A former pastor of Mrs. Charles W. Gibbs, Dr. John Osley, who heads the Department of Theology at Baylor University, conducted her funeral services which were held at the First Baptist Church last Thursday.

Dr. Osley brought a beautiful message of the resurrection and eternal life, the thoughts of which were of great comfort to the family and friends who mourn her passing.

Assisting Dr. Osley were Rev. Roy Clayton, pastor of the Baptist Church at Glen Rose, and Rev. Tom Small, pastor of the local Baptist Church.

Winalee Sullivan Gibbs was born May 30th, 1916 at Rosser, Texas. She was married to Charles W. Gibbs at Hugo, Oklahoma June 4th, 1938.

Mrs. Gibbs had been a school teacher and had been active in church and civic circles until her health failed.

Surviving her are her husband, two children, Chuck and Marilyn Kate; her parents, Mr and Mrs G. T. Sullivan of Rosser, and two brothers, Jack Sullivan of Rosser and John Sullivan of San Benito, Texas.

Friends of the family of long standing from other towns were named as pallbearers.

## Native - India Speaks Cisco Dist. Churches

Dr. Ahmad-Shah of India, a visiting professor at the Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas for the present school semester, is speaking in a number of the Methodist Churches of the Cisco District this week. He with his wife, Mrs. Ahmad-Shah, is the guest of the Cisco District Superintendent, Rev. Leslie Seymour.

Dr. Ahmad-Shah heads the Department of Philosophy at the University in Lucknow, India. He is the son of a Presbyterian minister who having been converted from the Moslem faith pastored the same church for 46 years.

A friend of Mahatma Gandhi for many years, an acquaintance of Stanley Jones, and intimately acquainted with other prominent Indians including the famous Nehru and Madame Pundit, Ahmad-Shah was able to bring convincing, informative and apparently unbiased accounts of the Christian Church in his native country.

Speaking on the Christian's responsibility he told how the Indian Christians, being only 2% of the 350 million populace, were following the Great Commission according to Matthew. He said with the assistance of members of the Christian faith in America the church in India was providing the best in education and healing. He stated that Madame Pundit, although a non-Christian, was seeing to it that her daughters were educated in Christian schools. And that she was among others who realized that the Christian schools provided character training.

In speaking of healing he said the people realized that the Christian hospitals provided the best.

The small 2% of the religious faiths in India he said gained for the people when their constitution was drafted freedom of religion.

### Opening of Home Nursing Course Is Plans of Red Cross

The Eastland County Chapter of the American Red Cross plans to offer a course in home nursing as soon as details are worked out was the announcement made Monday by Home Nursing Chairman, Mrs. Bill Tucker, who has completed an instructor training course in Fort Worth recently, sponsored by the Tarrant County Chapter. She was one of a class of 14 women who were there for teaching techniques in Red Cross Home Care of the Sick.

The Red Cross Home Nursing Courses are planned to give major emphasis to the care of the sick in the home.

It is the policy of the American Red Cross to work in close cooperation with official health and educational agencies on National, State, and local levels in conducting all Red Cross Home Nursing Courses.

Mrs. Otto Marshall of Eastland and Miss Loretta Morris of Eastland are already instructors. As soon as a survey can be made and a place for classes set up, Mrs. Marshall will begin teaching the course.

Mrs. O. L. Hooper and Mrs. Carl Jones have designated their willingness to help in getting a survey made in Eastland, as to who wants the course and how many wants the training.

From seven to fifteen persons may be in one class, has been advised.

Mrs. D. J. J. Jebe of Gorman will assist in making a survey in her city.

Mrs. Howard Williams has promised her support in making a survey in Desdemona.

It is hoped that each town and community will have Red Cross Home Nursing Classes.

The Red Cross Drive in Gorman has reached the total of \$595.70 on this, the last day of March, as the campaign draws to a close.

