EARTHQUAKES DESTROY IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

Mr W D Smith has received word through a friend, Card Clonts of Bakersfield, California, giving first hand reports of the July quakes.

Houses were lifted a foot high given a good shaking and set askew on foundations. The earth cracked the length of half mile to a width of three feet. A crack four inches wide was 40 miles long. The ground dropped five foot in some places.

The farmers, Clonts believed, got the worst deal. Their underground cement water lines were mashed together by rising and falling of the ground. The only means of irrigation now possible is the sprinkler system for which few of them are prepared.

Worst damage to buildings came to the public buildings. Which would be the larger buildings.

Train tunnels were closed by the earths movement and shortened, discontinuing train service. Geologists claim that a 300-foot mountain moved from six to eight feet.

DUBLIN RODEO TO FEATURE ROY ROGERS LIBERTY ACT

Dublin, Aug. 7 - The Roy Rogers Liberty Act, featuring beautifully matched Palomino horses, will be one of the highlights of the 1952 Pre-Madison Square Garden Rodeo to be staged in Dublin, Texas, nightly Wednesday through Saturday, August 27-28-29-30.

The act is one of the most outstanding liberty horse acts in the world today. The horses are trained and presented by Glenn Randall, trainer of the internationally famous Trigger. Among their many precision drills in a 38-foot diameter ring are such features as the ring-curb march; the old fashioned horse waltz; two, four and eight-horse wheel; and finally the grand finale of the Liberty Act.

Satin, the lead horse of the Liberty Act, whose keen intelligence inspires the other horses to perform, is continually heckled by the "ham" act of Elmer. Elmer has the habit of trying to steal the show by just doing half the things he should, when Randall's back is turned.

Dublin's World's Championship Rodeo is now in its 13th year. Everett Colborn, who produces the rodeo, lives in Dublin. His famous Lightning C Ranch is the source of the meanest and toughest stock for the biggest rodeos in America. In addition to his New York show in Madison Square Garden, and the World's Championship Rodeo in Dublin, Colborn also directs rodeos in Houston, San Antonio, Midland, San Angelo, Sweetwater, and Gatesville, Texas. In addition he stages events in Carlsbad, N. M., Selma, Ala., Boston, Mass., Ardmore, Okla., and Fort Madison, Iowa. Dublin is the headquarters of the rodeo corporation.

Just before Colborn takes his troupe of cowboys, cowgirls, sponsors and special performers and the rodeo stock and equipment to New York he stages the biggest rodeo of them all - in his home town of Dublin. Advance ticket sales are made to people from almost every state in the union.

