Mr. Marshall agreed to have County Clerk Dabney at the Courthouse when Fairbetter and the couple arrived in Comanche.

Funeral Services For Tandy Martin Held At Carbon

Funeral services for David Tandy Martin a retired Methodist minister was held in Carbon on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. Martin had passed away at his home in the Bear Springs Community on Monday.

Since retiring from the ministry Rev. Tandy had farmed as his health permitted.

Rev. Lively Brown, Methodist minister of Carbon, conducted the service. He was assisted by Rev. Bascom Morton of Coleman and Rev. Thomas, Baptist minister of Carbon.

Interment was made in the new Carbon Cemetery. Pallbearers were Howard Gilbert, Bonnie Parker, Parmer Stokes, Claude Stubblefield, Almos Thurman and Will Ussery.

David Tandy Martin was born January 3, 1877 near Tupelo, Mississippi. The family moved to Hartville, Missouri when he was 8 years old. He was married to Emma Middleton at Hartville, on August 1, 1900. Mr. and Mrs. Martin moved to Texas in 1906 settling near Carbon in Eastland County. In 1911 they bought the farm that they still own and have lived there continuously since that time.

Survivors include Mrs. Martin, one son Everett who makes his home with his parents; Mrs. H. Bailey, De Leon Texas; Mrs. Walter Bailey, Mercedes, Texas; and Mrs. Grady Morton, Seymour, Texas. Fourteen grandchildren and three great-grandchildren also survive.

Mr. Martin was converted in summer of 1909 at Long Branch and joined the Methodist Church in 1912. He was first a member of the Bear Springs Church, later moving his membership to Carbon. He loved his church and has rendered years of faithful service as a member and as a day preacher. He has held a great many revivals in the rural communities of Eastland and adjoining counties. A host of people have been converted under his ministry, and a great multitude have been strengthened in their christian faith because of the ministry and life of Tandy Martin. He has held and assisted in holding an innumerable number of funeral services for friends and loved ones.

Mr. Martin's testimony during his last illness included statements of: (1) "A full and joyous life" (2) "Being ready to go" (3) "Thankfulness for a good wife and loving children" (4) "The reality of a home in heaven".

W. Cox, State Health Officer and State Medical Defense Director.

6 MINUTES A DAY Insurance Man Relates Speed To 1867 Deaths

Dallas News (spl) - By adding six minutes daily to their driving time, Texas motorists might have saved the lives of 1,867 traffic accident victims last year, H. G. Kemper, president of the Lumberman's Mutual Casualty Co., Chicago, said in Dallas Thursday.

Addressing 225 of his company's agents from four states at the Hotel Adolphus, Kemper pointed out that:

The average driver spends sixty four minutes a day behind the wheel.

By increasing their travel time 10 per cent through elimination of chance-taking at danger points they could have saved the lives of 1,867 of the 2,075 Texans killed in the first eleven months of 1950.

"Many people just don't take the time to drive carefully," Kemper said. "If drivers increased their travel time 10 per cent, and used this additional time to eliminate chance-taking, their probability of having accidents would be reduced 90 per cent."

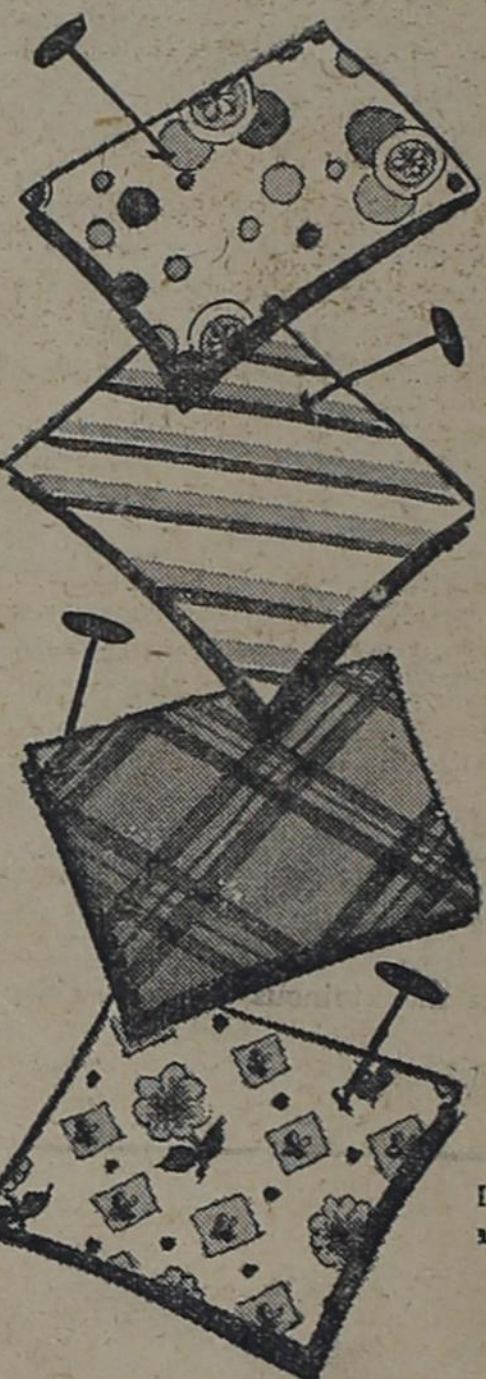

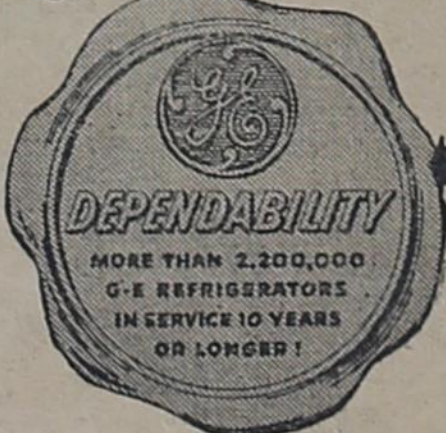
