The Panthers who finished second a week ago in the De Leon Tournament needed to start the tourney strong; and that they did defeating the Lobos of Cisco 10-6 on Thursday.

The second round featured Gorman versus Ranger in the first winners bracket game and Bangs versus Albany in the second game.

Tom Bynum started this game for Gorman giving up two runs on four hits before leaving the game with a sore arm. Jason Johnson (2-1 - 3.68) came on in relief holding the Bulldogs to two hits and no runs through four innings of work. "Johnson, who also came in for five inings and the win against Cisco on Thurday, has done a great job for us this year. I couldn't be any more please with the effort Jason has given us this year," Coach Ellison stated. Johnson recieved some help from the plate from Sam Richardson as he executed a perfect Bunt in the bottom of the sixth to bring in Ronald Majors for the tieing run. Then with two outs in the bottom of the sixth, Nicholas Guthery hit his second extra base hit of the day to bring in the winning run, as the Panthers defeated the Bulldogs 4-2 to advance to Saturdays Championship game against Bangs who defeated Albany 6-1.



And Sign Up Dates Applications For CRP

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced today that an "early out" of some Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts expiring September 30, 1996, will be available during a signup period to be held from March 20 through April 26 at local offices of USDA's Farm Service Agency. Glickman also said that current CRP participants whose contracts expire on September 30, 1996, would have an opportunity to extend their contracts for onlyone year. "A one year extension is the most prudent option until a new farm bill is enacted giving USDA enrollment authority and establisning a longer-term policy for the CRP," Glickman said. After the farm bill is enacted, USDA will announce a

policy for extension for all CRP contract holders. "Today's action is consistent with both the obvious growing need for increased grain production this year and with the Clinton Administration's" Glickman said. Contracts with the following types of land will not be eligible for early out: land with an erodibility index greater than 15; land devoted to useful filerstrips; bottom land timber on wetlands; shelterbelts

and land within an average of 100 feet

of a stream or other permanent water-

body. "These restrictions ensure that

environmentally sensitive land contin-

ues to remain under contract," Glick-

man said. Highly erodible land released from the CRP for cropping must have an approved conservation plan. Any land used for haying or pasture must have a having or grazing plan.

For contract extension, the Commodity Credit Corporation will offer producers with CRP contrats expiring on September 30, 1996 the option to extend their contracts for one year.

Homeowners can take advantage of the partial homestead exemptions available. The exemption application must be filed by May 1, 1996. It does not have to be re-applied for each year. If the residential homestead owner resides in the same house for 1996 that he or she lived in for 1995; and they received a homestead exemption for 1995; they do not need to re-apply for 1996. An exception to this would be a person who received the exemption last year (1995); but has turned sixtyfive (65) years of age during the 1995 year. This person would need to reapply as he or she would now be eligible for an additional or increased exemption in an amount available to those over sixty-five (65) years of age.


