Jude:3 - Beloved when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation.

It was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the Saints.

Romans 2:28 For he is not a Jew which is one outwardly, neither

V. 29 - But he is a Jew which is one inwardly and circumcision is that of the heart in the spirit and not in the letter, whose praise is not of men but of God.

Eligibility Rules Erased For Cadets

Thousands of additional young men are eligible to apply for Air Force flying training as a result of the AF decision to eliminate the 18 month service requirement for men with high school diplomas.

In announcing this new rule change, T/Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station, explained that ten thousand pilot and observer applicants are needed immediately. Even an airman in basic training may apply. Age requirements remain at 20-26 1/2 years. After initial appointment the cadet will enter into a 12 month training schedule for pilot training or a 6-12 month training schedule for observer training, depending on his future crew position. Upon graduation he will be commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the AF Reserve and enter on active duty as flying officer in the USAF.

This is the opportunity that many young men have been waiting for and Sgt. Hendrick urges those who can meet the qualifications and are interested to contact him at once.

Days Of February

Observance of special days in the month of February has helped Americans to keep alive heroic tradition, sentimental customs and revered ideals as well as a foolish superstition.

The ground hog, once considered an authoritative weather prophet, has missed the mark so often that he has become a subject only for wisecracks. His day, February 2nd, has slipped far down the scale of important calendar dates.

Sentimental customs, fighting a continuous battle with commercialism, are losing much of their charm. Most of the fascination of secrecy is gone from the sending of Valentines. And with the rampant sophistication of today there is no need for February 29th.

Washington's Birthday, February 22nd., the most widely commemorated of the special days, has lost for Americans none of its importance although fancies have given away to fact while the traditions continue to be enjoyed as tales of America's greatest hero.

Historians have pulled the traditions from about another great American. On February 12th, 1861 according to the New York Herald the Great Emancipator on his birthday was traveling toward the Capitol of the United States. Said the New York Herald, according to Collier's "The turnout of the yeomanry increases as the train progresses eastward. Most of the stations are handsomely decorated with flags. The president-elect continues reserved and thoughtful and stays most of the time alone in the private saloon (state apartment or large reception room-Webster) prepared for his special use."

Ninety-one years ago, the man who was to give his life while he tried to erase the COLOR LINE, was on his way to Washington, D. C. He was aboard The Wabash from Springfield, Illinois. The COLOR LINE, a heavy black, acts as a strong repellent to many un-Christian and to others lacking

understanding. Many folks have long believed the COLOR LINE to be a protection. But Abraham Lincoln recognized it as a bar that kept the black race in ignorance and poverty.

Lincoln was not successful in his attempt to erase the Color Line. This fact does not lessen his greatness, for the line will not be erased by one man or by forced legislation under the heading of Human Rights.

Great Southern men both white and black have broken the Color Line and will continue to break it and with even greater frequency until the economical, the moral and the cultural status of the Southern Negro has reached a high level. It is a name sake of the first president, who has made the greatest break in the Color