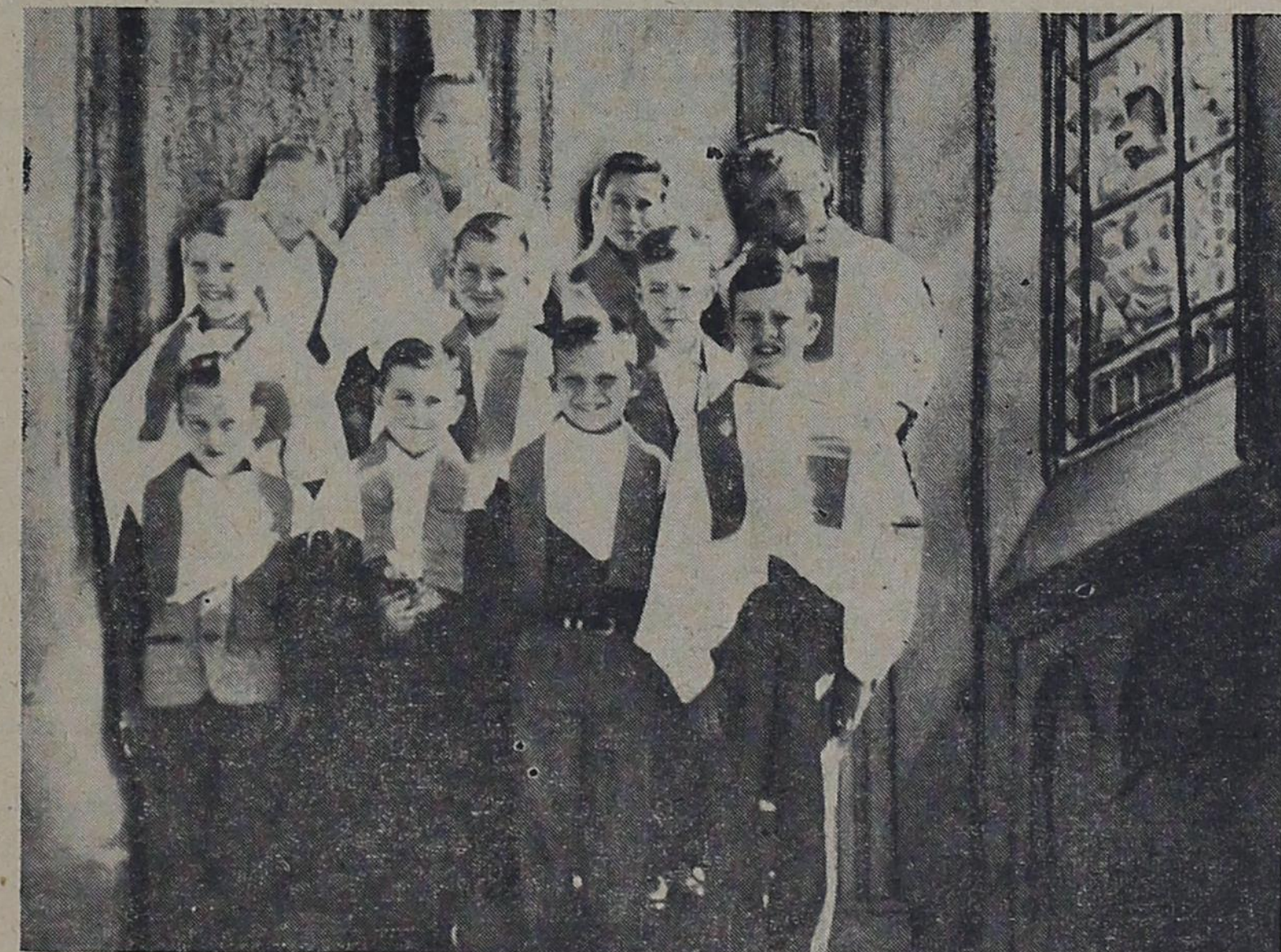

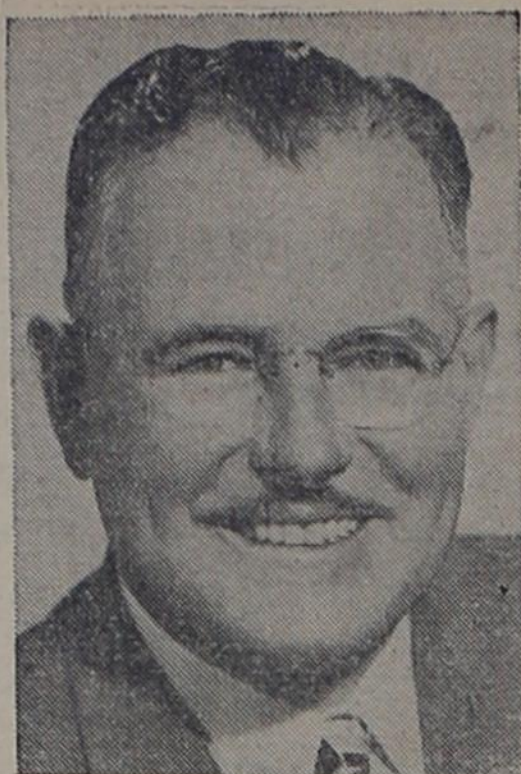

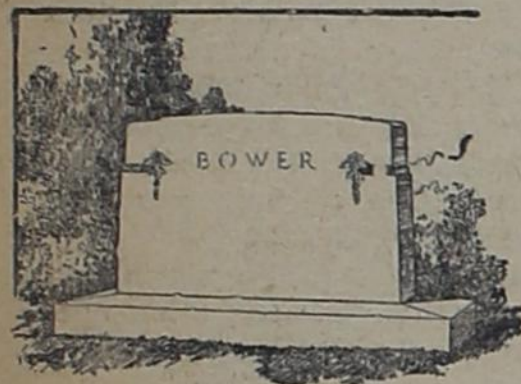

**SPRING IS TIME FOR HAZARD HUNT SAYS HEALTH OFFICER**

AUSTIN, Tex — Spring is the time for a home hazard hunt, according to Dr Geo W Cox, State Health Officer. Accidents in the home are the second leading cause of accidental death in Texas. Each year about one thousand persons die as a result of accidents in the home.

Spring house cleaning time is a good time to remove the common hazards that cause so many home accidents. Attics, basements and closets accumulate piles of junk. Piles of papers, magazines, broken furniture and other combustible material are dangerous fire hazards. In addition, rats, mice, cockroaches and other pests thrive in trash heaps.

Loose throw rugs are notorious for causing falls. Toys and other objects scattered over the floors and stairway often cause falls. Check the electrical cords and see that they are in good shape. Frayed electric cords have caused fires and sometimes fatal shocks.

While rounding up piles of junk to throw away, don't forget to look into the garage, backyard and alleys. In your spring clean-up check your garbage can. Be sure that it is of metal and see that it has a tight fitting lid. Cooperate with your neighbor in seeing that the community disposes of all garbage and trash in a sanitary manner.

This general clean-up, if carried out all through the year, will reduce home accidents and sickness or death from such diseases as polio, typhoid fever, malaria, typhus and others.

The Sermon on the Mount is for everyone  
Anyone who reads it will be happier  
during the next 24 hours.

Anyone who carries it in his heart will be happier  
forever. Read...re-read...and understand its words.  
No speech ever promised...or delivered...so much



**W**HEN he saw the crowds of people he went up on the mountain. There he seated himself, and when his disciples had come up to him, he opened his lips to teach them. And he said:

★ Blessed are those who feel their spiritual need, for the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to them! Blessed are the mourners, for they will be consoled! Blessed are the humble-minded, for they will possess the land! Blessed are those who are hungry and thirsty for uprightness, for they will be satisfied! Blessed are the merciful,



for they will be shown mercy! Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God! Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called God's sons! Blessed are those who have endured persecution for their uprightness, for the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to them! Blessed are you when people abuse you, and persecute you, and falsely say everything bad of you, on my account. Be glad and exult over it, for you will be richly rewarded in heaven, for that is the way they persecuted the prophets who went before you!

