When one would hear about the other being promoted it wouldn't be long before he would be of equal rank or top him. Occasion ally they address a note to "Pop" which makes me feel rather proud and chesty.

I don't want to give our Volunteer Firemen the big head but they deserve plenty of credit. At their meeting last Thursday night they took money out of their own pocket to hire a man to paint the Fire Hall. The city is furnishing the paint.

Tuesday, November 25th, a Mobile Unit of the Blood Bank will be in Eastland. Once more folks in this area will have an opportunity to give blood for the boys in the Armed Forces. If you don't think you have time to go - just mull this thought over. "Wouldn't it be terrible to have to live the rest of our lives if we suddenly learned that one of our boys died because we failed to give a pint of blood?" Think it over. There will be a caravan leaving Gorman on the 25th. Definite time and meeting place will be announced next week. Plan now to be one of the donors.

Always enjoy letters from you folks - with the political situation well in hand we can go back to normal living again.

Dear Gene:  
I was transferred here in the early fall with part of my football team from San Marcos. I have 16 Texas boys on my team here. So far we are doing O K having won 7 games and lost none. Won from Illinois Normal 32-20. Central State Normal 18 to 13. Memphis Naval Air 26-6. Washington Univ. (St Louis Practice) 35-13. Great Lakes Navy 33-26. Amarillo AFB, Texas 21-0. Kessler AFB 14-6.

This Friday we play Camp Breckenridge, Ky. there. They are almost as good as Carswell AFB, Texas and I have 9 boys out with injuries. So we are in for a very hard afternoon. At full strength we would have a good chance but the way it is now I hope to keep the score respectful. Had it been possible to have a team at San Marcos we could have taken Carswell. I had 5 former All Americans there. Sure wish I had the 2 All American Tackles and Guard that are still there, for this week.

Notice by the few papers I have received Gorman has a good team this year.

Please send me the complete season record and have my paper sent to my Scott AFB address.