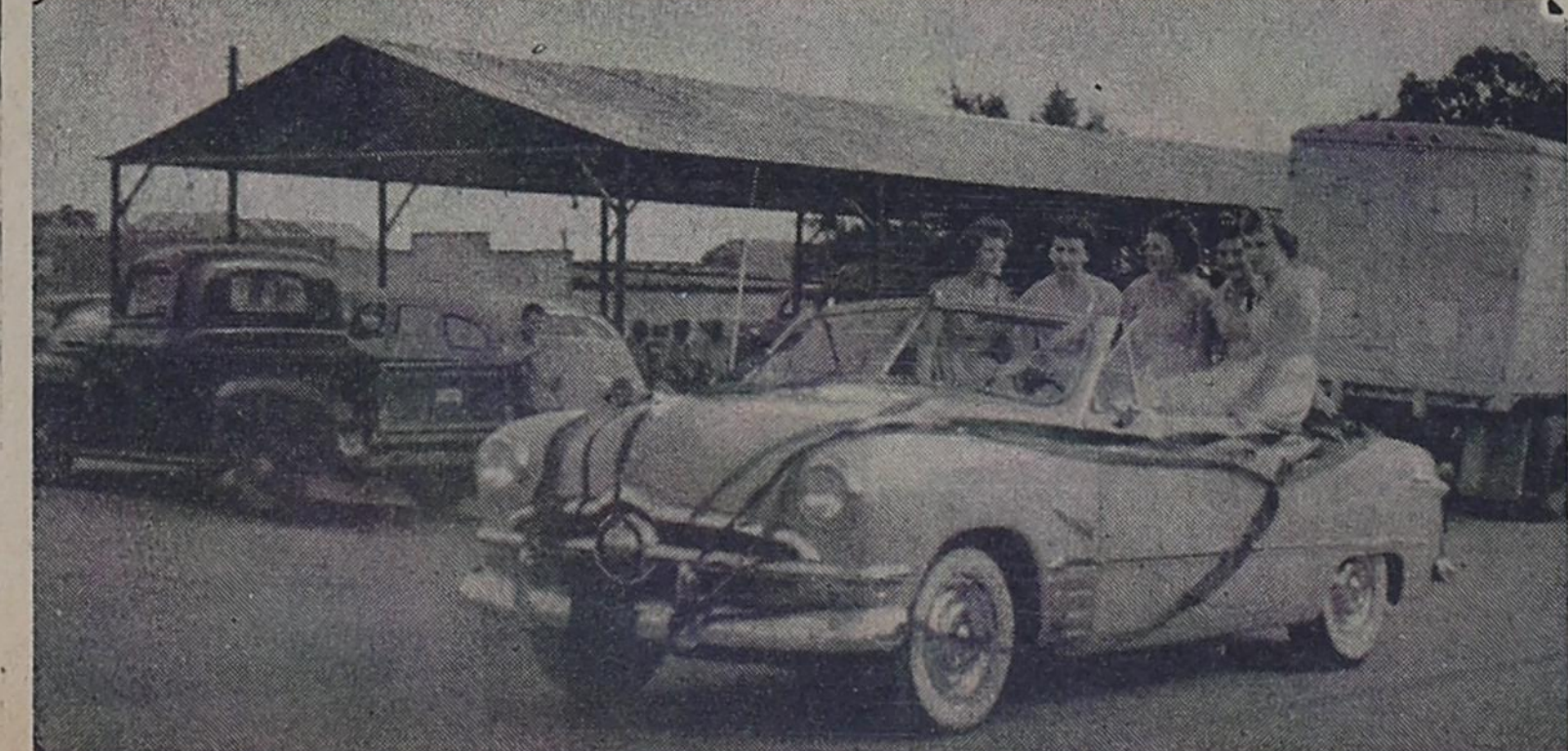
Albert Westmorelands Living in Lubbock

IT'S LITTLE WONDER that Saint Nick is especially generous to the American people. History proves that the Americans have done a lot for Saint Nick!

They have given him a new name, a new face and figure, and a new means of transportation.

The original European version of Saint Nick pictured him as a tall angular man who rode on a bony gray mare. Both the horse and Saint Nick looked as if they hadn't had a good meal in some time.

The early English settlers in this country started giving Saint Nicholas his "New Look." The English children adopted the legendary Christmas figure from the Dutch, but the English children had trouble pronouncing "Saint Nickolous." Somehow the name changed to "Santa Kalouf," and finally it was corrupted to "Santa Claus."

However, this was only the beginning. In 1809 Washington Irving, in his "Knickerbocker's History of New York," wrote of the Saint as the guardian of New York City. Irving described Saint Nick as a jolly fellow with a broad-brimmed hat and huge breeches. He taught Saint Nick to smoke a long pipe, and, in the story, replaced his shuffling hay-burner with a trim wagon.

A short time later, Saint Nicholas' transportation was aided by Clement Moore in his famous poem, "The Visit from Saint Nicholas," written in 1822. Moore, a professor of divinity in a New York theological seminary, gave Saint Nick a sleigh, twinkling eyes, cheeks like roses, nose like a cherry, and a round little belly.

Today's Santa Claus is by no means streamlined, but he is a far cry from the lean, ascetic, somberly dressed fellow who, for centuries, on Christmas Eve, guided his mare through the streets of Europe.