★ You are the salt of the earth! But if salt loses its strength, how can it be made salt again? It is good for nothing but to be thrown away and trodden underfoot. You are the light of the world! A city that is built upon a hill cannot be hidden. People do not light a lamp and put it under a peck-measure; they put it on its stand and it gives light to everyone in the house. Your light must burn in that way among men so that they will see the good you do, and praise your Father in heaven.

★ Do not suppose that I have come to do away with the Law or the Prophets. I have not come to do away with them but to enforce them. For I tell you, as long as heaven and earth endure, not one dotting of an *i* or crossing of a *t* will be dropped from the Law until it is all observed. Anyone, therefore, who weakens one of the slightest of these commands, and teaches others to do so, will be ranked lowest in the Kingdom of Heaven; but anyone who observes them and teaches others to do so will be ranked high in



the Kingdom of Heaven. For I tell you that unless your uprightness is far superior to that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never even enter the Kingdom of Heaven!

★ You have heard that men were told "You shall not commit adultery." But I tell you that

anyone who looks at a woman with desire has already committed adultery with her in his heart. But if your right eye makes you fall, tear it out and throw it away, for you might better lose one part of your body than have it all thrown into the pit! If your right hand makes you fall, cut it off and throw it away! For you might better lose one part of your body than have it all go down to the pit!

★ They were told, "Anyone who divorces his wife must give her a certificate of divorce." But I tell you that anyone who divorces his wife on any ground, except unfaithfulness, makes her commit adultery, and anyone who marries her after she is divorced commits adultery.

★ Again, you have heard that the men of old were told, "You shall not swear falsely, but you must fulfil your oaths to the Lord." But I tell you not to swear at all, either by heaven, for it is God's throne, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great king. You must not swear by your own head, for you cannot make one single hair white or black. But your way of speaking must be "Yes" or "No." Anything that goes beyond that comes from the evil one.

★ You have heard that the men of old were told "You shall not murder," and "Whoever murders will have to answer to the court." But I tell you that anyone who gets angry with his brother will have to answer to the court, and anyone who speaks contemptuously to his brother will have to answer to the great council, and anyone who says to his brother "You cursed fool!" will have to answer for it in the fiery pit! So when you are presenting your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother has any grievance against you, leave your gift right there before the altar and go and make up with your brother; then come back and present your



gift. Be quick and come to terms with your opponent while you are on the way to court with him, or he may hand you over to the judge, and the judge may hand you over to the officer, and you will be thrown into prison. I tell you, you will never get out again until you have paid the last penny!

★ You have heard that they were told, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." But I tell you not to resist injury, but if anyone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other to him too; and if anyone wants to sue you for your shirt, let him have your coat too. And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go two miles with him. If anyone begs from you, give to him, and when anyone wants to borrow from you, do not turn away.

★ You have heard that they were told, "You must love your neighbor and hate your enemy." But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for your persecutors, so that you may show yourselves true sons of your Father in heaven, for he makes his sun rise on bad and good alike, and makes the rain fall on the upright and the

wrongdoers. For if you love only those who love you, what reward can you expect? Do not the very tax-collectors do that? And if you are polite to your brothers and no one else, what is there remarkable in that? Do not the very heathen do that? So you are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is.

★ But take care not to do your good deeds in public for people to see, for, if you do, you will get no reward from your Father in heaven. So when you are going to give to charity, do not blow a trumpet before yourself, as the hypocrites do, in the synagogues and the streets, to



make people praise them. I tell you, that is all the reward they will get! But when you give to charity, your own left hand must not know what your right hand is doing, so that your charity may be secret, and your Father who sees what is secret will reward you.

★ When you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites, for they like to pray standing in the synagogues and in the corners of the squares, to let people see them. I tell you, that is the only reward they will get! But when you pray, go into your own room, and shut the door, and pray to your Father who is unseen, and your Father who sees what is secret will reward you. And when you pray, do not repeat empty phrases as the heathen do, for they imagine that their prayers will be heard if they use words enough. You must not be like them. For God, who is your Father, knows what you need before you ask him. This, therefore, is the way you are to pray:

*'Our Father in heaven,  
Your name be revered!  
Your kingdom come!  
Your will be done on earth  
as it is done in heaven!  
Give us today bread for the day,  
And forgive us our debts,  
as we have forgiven our debtors.  
And do not subject us to temptation,  
But save us from the evil one.'*

For if you forgive others when they offend you, your heavenly Father will forgive you too. But



if you do not forgive others when they offend you, your heavenly Father will not forgive you for your offenses.

