# DALLAS JOBE AND J. E. SMITH SHIP FIRST CAR LOAD OF ONIONS

The first car load of onions to be sold here went out Tuesday and Rural Letter was bought by a New York produce concern. One left Wednesday night and another is scheduled to be shipped from here Friday.

### Only Sixty Acres Planted

J. E. Smith and Dallas Jobe were approached on the subject of producing them on a large scale by J. C. Brewer, who was contacted by owners of the Riverdale Farm near Cotulla, Texas. Onion sets were furnished and some Mexican laborers to help in putting them out. They returned the first of the week to help harvest the crop.

Tuesday's shipment consisted of 510 sacks of onions, containing 50 pounds each. They were the onions. They were No. 1 grade and there is also a good market for those not so uniform in size and color. Crystal White Wax and Yellow Sweet Spanish are also onions for which there is a good demand, and are also good shippers. From \$1250 to \$1500 was paid for this first car.

# This Soil Suitable for Onion

Buyers and those who have grown them profitably say the soil here is even better than where they have been extensively grown in many sections of Texas. Numbers claim to be interested in watching the test and profits that will be realized from the new venture.

An even better price could be maintained if they were grown in sufficient quantities to justify competitive buyers as cars could be more quickly filled and shipped. It is still in the experimental stage, but after a season or two, farmers in this section might find onion raising on a large scale to be profitable.

F. W. Streuter of south Texas was here in the early spring to oversee the planting of the sixty acres and is here now looking after the harvesting of same.






