The Gorman Panthers remained in the loss column Friday night when they traveled to Ranger to play the Bulldogs. The game was close at halftime (10-6) but the Bulldogs pulled away for a 30 to 6 victory to thrill their homecoming fans.

Ranger hit the scoreboard on their second possession when Kyle Davis ran in for the touchdown from one yard out with 9:15 left in the initial period. The touchdown followed a Panther fumble on the Gorman 10. After runs of 7 and 2 yards, Davis got the score. Juan Pantoja booted the point after and Ranger led 7-0.

But the Panthers wasted little time in answering the Ranger score when they took the ball on their own 27 and Jeremy Bryan hit up the middle, broke free and raced 73 yards for the score with 8:51 left in the period. The kick for point failed and the score was 7-6.

Ranger started a drive late in the first period on the Gorman 42 following a blocked punt and scored with 11:14 left in the half after being held on defense at the Gorman 10. Juan Pantoja booted a 27 yard field goal for the 3 points to make the score 10-6. This was the score at halftime.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band thrilled the fans with a very good performance, then relinquished the field for the homecoming activities for Ranger.

Ranger blocked another Panther punt in the third period and covered the ball on the Gorman 13. Following a one yard loss, a pass for 6 yards, and a no-gainer, Pantoja again kicked a field goal of 25 yards with 3:57 left in the third to make the score 20 to 6.

The Bulldogs got another drive going from their own 37 and moved the distance in 6 plays with Kyle Davis getting the honors from 14 yards out with 11:39 left in the game. The drive featured pass plays of 17 to McClain on a screen play and a 25 yard pass to Ruben Mankin. Pantoja booted the point after and Ranger led 27 to 6.