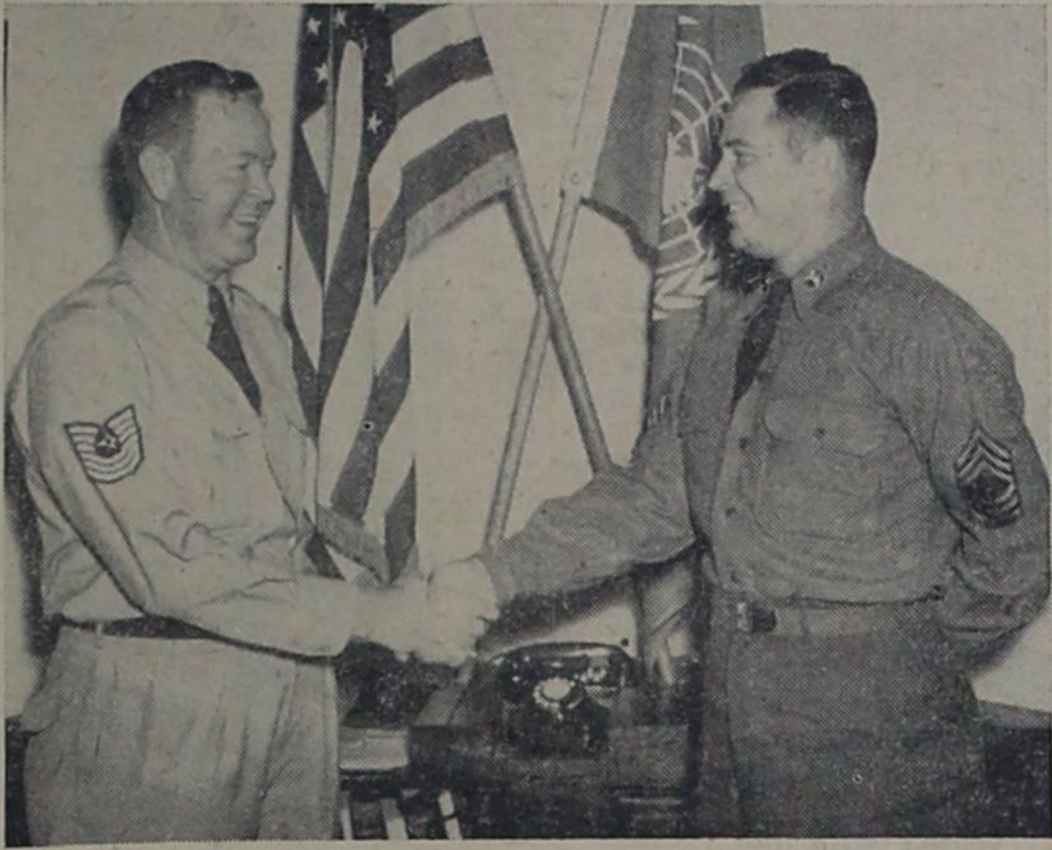

## Dr. Ed's Trophies Are Presented to Camp Billy Gibbons

Edward and Marilyn Harrison presented the hunting and fishing trophies of his foster father, the late Dr Edward Blackwell, to Camp Billy Gibbons of the Rock Springs area. Representatives of the camp called for the collection on Saturday morning.

The trophies had come to the couple with the Blackwell home and furnishings following the death of the doctor, October 18.

Among the trophies, all of which were garnered by Dr Edward on his many hunting and fishing trips in several states, Northwest Canada, the Great Lake Region, Mexico and the Gulf, are mounted heads of the male and female Caribou, Mountain Goat, Mountain Sheep, the Black Tail Deer from Mexico, with a number of deer species native to the United States.

There are also rugs of Black Bear, Brown Bear, and Grizzly. A mounted alligator from Lake Charles and a tarpon from the Gulf are significant of the doctor's love for the sport of fishing.