Cedars of Lebanon
Are Well Protected
By Religion, Law

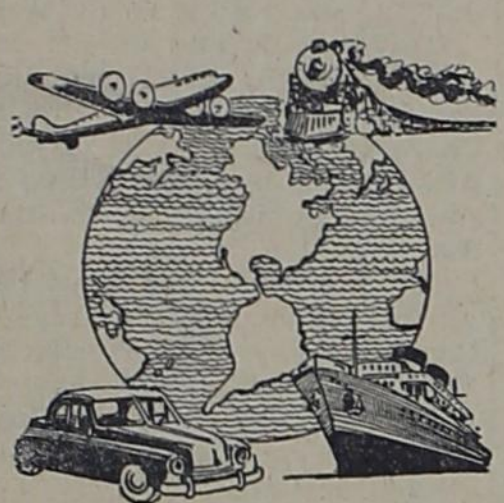
On a shelf-like plateau, 600 feet above the Mediterranean, the world's oldest Christmas trees stand where they have stood for centuries. The cedars of Lebanon, 400 of them, are protected by religion and law from harm at the hands of either the Moslems or the Maronite Christians.

The magnificent trees "that sing of the nativity" were venerated as monarchs among trees long before Judah had her first king. Some of them have a girth of 40 feet and a branch circumference of 300.

In the days of the conquerors thousands of conscripted Hebrew workers were sent into the Lebanon to take to Jerusalem "cedar trees without number"; the result of one of the first building contracts, between Hiram of Phoenicia and King Solomon.

Today, however, the trees are protected by law and the department of agriculture of the government sponsors the planting of seedlings, so that the giant cedars will grow forever.

MOURNING DOVES

OPEN SEASON - NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 10, both days, inclusive. Shooting hours, 12 o'clock noon to sunset.

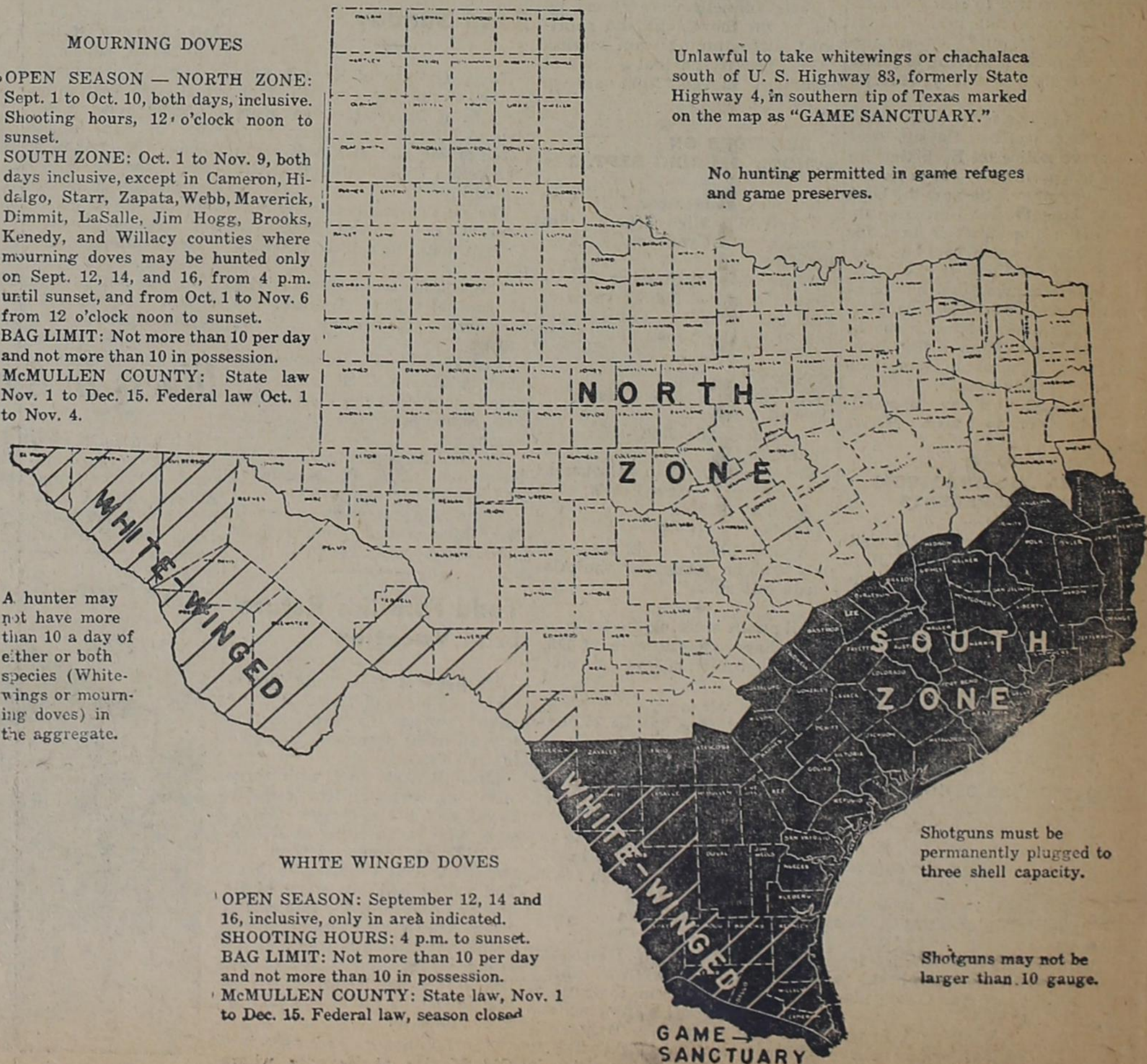
SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 1 to Nov. 9, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 12, 14, and 16, from 4 p.m. until sunset, and from Oct. 1 to Nov. 6 from 12 o'clock noon to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law Oct. 1 to Nov. 4.

