Made By August 1

Applications of parents or guardians for transfer of children between the ages of six and seventeen years should be made as early in July as possible, according to a statement made today by county superintendent T. C. Williams The purpose of the law is to permit the child to go to the most convenient school from his place of residence and does not contemplate the transfer of moving children, or the transferring children across districts.

If possible, the person making the application should bring it in to the county school superintendent's office. If the applicant is unable to appear in the county school superintendent's office with the written application, such application should be filed not later than July 25, it was explained.






