Attention Called To violating a postal regulation. Families Receiving Mattresses

In any case where it is definitely determined that a family who has received a mattress is ineligible under the provisions of the program to receive such mattress, the person receiving the mattress should be advised of this fact by the county committee as soon as the determination is made and given full reason for the committee's determination and required to do on of two things. (1) Return the mattress if it has not been used at all. (2) Pay for it if it has been used at all. The family will be required to pay to the Treasurer of the United States \$6.55 for the mattress and \$1.35 for the comfort. -Ruth Ramey, County Home Demonstration Agent.