★ When you fast, do not put on a gloomy look, like the hypocrites, for they neglect their personal appearance to let people see that they are fasting. I tell you, that is all the reward they will get. But when you fast, perfume your hair and wash your face, so that no one may see that you are fasting, except your Father who is unseen, and your Father who sees what is secret, will reward you.

★ Do not store up your riches on earth, where moths and rust destroy them, and where thieves break in and steal them, but store up your riches in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy them, and where thieves cannot break in and steal them. For wherever your treasure is, your heart will be also. The eye is the lamp of the body. If then your eye is sound, your whole body will be light, but if your eye is unsound, your whole body will be dark. If, therefore, your very light is darkness, how deep the darkness will be! No slave can belong to two masters, for he will either hate one and love the other, or stand by one and make light of the other. You cannot serve God and money. Therefore, I tell you, do not worry about life, wondering what you will have to eat or drink, or about your body, wondering what you will have to wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body than clothes? Look at the wild birds. They do not sow or reap, or store their food in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more account than they? But which of you with all his worry can add a single hour to his life? Why should you worry about clothing? See how the wild flowers grow. They do not toil or spin, and yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his splendor was never dressed like one of them. But if God so beautifully dresses the wild grass, which is alive today and is thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more surely clothe you, you who have so little faith? So do not worry and say, "What shall we have to eat?" or "What shall we have to drink?" or



"What shall we have to wear?" For these are all things the heathen are in pursuit of, and your heavenly Father knows well that you need all this. But you must make his kingdom, and uprightness before him, your greatest care, and you will have all these other things besides. So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will have worries of its own. Let each day be content with its own ills.

★ Pass no more judgments upon other people, so that you may not have judgment passed upon you. For you will be judged by the standard you judge by, and men will pay you back with the same measure you have used with them. Why do you keep looking at the speck in your brother's eye, and pay no attention to the beam that is in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Just let me get that speck out of your eye," when all the time there is a beam in your own? You hypocrite! First get the beam out of your own eye, and then you can see to get the speck out of your brother's eye.

★ Do not give what is sacred to dogs, and do not throw your pearls before pigs, or they will trample them under their feet and turn and tear you in pieces. Ask, and what you ask will be given you. Search, and you will find what you search for. Knock, and the door will open to you. For it is always the one who asks who receives, and the one who searches who finds, and the one who knocks to whom the door opens. Which of you men when his son asks him for some bread will give him a stone? Or if

he asks for a fish, will he give him a snake? Or if you, bad as you are, know enough to give your children what is good, how much more surely will your Father in heaven give what is good to those who ask him for it! Therefore, you must always treat other people as you would like to have them treat you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets.

★ Go in at the narrow gate. For the road that leads to destruction is broad and spacious, and there are many who go in by it. But the gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few that find it.

★ Beware of the false prophets, who come to you disguised as sheep but are ravenous wolves underneath. You can tell them by their fruit. Do people pick grapes off thorns, or figs off thistles? Just so any sound tree bears good fruit,



but a poor tree bears bad fruit. No sound tree can bear bad fruit, and no poor tree can bear good fruit. Any tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and burned. So you can tell them by their fruit. It is not everyone who says to me "Lord! Lord!" who will get into the Kingdom of Heaven, but only those who do the will of my Father in heaven. Many will say to me on that Day, "Lord! Lord! Was it not in your name that we prophesied, and by your name that we drove out demons, and by your name that we did many mighty acts?" Then I will say to them plainly, "I never knew you! Go away from me, you who do wrong!"

★ Everyone, therefore, who listens to the teaching of mine and acts upon it, will be like a sensible man who built his house on rock. And the rain fell, and the rivers rose, and the winds blew, and beat about that house, and it did not go down, for its foundations were on rock. And anyone who listens to this teaching of mine and does not act upon it, will be like a foolish man who built his house on sand. And the rain fell and the rivers rose, and the winds blew and beat about that house, and it went down, and its downfall was complete.

