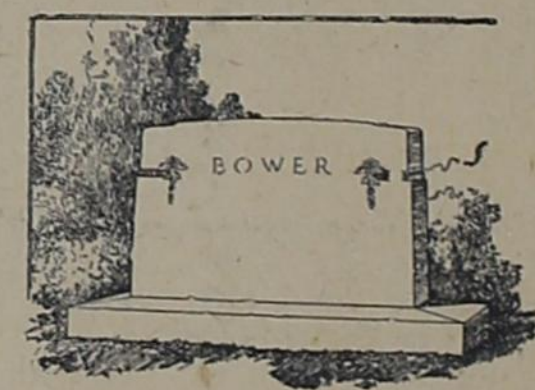

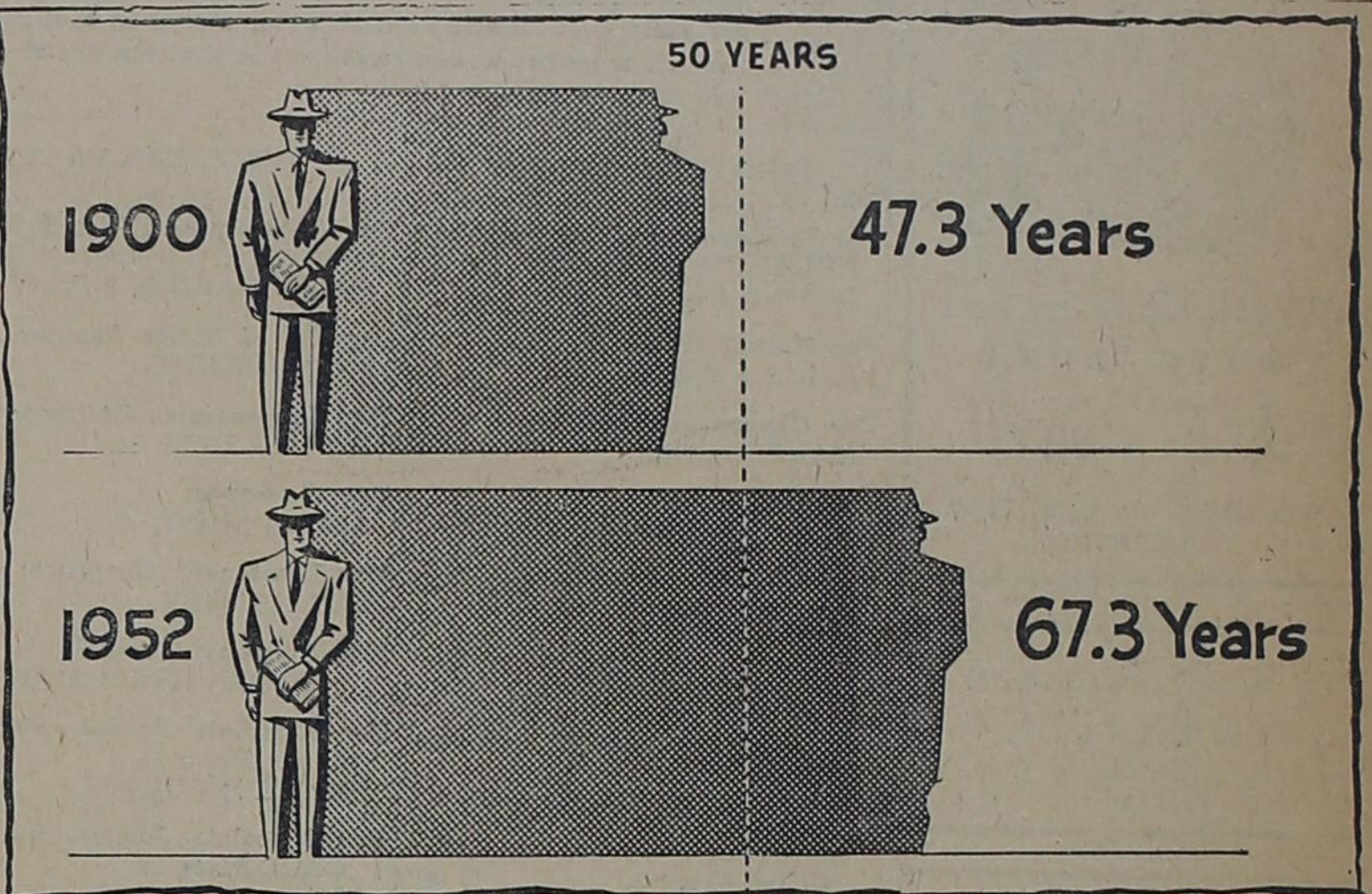

years. During these years she taught in many leadership training schools and in laboratory schools in all parts of the country, administered scores of conferences, and did a vast amount of field work of every sort, as well as doing the ver-all planning for the department, serving as executive secretary of the Council's Committee on the Religious Education of Children. She also served as one of the two representatives of the Council on the Federal Council's Commission on World Peace, and prepared the materials for children in this field.

The International Council carried out an experiment of radio programs for children in the field of religious education, and when it secured time over the Chicago NBC station for three months of experimental programs, Miss Jones was given responsibility for preparing the

script and working with the station in producing the program. Miss Jones has written four books which have been used in the leadership education program: The Church and the Children, Training Juniors in Worship, The Faith of Our Children, and the one published last year, Guiding Children in Christian Growth.

When need was felt for books for children in the field of religion by Rand McNally & Co., she was asked to do several books for their ten cent series, Prayers for Little Children, My Own Book of Prayers, The Bible Story of Creation, Old Testament Stories, Stories of the Christ Child, The Ten Commandments, and Bible Stories for Little Children were written for this series. These reached many homes which had no contact with churches. "In some ways", she says, "this is one of the most satisfying pieces of work I have ever done."