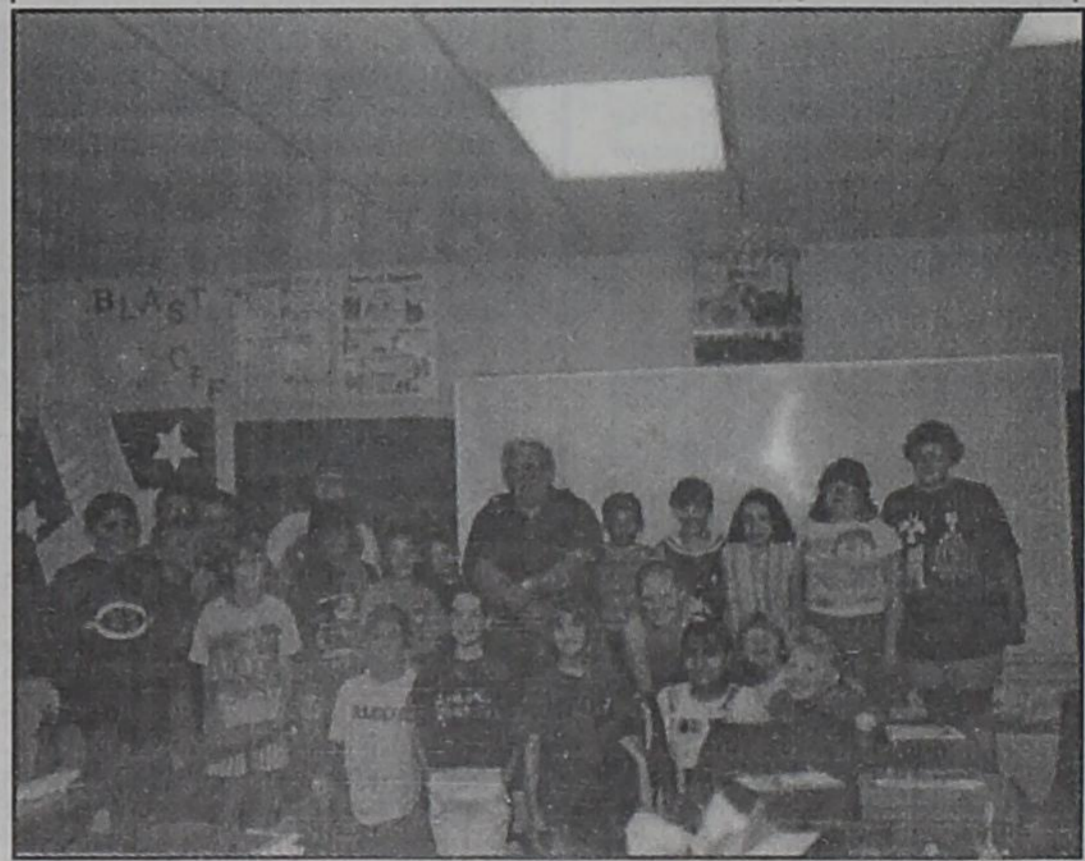
Parents Night Friday

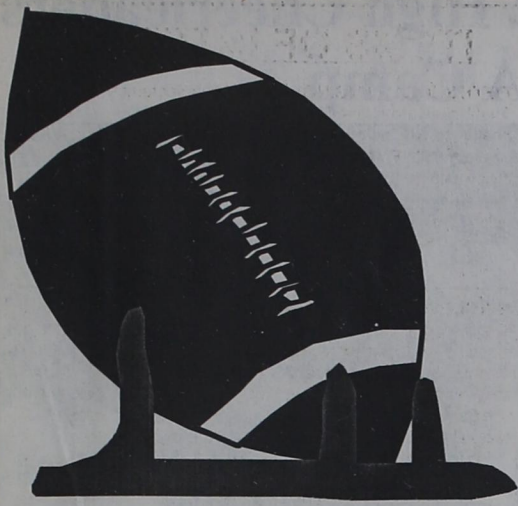

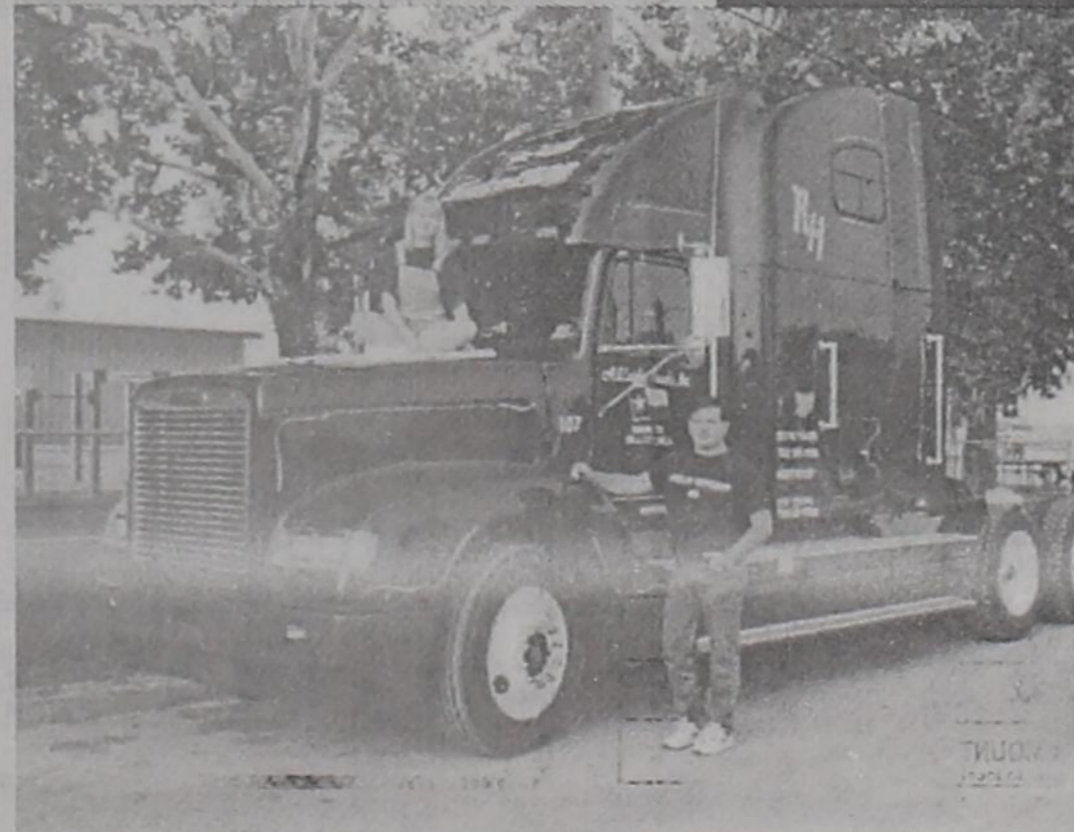
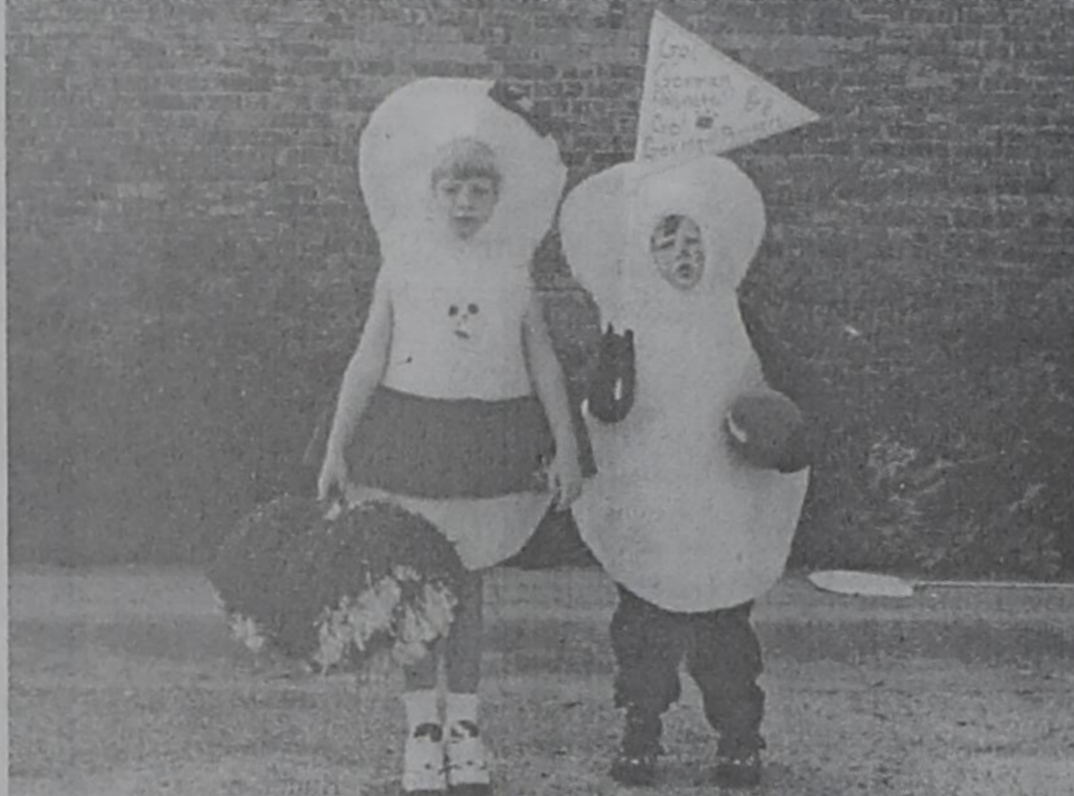