★ When Jesus had finished this discourse, the crowds were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them like one who had authority and not like their scribes.

**RETURN OF THE BUSINESSMEN**

For the first time in twenty years, business leaders are in nearly all the key positions in our National government. Most Americans will welcome the patriotic efforts of these big men of talent and skill as they come to

serve their country at great personal and financial sacrifice. Business has another chance. It could be its last. This is a challenge that demands the highest type of business statesmanship.

There was a time when some businessmen ruthlessly rode over the rights of others, in the days of the "robber barons." This a-

buse of power had to be curbed in the interest of the general public. We all remember when the finger of scorn was pointed at "businessmen" in general. Some public officials tried to make the American businessmen appear as something sinister and threatening. Some radicals and so-called intellectuals tried to teach that

there was something evil about making a profit. This criticism reached its height during the early nineteen thirties, when businessmen were blamed with every thing bad.

It is a tribute to the everlasting strength of our free enterprise system that it emerged from all this period of abuse and is now again called to lead us out of the wilderness of extravagance, corruption, and impractical theories. Our young people are learning that businessmen do not have horns and tails. Business leaders of today are men of honor, devotion to country and community, generous

with time and money for the public good and with much more milk of human kindness than their predecessors of thirty or forty years ago. Public relations has become a new science. Most leaders of great enterprises realize that there must be a favorable attitude toward their companies on the part of laboring men, farmers, housewives, young people, and the public generally. If they succeed. Vast sums of money are spent by American business every year, not only to advertise products and services, but to woo that elusive and intangible thing we call good will. There are still a few business

men left (and some of them in Texas) who have not progressed beyond the low rough law of the jungle, of tooth and claw and the rule that might makes right in crushing competition. These are the exceptions. In most commercial institutions, when you get to meet the top executive, you find a kindly, tolerant, patriotic, fair-minded and considerate man,

with practical common sense, and a spirit of stewardship. We salute these new business leaders in Government. But if American business does not make good this time, in the face of grave crises and perplexing problems, it may be a long, long time before it has another chance. East Texas Chamber of Commerce

**THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT PROJECT:**

THE SERMON-PROJECT is built upon the belief that there are certain well tested lessons which should be brought before the public more often. The old expression, "Peace on earth, good will toward men," makes people thirst for more good sense and peace of mind, at home and abroad.

Thruout the world various theologues have become complicated, almost powerless to solve problems. But it seems that most all of us can use a little religion; perhaps just a little would often do. And we believe such basic training is the best way to disarm the evil genius on all sides of the oceans and in all parts of town and country, to help everyone to live sensibly, to solve problems small and large, and so help us to enjoy life more.

With these things in mind our committee planned the Sermon on the Mount newspaper page, and ran it in the New York Herald Tribune, December 22, 1950.

The response was greater than we expected, and in March, 1951, we appealed to the newspapers of the United States to print the Sermon page from our engraved layout.

Within a few weeks about 145 publishers thruout 39 states had mailed us a copy of their newspaper for the day they had printed it. They had taken our suggestion: selling the page of space to an advertiser, organization or group, or printing it themselves or jointly, as a public service.

We were grateful to everyone concerned for that splendid support, and specifically for the Sermon on the Mount page as presented in

Reports to us from these newspapers, and again the people's response, were extremely good. A few did make some critical analysis of parts of the Sermon, which will be helpful. Others gave suggestions useful to the project. Almost everyone focussed upon the great central strength of the Sermon on the Mount - agreeing that we need to floodlight this document, to know it and to use it practically.

These convictions came out in letters from people of every walk of life, of different backgrounds and creeds, from men and women in our government, industries, labor unions, from the newspapers themselves, and so on - a wonderful cross section of human intelligence.

Because time and reiteration are of well known importance to every kind of learning, and since no speech ever promised or delivered so much, we are grateful to everyone responsible for printing the Sermon on the Mount page in this paper again today, together with this statement.