Larger, higher-priced books were also in demand, and Rand McNally decided to publish the next title which she did for them in larger format, with better art work. Tell Me About God, Tell Me About Jesus, Tell Me About the Bible, and Tell Me About Prayer were published. The first two of these titles have been translated into Japanese, Spanish, German, Turkish, and two East Indian languages.

Five years ago she was asked to go to Rand McNally & Co. as Children's Book Editor. Last year Rand McNally won the Newbery Medal, awarded by the American Library Association for "the most distinguished contribution to Children's literature."

Miss Jones was asked to have a part in the last two White House Conferences, representing the churches. She has taught as visiting professor for one or more terms at Northwestern University, Iliff School of Theology, Garrett Biblical Institute, and Yale Divinity School.

Miss Jones was elected on December 15, 1950, by the Executive Committee of the Board of Education of the Methodist Church as Director of the Department of Christian Education of Children. She is making a tour of the Texas Methodist Conferences and will be in Fort Worth October 29, 2 to 5 o'clock at the First Methodist Church; in Rising Star October 30, 2 to 5 o'clock at the Methodist Church; and in Waco October 31, 2 to 5 o'clock at Austin Avenue Methodist Church, speaking on the subject: Let The Bible Speak To Children.

These meetings are being planned and conducted by Rev Wm H Cole, Executive Secretary and Mrs Cole, Director of Children's Work, Central Texas Conference. They are ably assisted by the District Superintendents and the District Directors of Children's Work of the ten districts, Messrs: C J Gordon, Coleman; A C Tipton, Cisco; H Harville, Cleburne; Milton Slayden, Frost; W C Cross, Ft Worth; Ira Moore, Hamilton; W C Wedemeyer, Georgetown; B R Brownfield, Waco; Robert Walker, Mansfield; and Carl Alexander, Weatherford.