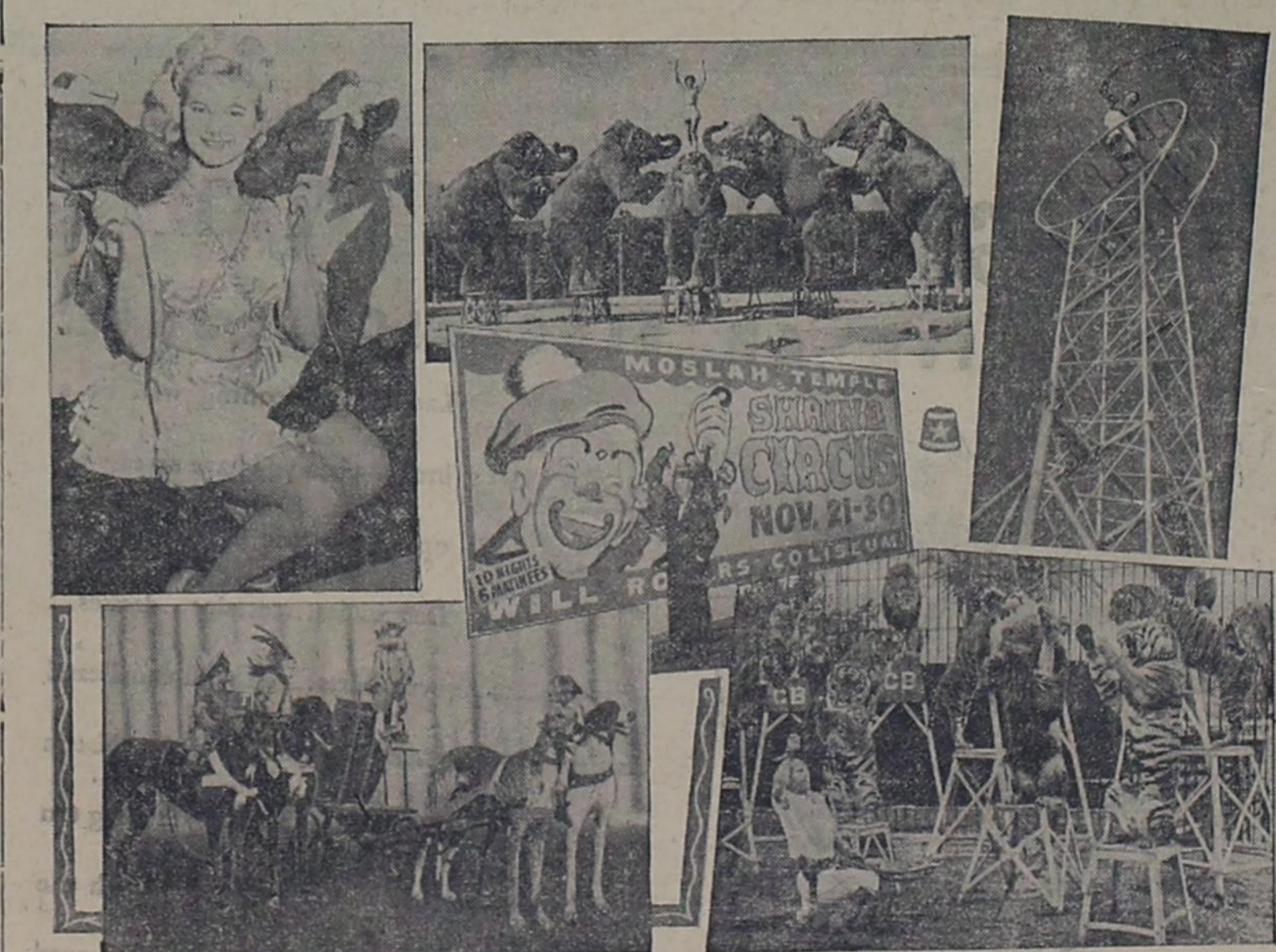

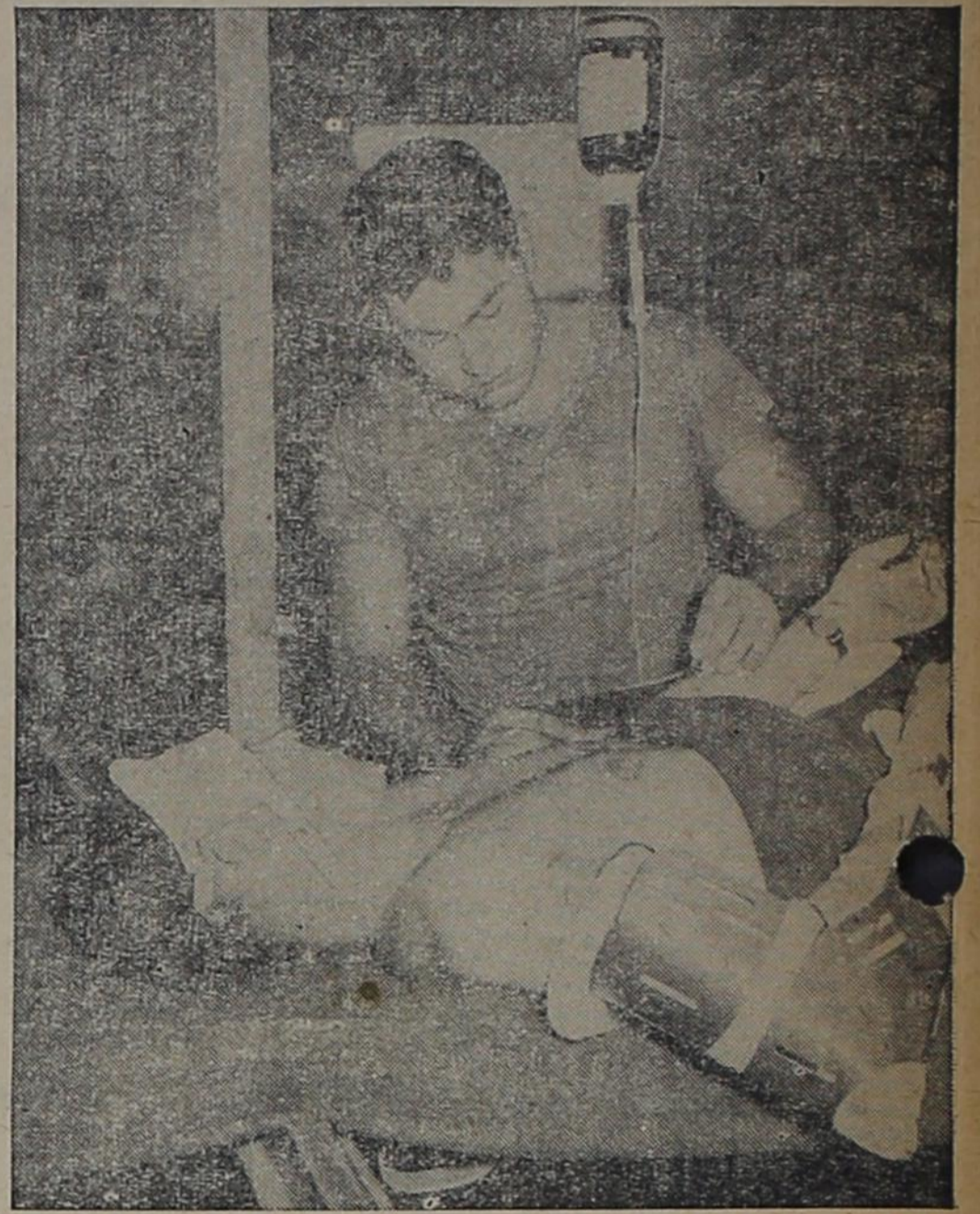

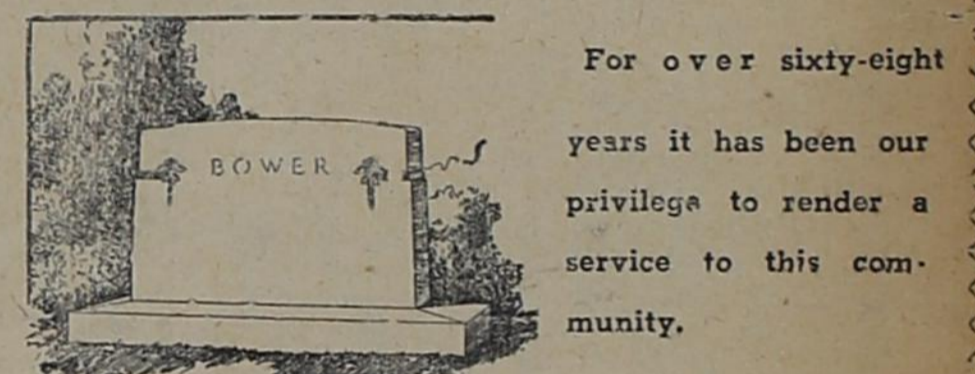

**EMPIRE SOUTHERN BUYS MITTIE TATE 1-A GAS WELL AND ACREAGE NEAR HERE**

Empire Southern Gas Company has completed a transaction under which it purchased the Mittie Tate 1-A gas well and a block of acreage surrounding that well, located some 6 or 7 miles south of Gorman.

This well was drilled as a joint venture by Sohio Company and Chicago Corporation in anticipation of oil. No oil was encountered but the well was completed as a gas well, having a daily potential of approximately 10 million cubic feet and a shut-in pressure of 1100 pounds.

