



Certificate of Title Necessary

Clyde S. Karkalits, Tax Assessor-Collector, by the Texas Highway Department, Austin, Texas.

Sec. 63, paragraph B of the Certificate of Title Act provides that the Department or any agent thereof shall not after the 1st of January, 1942, register or reregister any motor vehicle unless the owner has in his possession an official Certificate of Title.

If you owned your motor vehicle prior to October 1st 1939, and have not secured your certificate of title you may do so by applying through the Tax Assessor-Collector's office, furnishing evidence of ownership such as license facture farm machinery and spare October 1st, 1939.


