As little as we think about it, Frank A Gray Memorial Park is one of the biggest assets we have in Gorman, and is some thing that every business man and citizen should be proud of. Few towns our size and not many larger ones have anything to compare with it. However, it being a civic project and non-profit making, we are inclined to say, "let the other fellow do the work" - or we just figure the committee in charge is taking care of everything and let it go at that. The committee in charge is doing the best it can under the circumstances. They keep the swimming pool and grounds in good shape. The road leading to the park is another proposition. Have you any suggestion as to how we might get this road repaired before time for the park to open this summer.

Anything compulsory is always inclined to make the public a bit skeptical. The new automobile inspection law is no exception. It has its good points in that a person will put off having their car checked which sometimes causes an unexpected accident.

It is only natural that the Motor Vehicle Inspection Station where you take your car will want to make the necessary repairs, if any. However, it is not required that you have them do the work. Your own mechanic can make what every repairs are necessary but you will be required to return to the Inspection Station for a final check up before receiving your stamp of approval. With the usual human suspicion, some people have the idea that these Stations may find flaws in parts just for the sake of making repairs. When you stop to think about it, there is only one inspection station in town and with the number of cars they will have to inspect and repair between now and the first of April they will not be interested in looking for extra work. Too, lots of parts and especially brake lining may become scarce as March 31st draws near.

PANTHERS SWEEP DOUBLE HEADER FROM DESDEMONA MEET SCRANTON IN SECOND CONFERENCE TILT FRIDAY

The Gorman boys and girls took two games from the Desdemona basketballers here Tuesday night. For the boys this marked the first district game. They will meet Scranton here Friday night in the second conference encounter.

The preliminary game between the two girls teams provided many thrills for the spectators as it was a hotly contested battle all the way. Gorman got a fast 9-2 lead which was short lived as Desdemona managed a rally which tied the two teams at 10-10. By halftime the visitors had pulled away to a 27-21 advantage. They held the lead until the final ninety seconds of the ball game when Joy Hallmark found the range from far out to make the score read Gorman 41 and Desdemona 40. Joy dropped in two more gratis shots to make the final score 43-40. Melba Brown, sophomore sharpshooter, played very constantly, scoring 14 points for runner-up honors in that department. High scorer for the evening was Frances Robertson, pantherette pivot player with a total of 16 tallies. Other players were Wanda Hart, Peggy West, Shirley Reed, and Mary Watson.

The boys defeated Desdemona by a score of 36-25. Big Leroy Kent led the tally making with 12 points. He was followed by Odell Gilmore with 8, Neal Gilbert with 6, Doyle Lynn Clark and Bob Love with 5 each. Halftime score was Gorman 18, Desdemona 15.

Friday night the Panthers tangled with a very potent Scranton outfit which is one of the favorites in the current district battle. They possess height, speed and balance according to reports and have to date a very good record in non-conference outings. The girls will play a preliminary game at 7:00 P. M. and the boys game will begin about 8:15. The games will be played here.

Polio Report For Eastland County '51

The Eastland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis spent \$7861.34 to assist a total of eight polio patients last year, it was revealed today by Joe Collins, Chapter Chairman.

Making public the 1951 financial report of Mrs. Ida Plummer, Chapter Chairman, Mrs. Plummer declared that services made possible through funds raised in the 1951 March of Dimes underlined the need for a successful 1952 drive.

The record of what has been done makes us all eager to continue and to expand this work as needed, he said. Unfortunately, even if we had no cases of infantile paralysis in our county in 1952, there remains much to be done for patients stricken in 1951 or before. Of the eight patients aided in 1951, one was an old case, seven new ones. The 11 of polio continues on into the next year or years.

The report showed that \$7861.34 was expended for hospitalization of polio patients whose families could not afford full cost of care themselves.

The Eastland County March of Dimes last year raised \$3779.04 of which 50 percent was retained for local services and 50 percent sent to national headquarters for its scientific research and professional education programs, as well as emergency aid to Chapters. The national office supplements local funds when high incidence wipes out local resources. During the year \$3250 was received in emergency aid by the Chapter, Mr. Collins said, and the Chapter begins 1952 with \$1323.00 in unpaid bills.

SELECTIVE SERVICE AR UNIVERSAL TRAINING WHICH SHALL IT BE

News commentators state that the second biggest issue for the new Congress now in session will be the struggle for and against Universal Military Training.

As far as the writer is concerned the United States has Universal Military Training under the Selective Service Act. The Selective Service Act has selected the best and some of the rest.

Technically speaking there is however, a difference. In a recent interview with a local resident and veteran who has many years of military experience described a plan of Universal Military Training which had been used with a student class following World War II. He termed the plan ideal but he regretted that the American people would not tolerate UMT. Hostilities had ceased; people could not see beyond the "then present peace". Nor could profiteers who clamored that the army camps be dismantled as they were for a "song" and resold at a "premium".

The graduates of the experiment class, the veteran said, were fine soldiers with their ideals unscarred. They had been trained by the best men the military afforded. While in training they were able to continue their school ambitions and associations with those of their choice. Theirs was not a force discipline but rather a prideful obedience.