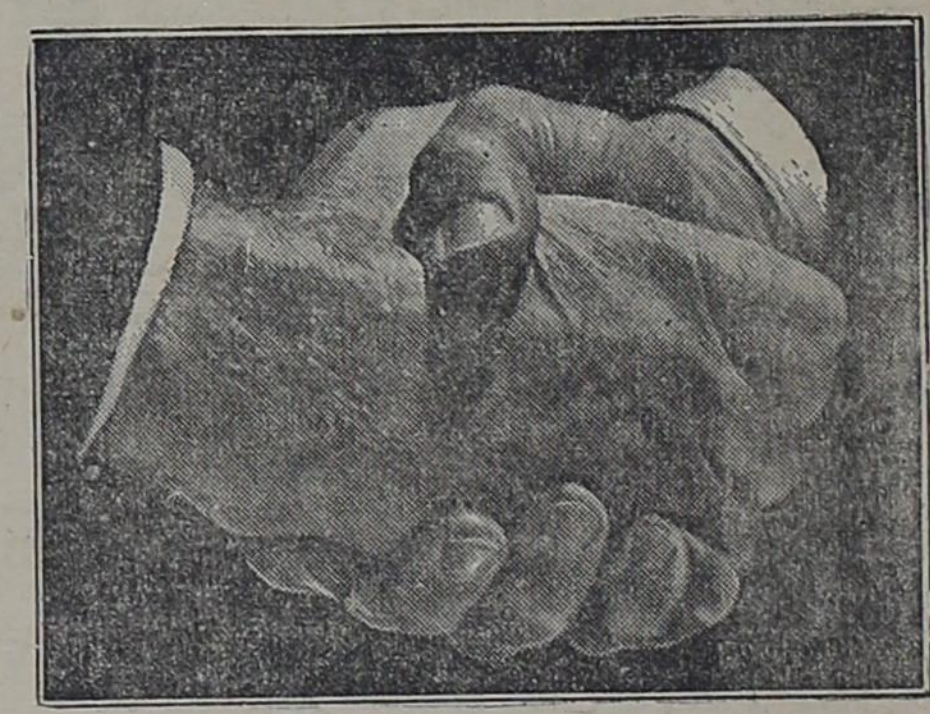

A FOREIGN POLICY FOR AMERICANS History of Our Foreign Policy, And Where Are We Heading?



BY SENATOR ROBERT A. TAIT CHAPTER 1

No one can think intelligently on the many complicated problems of American foreign policy unless he decides first what he considers the real purpose and object of that policy.

Fundamentally, I believe the ultimate purpose of our foreign policy must be to protect the liberty of the people of the United States. The American Revolution was fought to establish a nation "conceived in liberty." That liberty has enabled our people to increase steadily their material welfare and their spiritual freedom.

To achieve that liberty we have gone to war, and to protect it we would go to war again.

Only second to liberty is the maintenance of peace. The results of war may be almost as bad as the destruction of liberty and, in fact, may lead, even if the war is won, to something very close to the destruction of liberty at home.

Not Isolationism Our traditional policy of neutrality and non-interference with other nations was based on the principle that this policy was the best way to avoid disputes with other nations and to maintain the liberty of this country without war.

Moral Leadership There are a good many Americans who talk about an American century in which America will dominate the world. They rightly point out that the United States is so powerful today that we should assume a moral leadership in the world to solve all the troubles of mankind.

Theory of Preventive War I think we must recognize that this involves the theory of a preventive war, a dangerous undertaking at any time. Our Korean adventure shows the tremendous danger, if the new organization is badly organized or improperly supported by its members and by the public opinion of the world.

A Russian Threat The more recent measures for Marshall Plan aid on a global scale - and to the extent of billions of dollars of American taxpayers' money - and the Atlantic Pact arms program are and must be based on the theory that Russia today presents a real threat to the security of the United States.

Domestic Policy Vital Just as our nation can be destroyed by war it can also be destroyed by a political or economic policy at home which destroys liberty or breaks down the fiscal and economic structure of the United States.

Beyond Our Capacity Our foreign policy in ordinary times should not be primarily inspired by the motive of raising the standard of living of millions throughout the world, because that is utterly beyond our capacity.

Economic, Military Aid 2. We have had to adopt as a temporary measure the policy of extending economic and military aid to all those countries which, with the use of such aid, can perhaps prevent the extension of Russian military power or Russian or Communist influence.

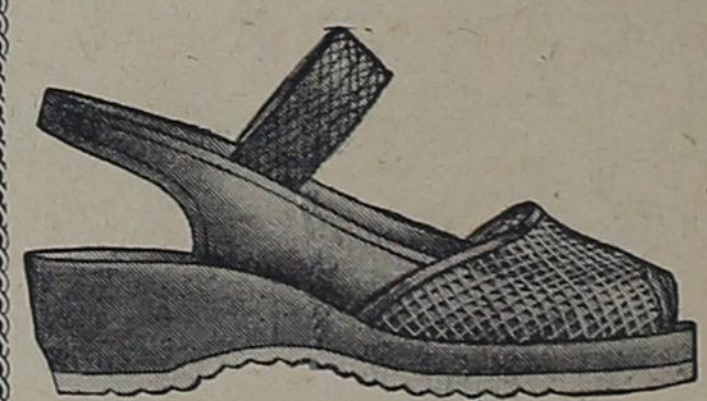


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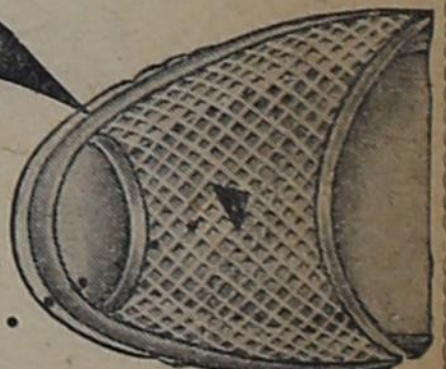


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
