STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY EXTENDS INSPECTION DEADLINE

Austin, January 15 - - Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the period for securing initial motor vehicle inspections in Texas has been officially extended until midnight, September 6, 1952. As originally specified, all vehicles would have been required to pass inspection before they could be registered on April 1st.

Garrison made the announcement following an opinion issued by the office of Attorney General Price Daniel which ruled that the Safety Department might legally extend the inspection date, and that no inspection certificate would be necessary for 1952 registration.

Director Garrison had pointed out in his request for a ruling by the Attorney General that it would be impossible to complete an inspection of the nearly 3 1/2 million vehicles in the State by April 1st.

Effect of the new action will mean, according to Garrison, that all motor vehicles in Texas must be inspected and bear an approved sticker prior to next September 7th. Following that, a second inspection will be required after September 7th but prior to April 1, 1953, before vehicles can be registered for 1953.

George W. Busby, Chief of the Department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, stated that he had, today issued the 100th license to official inspection stations. Another 1,500 are currently in the process of being approved.

Studebaker Is Car Of Beauty

The "Starliner," a five-passenger, hardtop convertible, is the pace car for Studebaker's 1952 models on display at Warren Motor Company at Eastland.

This newest body style by Studebaker is offered in both the Champion and Commander lines, and is available in eleven different two-tone color combinations and two upholstery options. The "Starliner" typifies, both outside and inside, the striking design and appointments of the company's entire series of new models.

Externally said Mr. Warren, the '52 Studebakers reveal entirely new front-end treatment and substantial re-styling in the rear. Hoods are longer and lower, with new emblems and ornaments.

The massive wrap-around bumpers are equipped with four vertical guards; two located under the headlamps, to protect the vehicle from the customary bumps encountered in day-to-day driving, and two smaller guards to protect the license plate from damage.

The most significant changes in the rear are found in the tail lights and trunk lid handles. The tail lights, which appear to be integral parts of the rear fenders rather than "added-on" assemblies, give the effect of extending the sweep of the fenders and thus a corresponding increase in body length. Their design, however, does not sacrifice any of the increased area of illumination which proved so popular on the '51 models.
