Doyle Mauney Rites Held Monday COUNTY AND CITY PAY TRIBUTE AT LAST RITES

Friends and service men from Eastland County and the city of Gorman gathered with the family of Truman Doyle Mauney attending the last rites of the war hero at the First Baptist Church on Monday afternoon at 3 P. M.

The tribute of their presence began on Sunday when more than forty veterans of the two World Wars met the military escort with his charge at the railroad station. A number of the veterans joined the cortage bringing the sailor home.

Rev John Ivy of Fort Worth, friend of Doyle's parents, Mr and Mrs S M Mauney, and a veteran conducted the ceremony. On request of Mr and Mrs Mauney, Rev Ivy read a letter from Doyle's Commanding Officer expressing his tender regard for Doyle and offering condolence with the statement that it was a comfort to know that, "all men who died in the crash August 8 were Christians." There were 13 men aboard the plane.

Doyle was born on January 3, 1925, in Stephens County. He was schooled in Gorman and had lived in the Gorman area most of his life prior to entering the service in World War II. He had re-enlisted at the beginning of the War in Korea.

Surviving the deceased, other than his parents, are four sisters, Mrs D Park of De Leon, Mrs Bob Huff of Ranger, Georgie Mauney and Wanda Mauney of Gorman and one brother, Charles Mauney of Gorman, and his grandmother, Mrs D L Malne of De Leon.

Military rites in charge of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Eastland were held at the graveside where interment was made at the De Leon Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Zollie Skaggs, Burl Lutz, Ray Buntin, Billy Joe McCrum, John Warren, Gaylon Warren, Norman Park, and Edsylv Lightfoot. Six men were in the Navy Blue and two wore kahaki.

All business houses closed for the hour of the funeral.

The Gorman Panthers entertain Baird's Bears here this week in their third district outing of the year. The Panthers have now won one and lost one district game. They won the opener from Strawn by a 26-6 score and lost last week to a powerful Clyde team in the last few seconds by a 19-13 score.

The two teams played on even terms throughout the first two quarters at Clyde. The Bulldogs, however, managed to gain six points with about a minute to go before half-time on a long pass play. The Panthers came back after the half to move 70 yards on a sustained drive which resulted in a touchdown when Billy Whitlock drove the final two yards into the end zone. Whitlock again broke away in the 4th quarter to score on a run of 40 yards behind beautiful blocking. From here it seemed the game would end in a 13-13 deadlock, but a fumble in the Gorman backfield gave the Bulldogs possession on the Panther 25 yard line. A 15 yard penalty against the local boys placed the ball on the 10 yard stripe from which point Clyde pushed across its final tally.

The Baird Bears, who invade town Friday night, are coached by Charles "Putt" Brandon and boast one of the heaviest lines the Panthers will meet this year. The Bears run from the T formation featuring the running of Paul Jones, George Jones, and big Jim Higgins. This team lost its season opener to Albany of class 2A. They beat Cross Plains in their second encounter by a score of 8-0, and last week were upset by a surprising Moran eleven 19-9 on the latter's home field.

The Panthers are still bothered with injuries as Robert Rankin has failed to respond to treatment so far. Jimmy Rachel, quarterback and passer, has been out of pads this week because of a virus infection, but is expected to be ready by Friday.

Co-Captains Ronald Jackson and Jerry Skaggs turned in excellent performances at Clyde last week and are expected to again be thorns in the side of the Bears this week. Don Joiner, LaDoyt Maupin, Don Mauney, Jim Self, Freddy Welch, Roland Jones, Jimmy Rodgers, E J Grisham, Billy Whitlock, Jimmy Rachel, and Paul Robertson were others who took part in the contest, all of whom played very creditably.

Game time Friday is 8:00 P M. A big crowd of Baird fans is expected to follow their team here for the game. This Baird eleven was the No. 1 choice in pre-season polls to win the district and they still retain hope after last week's defeat. The Gorman boys, on the other hand, will be fighting with their all to keep their title hopes alive.

MRS. BLAIR PRESENTS "STATUS OF WOMEN" MRS. KIMBLE RECOLLECTS

On Monday afternoon at the regular meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Mrs G C Acrea, president, gave the devotional, "What Think You of Jesus?"

Mrs Marvin Blair as leader of the program and Chairman of the Status of Women discussed the work of the chairman and her committee.

The purpose of the office she stated is to find out the abilities of church women, to discover where each has "arrived" mentally, morally and spiritually; and having found what individuals can do the committee working with the society should provide opportunity for service.

Mrs Blair stated that some women do not make their talents known because of timidity and others because they do not know of the need.

As a resulting activity of the program the Status of Women's Committee will make a survey among the 115 women who are members of the Methodist Church.

In concluding the program Mrs Kimble reviewed the years when women were not allowed to serve the Methodist Church in official capacity. She stated that women were first allowed to be stewards following 1918 conference at which time she and Mrs T F Morrow were elected members of the board.

Looking backward through the 67 years of membership in the local church Mrs Kimble told how she kept church records for 52 years. She said that Brother Canifane of Eastland nominated her husband, the late Dr. E W Kimble, church clerk or recorder following his election the reverend told Mr Kimble, "you hold the title but your wife will keep the records."

The records she said were kept for 20 years by her when the doctor was again nominated. But the nominating committee had underestimated the wife for "Were not women now allowed to hold office in the Methodist Church?" She let the conference know that she was through keeping the doctor's records.

In consequence the wife was also nominated. Mrs Kimble, completing her talk to the society, gave an emphatic nod with, "And I beat him."

She continued to keep records for 32 years.
