Another time, Osadchey and Klein, without putting up a dollar, moved into Iowa to "muscle" themselves 50 per cent of a Council Bluffs gambling place called the Stork had invested \$90,000.

Eddie insists that there really was no "muscle." It was merely a case, he explained, where, after he and Snag offered to "buy" the whole club for \$20,000, the owners countered with a proposition that they take half of it for nothing.
