, with dividers in various positions, to handle directional traffic flow at various hours of the day. One adaptation of the idea, it is pointed out, could be used to separate military from civilian traffic, when this is desirable, while another would close airports against landings by hostile planes. In normal use, however, it not only expedites traffic movement but makes a 100-foot highway do the work of one much wider, an especially important point in congested areas where land for widening comes high.