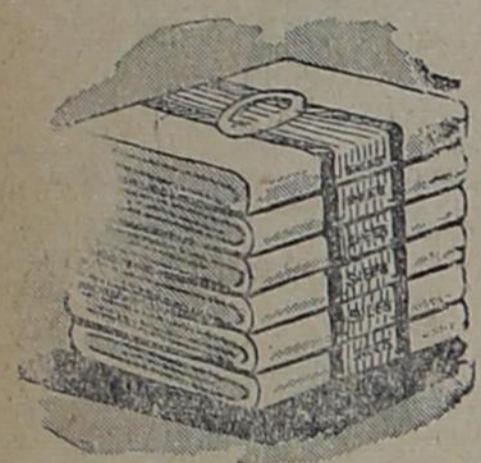

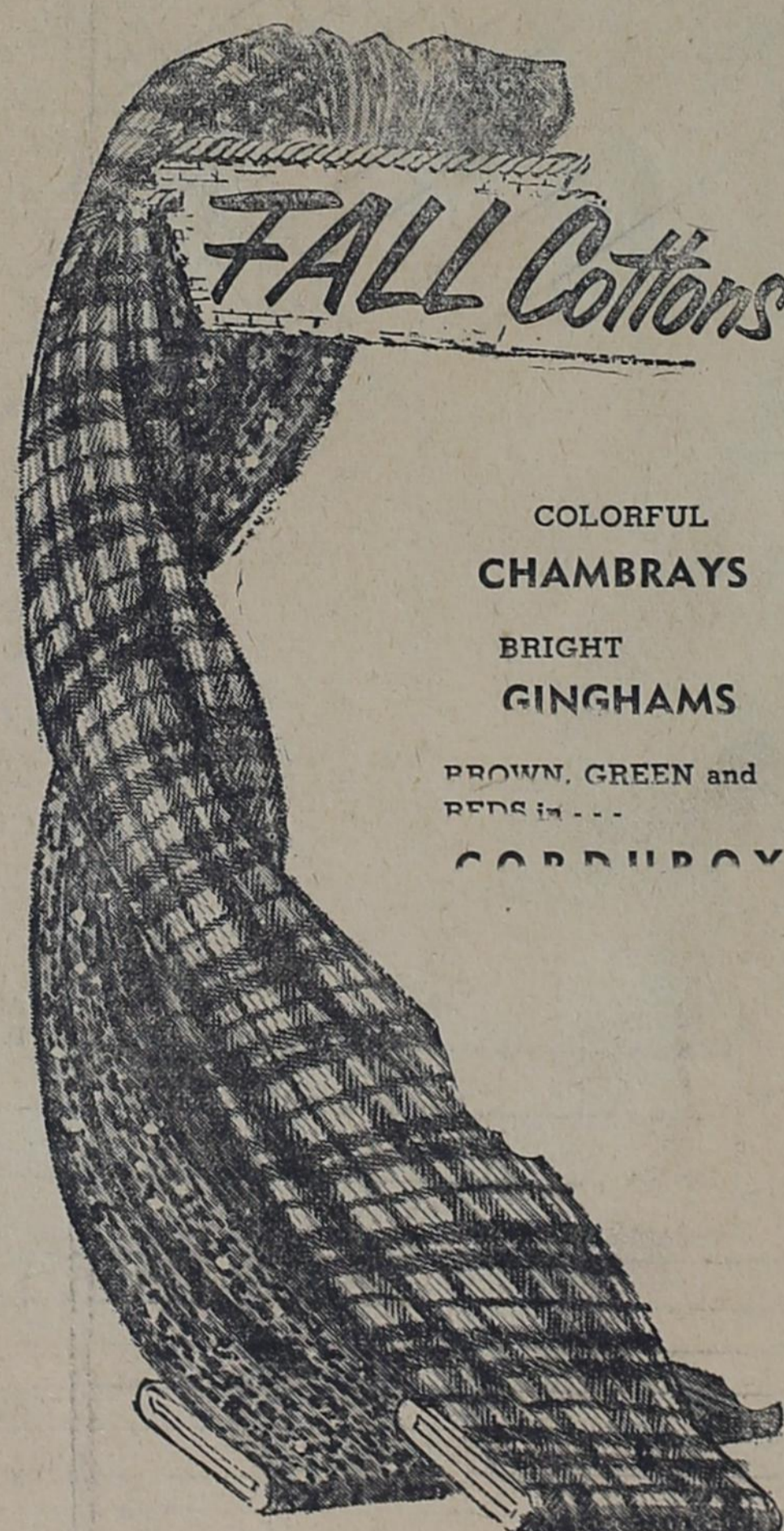

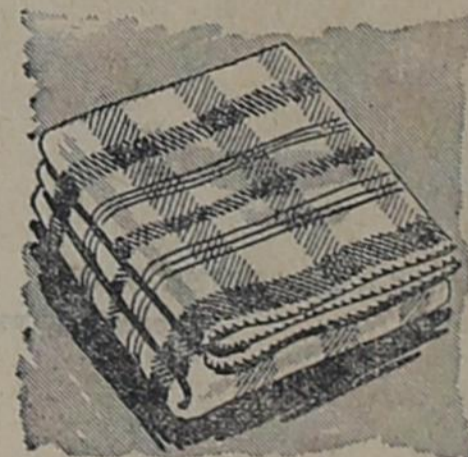