We know that daily and weekly people look to their newspapers for the signs of the times. A well loved American who used their columns, Will Rogers, used to say this: "Everyone is ignorant, only not about the same things." He showed keen insight and humor as he got around at home or travelled abroad, trying to learn more about human beings, their snarled-up situations and their deepest good.

We have an idea that we believe is far reaching, and it comes from our conviction about this sermon, which we will first try to sum up:

We believe there can be no problem of any kind, concerning an individual or family, our education or community, or of our agricultural, business, or industrial establishments and those who work in them, or of government at any level, or of any kind, just or unjust, that will not yield to the common sense, the courage and the faith of those who really want the answer, when they search for it in the spirit of The Sermon on the Mount, after they know that sermon.

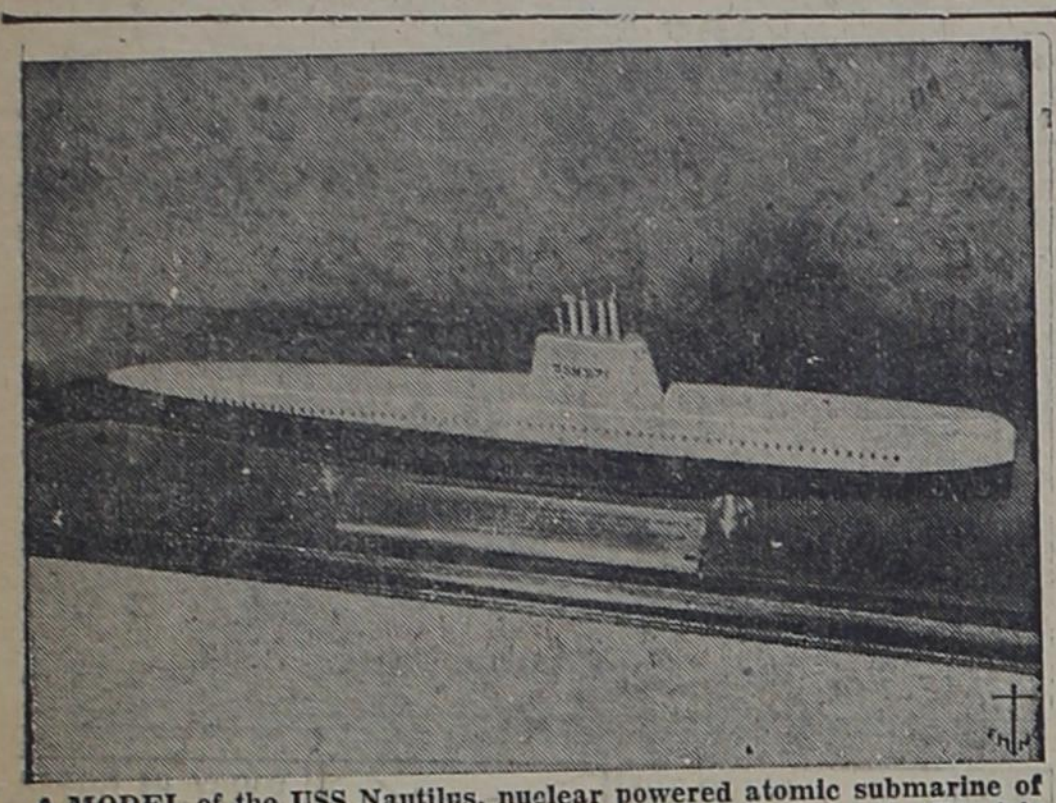
We ask you, children and adults, to set down for us your idea of how to solve some human problem in its light. We suggest you keep a copy. Your answer along with others will receive orderly study, aimed at finding out and publishing the ways in which most people actually would apply such sensible teaching.

That call is the cornerstone of our project, as we extend the Sermon on the Mount page with this statement, thru the newspapers, to people thruout the world - because we believe this greatest sermon somehow holds for you and me and everyone the soundest promise for healing human ills, and great power for healing among the nations.

