A L BUTLER DIES FROM INJURIES SUFFERED IN FALL

Albert Lee Butler, known as "Ab" to his many friends, died at the Blackwell Rodgers Sanitarium, Thursday, Sept. 11, from injuries he suffered when a falling scaffold dropped his body to the pavement. Mr Butler was being assisted by Dee High of Eastland in painting a new sign for the Frossard Department Store when the accident occurred.

Mr High was also critically injured in the fall. He was taken to Abilene to a bone specialist on Sunday.

Mr Butler was for a number of years Gorman's sign painter, having set up shop at the site of the Gorman Machine Shop, formerly the Shell Garage, during the oil boom. Since losing part of his vision about three years ago he has used Mr High on lettering.

Born in Arkansas on July 3rd, 1889 Mr Butler came to Sipe Spring at an early age, where following the death of his father he became the breadwinner for the family. He had helped to build the homestead which still stands.

In 1910 he came to Gorman where he began working for S M Bennett at the Bennett Barber Shop, which was at that time a frame building on the present site of the Butler Beauty Shop. On May 21st, 1911 he was married to the daughter of Mr Bennett, Miss Florence Bennett. Soon after his marriage both he and his wife joined the First Baptist Church.

Interested in stock since childhood he soon acquired a stock farm. His hobby of recent years has been raising and training race horses. He has attended many races over the state and has entered his horse in several of them.

Last rites for Mr Butler were held Friday at the First Baptist Church with Rev Tom Small assisted by Rev J F Pleasants officiating. Interment was made at the Gorman Cemetery.

PANTHERS - GREYHOUNDS

FRIDAY NITE - Brogdon Field

The victory-hungry Gorman Panthers tangle with Strawn at 8:00 P M Friday in the curtain raiser for both teams in District 8B. The Panthers were subdued last week by Meridian in the first four minutes of the first quarter as the Yellow Jackets ripped through for two first period touchdowns. Gorman managed to hold their own following this and Robert Rankin churned and twisted his way for 70 yards in the third quarter to put the Panthers back in the running. However, the tying score never came and the game ended 13-6 in favor of the opponents.

Jerry Skaggs and Roland Jones were impressive on defense during the last half of the game, as were Jimmy Rodgers, Robert Rankin, and LaDoyt Maupin. Ronald Jackson was forced to leave the game in the third quarter with a badly bruised knee and has been out of pads so far this week. However, the leg is showing much improvement and he is expected to be ready soon.

Interest now centers around the approaching game on Friday. This one goes into the district record book as the Panthers will realize. Spirit is running high at Brogdon Field this week and the Greyhounds are expected to have their hands full on Friday night. Max Pierce, freshman half back, has looked exceptionally good in his ball-toting duties this week and is pressing hard for a starting backfield assignment. Pierce is a new student in the high school and he formerly played grade school ball at Albany. LaDoyt Maupin has also been in the spotlight for his heads-up defensive work. He looked especially good against Eastland in a long two hour scrimmage Tuesday.

The local eleven will hold a weight advantage of some eight to ten pounds per man this week. Strawn came out on the short

end of a 33-0 score at the hands of a powerful Hico team last week. They do, however, possess a dangerous combination in the overhead game. Quarterback, L Pruitt, is an accurate passer and has two good receivers in ends, James Pruitt and M Turner. The Greyhounds run from the T formation with a backfield combination of L Pruitt at QB, E Morris and J Flynn at halfbacks, and T Gordon at fullback. It is reported that the aerial game is their favorite type of offense with much more passing than usual.

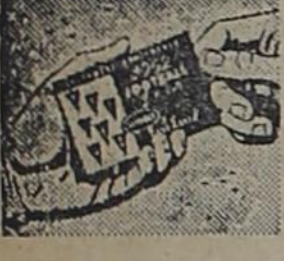

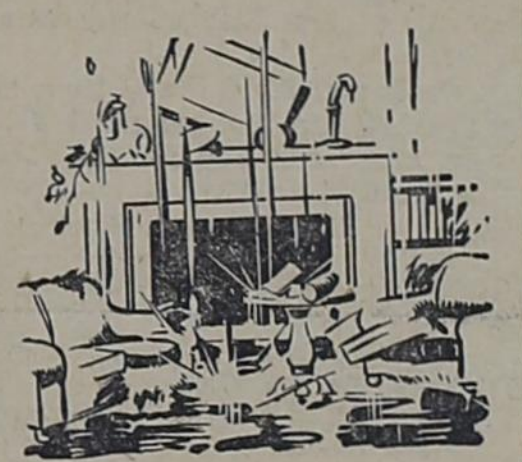
