

Peanut Quota Voting To Be On Saturday

In order to receive a loan on peanuts or a diversion program for 1941, the marketing quota must be approved. This can be done only by a two-thirds vote of those interested in peanut production—the farmer, tenant or sharecropper. All farmers engaged in the production of peanuts during 1940 are eligible to vote in the community in which he resides. The following gives the voting boxes for each locality:

Poll Tax Payments Greatly Reduced In Eastland Co.

According to the latest reports it is found that Eastland county paid 6,746 poll taxes in 1940, and 3,999 in 1941, a difference of 2,747 for the county as a whole.

Gorman's standing in this reduction is as follows: poll taxes paid in 1940, 562; in 1941, 303, or 259 less. Kokomo paid 65 in 1940, and 22 in 1941, a loss of 43 votes—and so on in other voting boxes to make a total of 2,741 loss in the county.

People regarded this as an off-year in politics which accounts for the smaller number of poll taxes paid and the lack of personal interest in state affairs. But the hand of fate making it necessary to elect a U. S. Senator, the highest office within the gift of the people, has changed all this, and we are likely to have a most interesting political campaign. It just goes to show we can never tell when there will be something of real importance to come up in which we would like a voice.

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

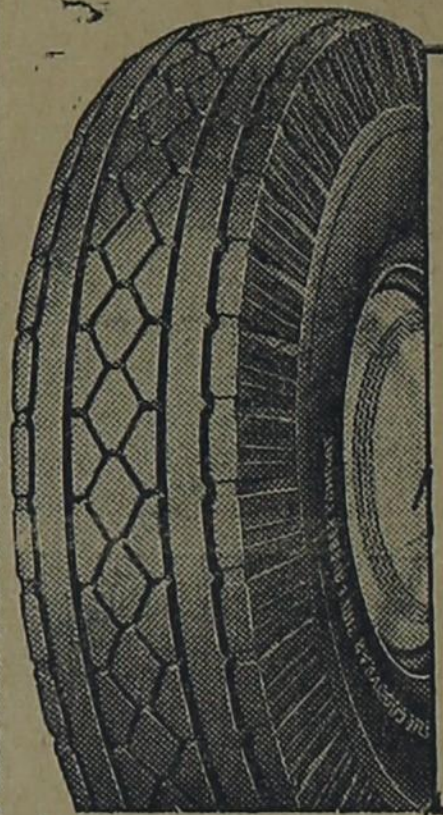

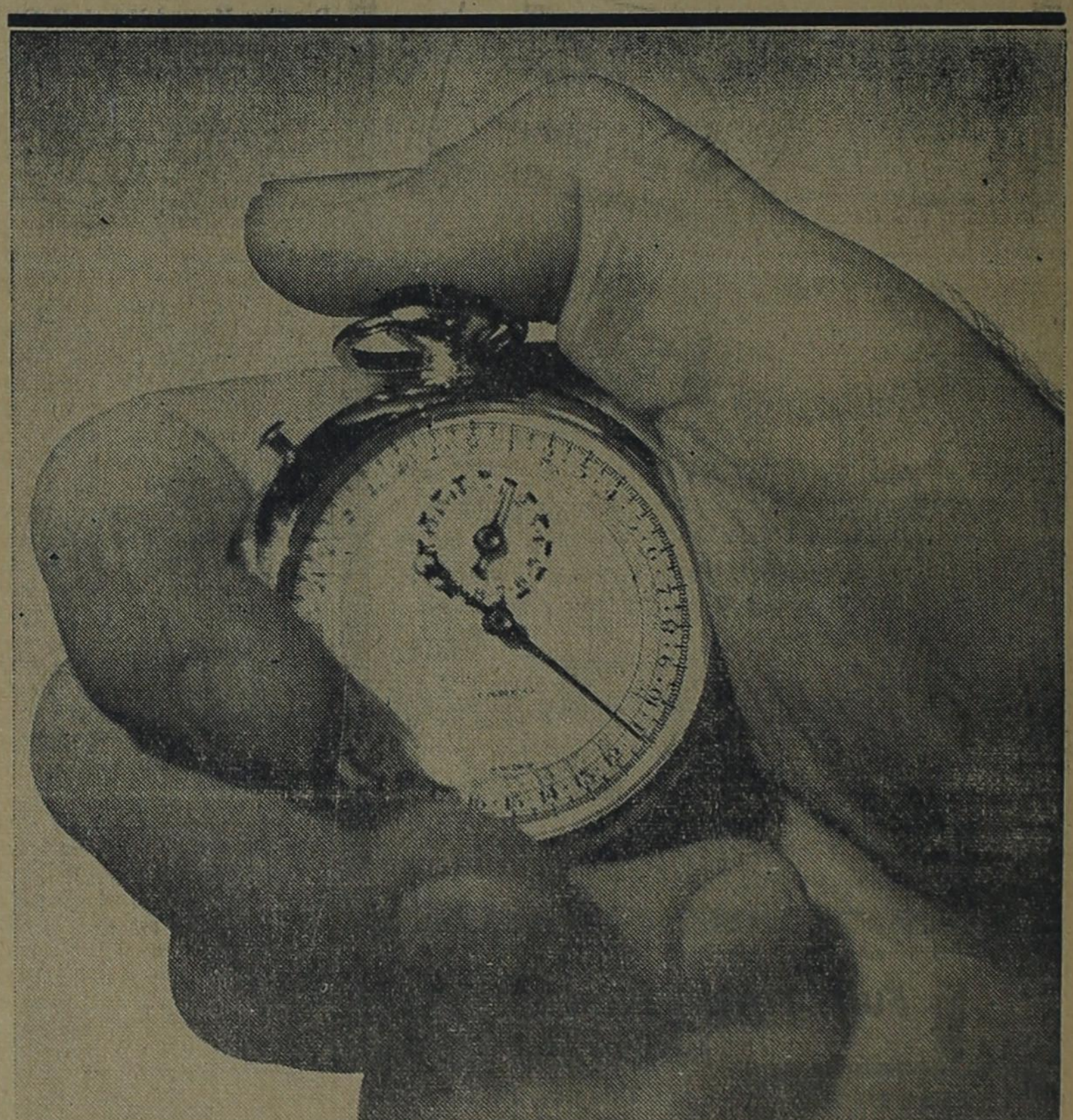