They were not, he said, in an atmosphere of hard liquor, beer and profanity. They were not encouraged to forget the fine things parents and teachers had taught them. To sum it up they were not forced to fight a moral battle while training for military service.

Could America have failed her

young men in rebelling against Universal Military Service? The question is debatable. Soldiers would have been trained and the other countries would have known that America was prepared.

Preparedness has not kept aggressive nations out of war. America in her state of unpreparedness did not stay out of war. People who are against Universal Military because of moral or religious reason have three times found themselves shouting, "It's time for the United States to fight." There are exceptions to all rules of course. But religious people do often carry their religion into the support of wars.

HOBBY GROWING INTO A BUSINESS

The growing of pheasants as a hobby is growing into a business with Ben R. Townley. About a year ago he purchased several pheasants from Elbert Denton. Around about April they began to lay. By saving the eggs and setting them under cooperating hens Townley soon had a flock. He found that they were on their own as soon as they broke shell and that it took penning similar to hardware cloth to hold them. They are also he said very good on wing, taking a fence like a young turkey. He has their pens covered. The flesh of the birds are mostly breast and all white meat. It is difficult to tell the difference in taste of the pheasant and quail meat. The hens weigh about three pounds, the cocks weigh about four pounds. They are fed like turkeys. 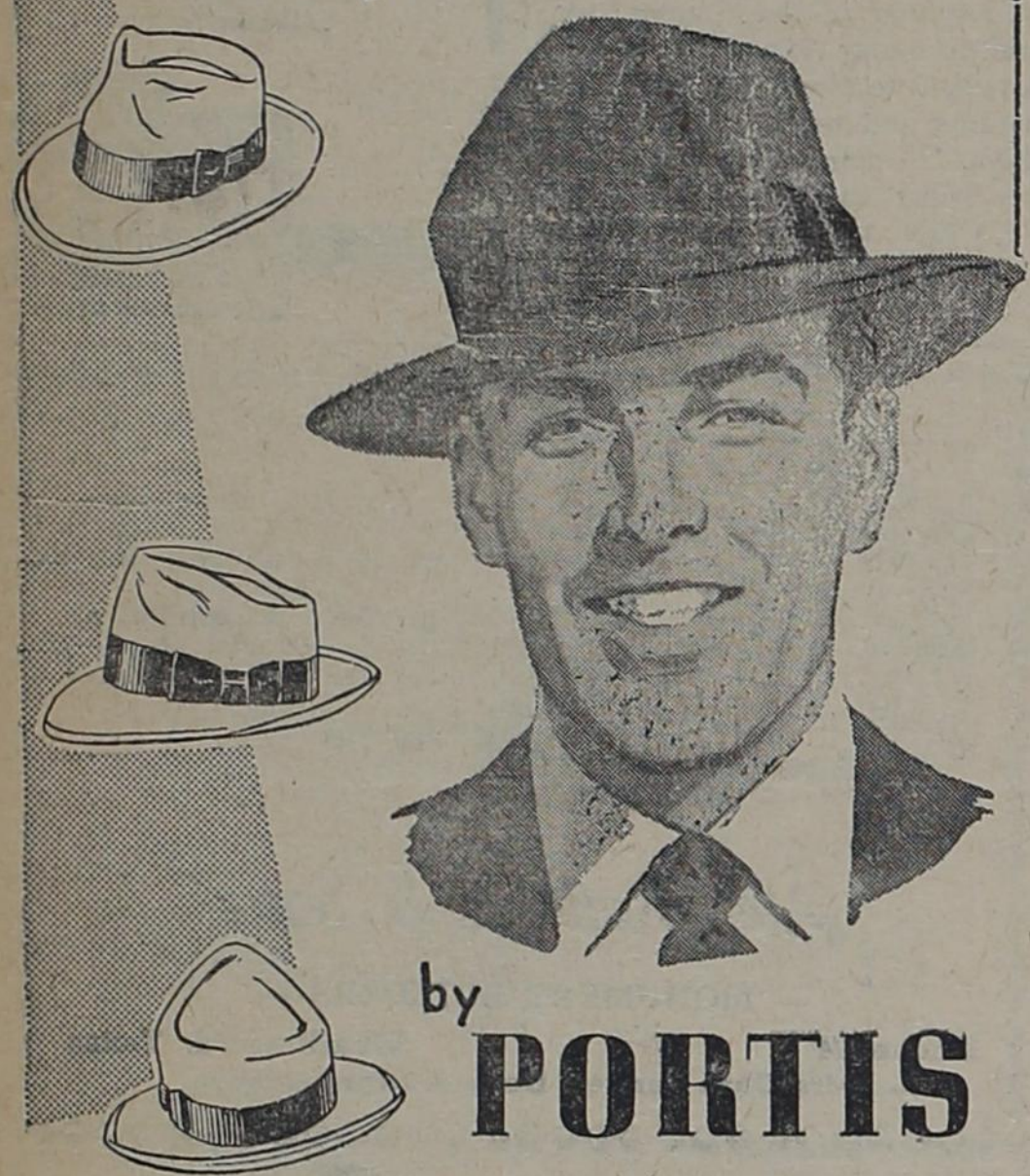
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