Empire Southern has been very much concerned about adequate gas reserve for the servicing of the Gorman-Carbon-Desdemona area for a good many years and it is very happy to have been able to acquire the Mittie Tate well and the gas reserve tapped by it. It is felt that this gas reserve will be adequate to provide the Gorman - Carbon - Desdemona area with natural gas service for a good many years to come.

The purchase of this well and the leases represents a sizable investment for a utility operation no larger than that of the Gorman - Carbon - Desdemona area, but Empire Southern has confidence in the future growth and stability of the area and feels that the investment will ultimately be justified.

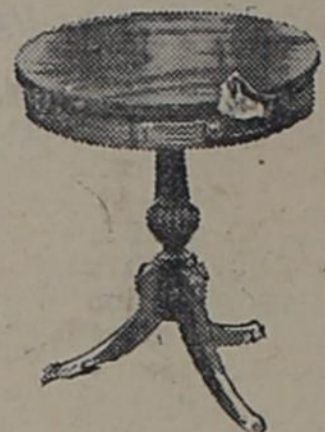

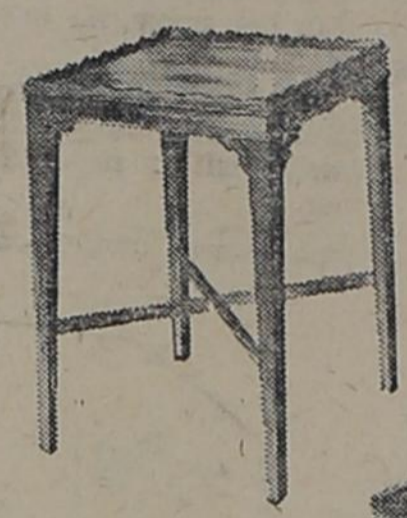

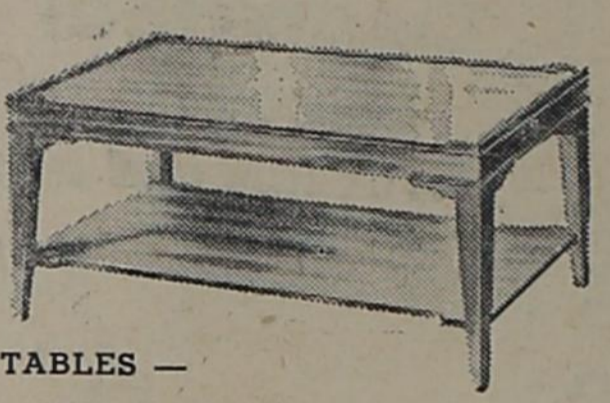
