PUBLISHER-EDITOR - Gene

The following was set up for last week's Progress but got left out on account of only four page paper... this week (as of Tuesday) doesn't look much better.

OUCH!—Last Friday I attended a meeting of West Texas Newspaper men and women at Sweetwater. Guest speaker for the occasion was a Mrs. J. M. Walker of Plainview who is active in Federated Club work and also is editor of a magazine. Her subject was, "Ourselves as others see us." Mrs. Walker stated that newspapers needed a general housecleaning. According to her we are a monopolized, prejudiced, thoughtless group of people who take advantage of our position to force others to our way of thinking. We seldom ever get a story right and when we do we leave out most of the details. Being too lazy to really get out and get news we use anything handy to fill up our papers ("canned stuff," she says).

Now I heartily agree with Mrs. Walker on some of her points. In fact, I invited her to take over the Progress for one or two months or longer if she desired and publish it according to her recommendations. She gracefully declined.

Yes, we are lazy. Few weekly publishers start to work before 5:30 A.M. and usually quit between 8 P.M. and midnight, with an occasional all night shift thrown in. In a four page paper he must use approximately 10,000 words for reading matter... assist his advertisers with ideas to sell their products, lay-out the ads, sometimes making as many as four or five calls before the advertiser is satisfied and then he may change his mind and decide to pass this week. Now after this is done he must set the type, cast the cuts, place them neatly in an iron frame, print, stamp and mail—all in approximately three days time—so that his subscribers will get the paper on time whether they read it or not.

His local news and stories are based on just how much information those concerned want to be printed. If he prints more than that he is inclined to be snubbed or threatened. He is never invited to attend School Board or City Commission meetings—so he can only print what is offered. If he comments on national affairs, his source of information comes from literature mailed him by government agencies or political parties or from what he hears on the radio or reads in the daily newspapers—or occasionally by comments from "the man on the street."

But taking it all in all there isn't one Weekly Publisher out of ten that would accept any other type of employment regardless of how much money he could earn.

You've oftentimes heard the old story of the shoemaker's kids. Well, Thereasa, you know she is the reason I am a married man, returned Monday the Thirteenth from a trip to Michigan to visit her brother and wife, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Thrantert of Battle Creek. After reading last week's paper she remarked, "Well, I don't guess I am home yet as I do not see anything about it in the Progress."

She also stated folks in Battle Creek were complaining about a heat wave. The thermometer was registering between 75 and 80. However, along about Christmas I imagine they will be wishing for some of this good old Texas WARM weather.

Monk of the Division of Pink Boll Worm Control of the USDA located at Gatesville was also present. No evidence of Pink boll worm was found but boll worms and borers had just about ruined all of the cotton the Bennetts had planted. Foggy said they had sprayed three times with Toxaphene and once with 25% DDT.

Inspection of Goodwin's crop showed a few worms but not enough to do any damage yet. Mr. Cooper told Charles he should get a bale to the acre but Charles said he would be willing to sell right then for a half bale.

We were in Goodwin's field about 12:30 p.m. Now I know what farm boys are talking about when they tell of running down a cotton row in their bare feet looking for a shady spot. I wasn't barefooted but the way that sand was burning through my shoe soles I was ready to head back to town fast.

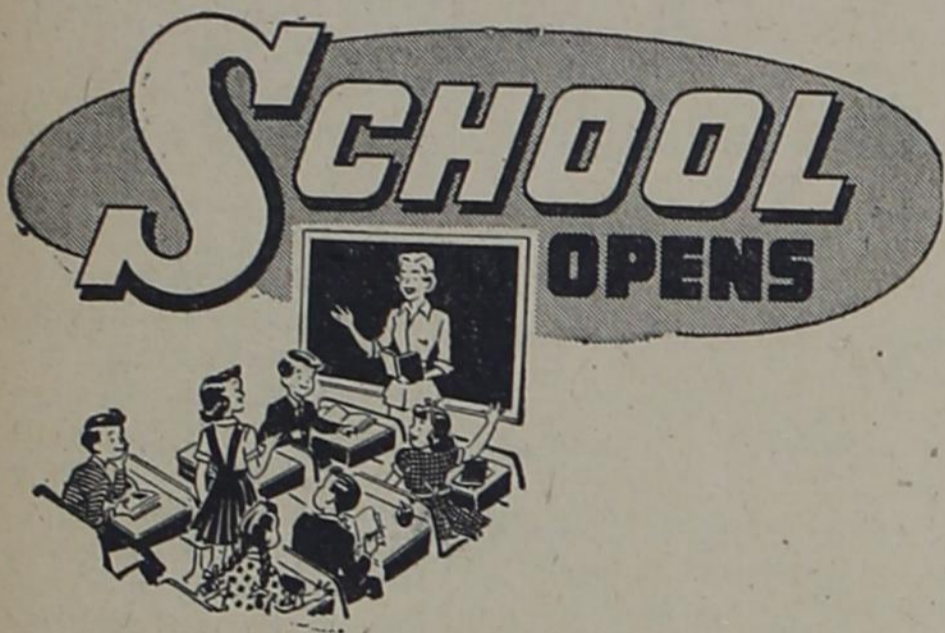

### Fishing - Hunting Licenses Available September First

AUSTIN, Aug. 15.—Fishing and hunting licenses for the fiscal year beginning September 1 will be in the hands of Texas agents the last week in August, according to the Chief Clerk of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission.

He said 1650 persons in practically every community in Texas will help distribute the licenses.

Approximately 315,000 individual resident hunting licenses will have been issued to Texans for the current fiscal year ending August 31.

The Chief Clerk visions a small increase in the sale of both hunting and fishing licenses for the next year.

All of the 36 licenses issued by the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission must be renewed for the new fiscal year, advised the Chief Clerk.

The fees range from 50 cents for a duplicate individual fishing license, replacing the original, to \$200 for a wholesale fish and oyster dealer permit.

One important change to sportsmen is the new combined \$2.15 resident hunting license which is good for both big game and small game, barring antelope which requires a special \$5 permit. All persons over 17 years of age hunting beyond their home county must have a hunting license.

The resident license for sports fishing in fresh water costs \$1.65. It must be used by all persons over 17 years of age when fishing beyond their home counties. Licenses must be possessed even then if artificial bait is used in the home county or artificial bait or live bait are used in adjoining counties.

Hunting and fishing licenses may be purchased at Thompson Hardware in Gorman.
