

Democratic Convent'n Resolves To Halt Centralizing Gov't.

Eastland County delegates to the State Democratic Convention held in San Antonio on May 27th report the largest crowd in history in attendance as well as a large gallery of spectators. Most of the delegates arrived in San Antonio on Sunday, May 25th and hearing were held all day Monday and far into the night on seating of all contested delegations. A formal protest had been registered with the Executive Committee on the Eastland delegation, however, no one appeared at the hearing and the delegates were seated. The delegates were: Mr W B Pickens, Eastland, Mr Pickering, Ranger, Miss Crawford, Cisco, Keith Whit, Gorman. Mr Jack Frost of Eastland, an alternate, served in the place of Mr Perry, Gorman, Texas, who could not attend. Virgil Seebury of Eastland served on the staff at the Convention and was in charge of issuing the badges. A caucus of the delegates of 17th Congressional District was held at 8:00 A M on the 27th, which was presided over by John Womble of Abilene and Lester Clark of Breckenridge. The Convention was formally opened at 10:30 A M and after some sparring temporary officers were elected. Maury Mave-rick, a former Congressman from San Antonio, and Mr Cofer, an attorney from Austin, then asked that all delegates be required to sign a pledge that they would vote for the nominee of the Democratic party, regardless of who was nominated. After this was voted down by a huge majority, "the loyalists took a walk." A caravan of buses had been hired in advance to carry the group across town to "La-Villita" where a hall had been hired. As this "hall" did not have a roof and as it was raining the crowd was thoroughly drenched. It was estimated that these delegates actually represented less than 20 percent of the total, however, they had a large crowd in the gallery as spectators and they followed with many boos and yells. Two or three rather uninteresting fist fights broke out as the crowd was leaving. Following this the Convention settled down to business, elected permanent officers, appointed committees, etc. Later in the afternoon, Governor Shivers arrived and addressed the Convention, criticizing President Truman for his stand on the tidelands and flayed the "loyalist" for walking out on the convention in an effort to force a rule of the majority. Governor Shivers received a great, standing ovation upon his entry and it was generally conceded that he had won a great

Both "Loyalists" and "Conservatives" will now go to Chicago and each group will endeavor to have its slate of delegates seated. The Conservatives will base their claim on the fact they have over 80 percent of the voters of the Precinct and County and State Conventions. The Loyalists claim will be that they have signed a pledge to support the Democratic nominee. Resolutions passed by the Conservatives were: (1) We reassert our belief that the Democratic Party of Texas is the best instrument through which to advance the best interests of our people and we confirm our intentions to seek the solution of our problems within the framework of the Democratic Party; (2) A halt in the trend towards centralized government; (3) Economy in Government, both civil and military; (4) Return of the tidelands to Texas; (5) Elimination of the Washington grafter and influence peddler; (6) Opposition to special interests and minority groups; (7) Opposed the FEPC and civil rights legislation; (8) Flayed Communist aggression from without and infiltration from within; (9) Opposed weakening or repeal of the labor-management relations act; (10) Demanded that the President remain subject to the Constitution; (11) Reassumed obligation to "our fighting men and their families"; and (12) Called for nomination of a president and vice-president who are strong men, who cannot be bought and who will follow the ancient landmarks of our historic Democratic faith.

Crazy Like A Fox

Those with a vested interest in Big Government and even bigger appropriations at the taxpayers' expense have been telling farmers that the Farm Bureau is not their friend - that it is working against their best interests. Let's Look at some facts and then you be the judge. The Federal Budget for the fiscal year 1952 is \$5.5 billion dollars. That sum amounts to \$538 each for every man, woman and child in the U. S. That is a tax burden or a future mortgage in one year averaging \$2152 for each family of four. Farm Bureau leaders are convinced, along with others, that at least Ten Billion in "fat" can be trimmed from that budget without damage to the defense effort or any really essential government service. A cut of \$10 billion would lighten the tax burden or lessen the future mortgage about \$253 on an average for each family of four people. That is a lot more than the average value of some of the so-called "benefits" farmers are now receiving. Farm Bureau leaders have said that farmers should be willing to accept a cut of \$200 million in direct subsidy payments and other services to farmers that they might come into court with clean hands when they demand that the other fellow be cut also. The recommended cut of \$156.5 million in direct subsidy payments to farmers is \$29.06 per farm. This plus other recommended cuts brings the total average cut to \$37.15 per farm. Would you pass up a tax reduction of \$253 in order to hold on to benefits which at most average no more than \$37.15 per good? If so, you wouldn't be very good at horse trading. That is being content with the buttons while the other fellow runs off with the shirt. Some people have the mistaken notion that big corporations pay most of the taxes. True their tax bills are enormous, but from what source do they get their funds? From their customers of course. Almost one-third of the selling price of a new car, for example, travels in one way or another into the itching palm of the tax collector. Communist leaders know that the easiest way to destroy our nation is by forcing us into bankruptcy. With our ever mounting national debt - staying in the red year after year, we are carrying out their wishes. Any intelligent farmer would know that debt piled on top of debt eventually brings ruin - to a farmer or to a nation. Yet they still say that Farm Bureau is working against the farmers' best interest. They say Farm Bureau leaders - county state and national are Crazy. May be so. But if so, they are Crazy like a Fox. - Virginia Farm Bureau News

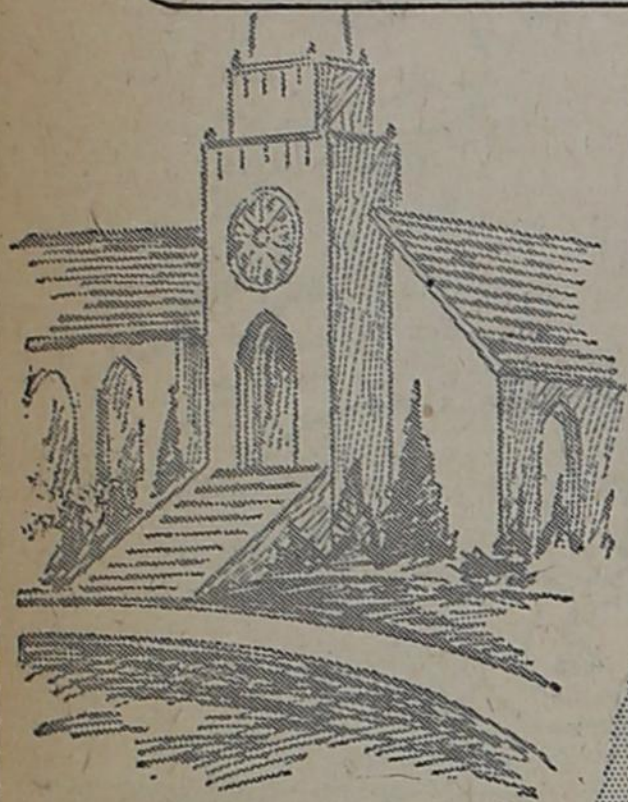