Unlawful to take whitewings or chachalaca south of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas marked on the map as "GAME SANCTUARY."

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.



A hunter may not have more than 10 a day of either or both species (White-wings or mourning doves) in the aggregate.

WHITE WINGED DOVES

My friends have wanted to run articles in the papers in my behalf, and I deeply appreciate their attitude, but I do not want my name implicated with any articles that would reflect dis-honor upon myself or my opponent. I am proud of my record, which has no blemishes.

To the people who stood behind me in the first primary and the ones who did not see fit to vote for me the first time, I earnestly solicit your support on August 23. If I am elected your County Clerk, I promise to serve you in an honest, faithful, and impartial manner.

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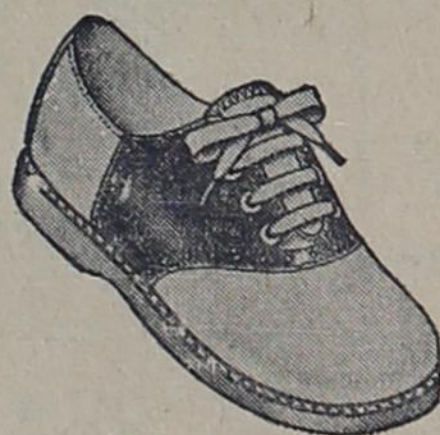
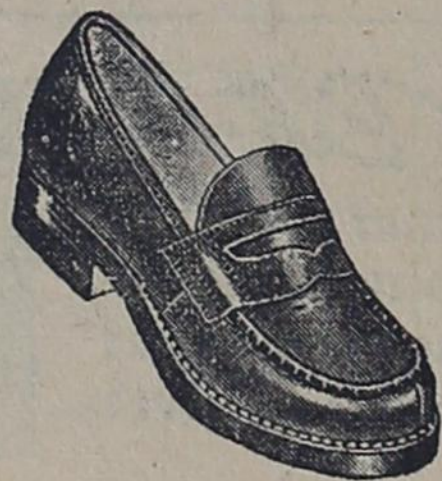
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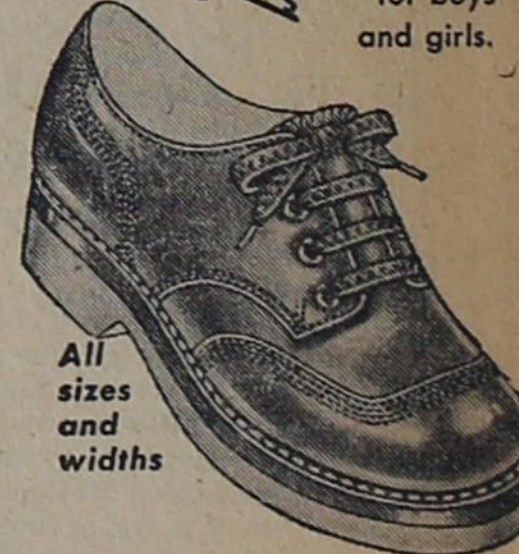
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