Many thoughtful people may hesitate to attempt such an answer. But we pray you do. Even a few clear-cut answers from people in your community, people of faith and different experience, can be of great practical help; we are sure of this. More of them will broaden and strengthen a scientific study of the thinking of children and adults as to the right ways for human beings with warm hearts and good humor, firm faith and cool heads, to fortify their lives within the Father's house.

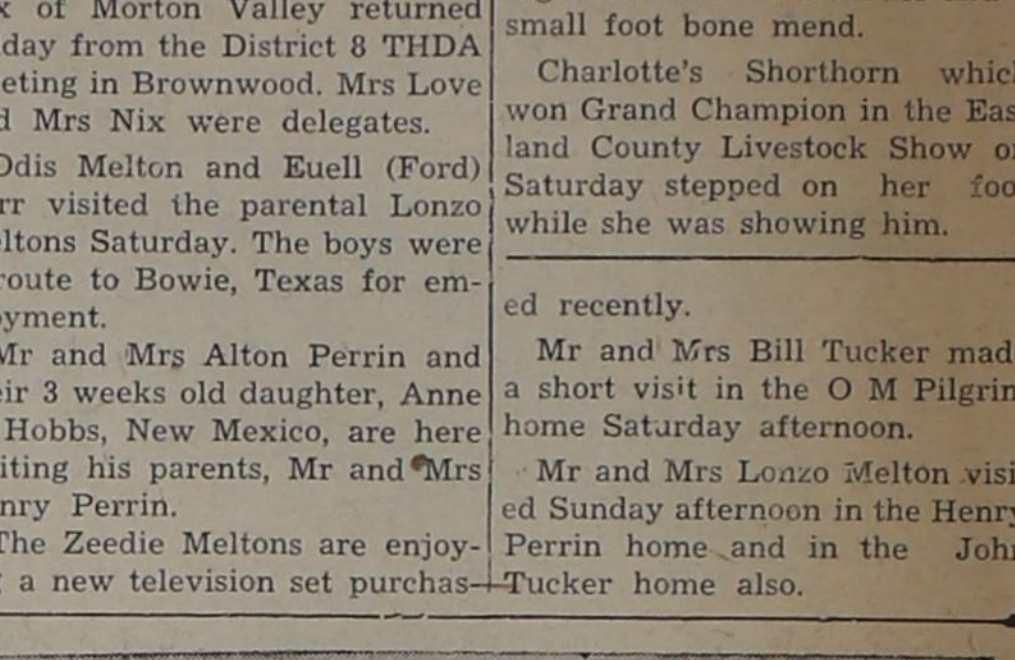

The questionnaire which I yearly submit to the people of my Congressional District is no going out. Each year since I have been in Congress, I have sought the opinions of those whom I represent in order that I may reflect as best I can their wishes and desires.

This year I am submitting eleven questions on which the Congress may take action during this Session. Of course, there are many more issues which could be listed, and those who receive them are certainly not limited to these eleven.

The questions submitted are those which can more nearly be answered with a yes or a no, although qualifying comments are requested, if the voter feels it to be required to express his views.

It should be remembered that a Bill, in the complicated process of being considered in the Congress, can be amended in many ways before its final passage. In some cases, a Bill can be changed beyond recognition between its start and its finish. This is the reason why it is many times difficult to say whether you are for or against a measure when it is introduced, but we can express ourselves on its intents and purposes.

There are several reasons for my submitting the questionnaire. First, I like to have the thinking of the people whom I represent. Second, it makes us aware and acquaints us with some of the more prominent problems to be faced by the Congress. Third, it provokes thought in matters of Government, and I hope creates a greater interest on the part of

everyone. It is every citizen's responsibility, to be interested in the affairs of his Government, and this is one way to give every one a more direct voice in what is done.

It is my hope that everyone receiving my questionnaire will fill it out and return it to me. As they are received, I will study each one personally and have the results tabulated. The results will be given to this newspaper. Let me assure everyone that your views will be valued and respected in the discharge of my responsibility in the Congress of the United States.

It is impossible to place the questionnaire in the hands of each individual, and I am bound to miss someone. It is not intentional, and for those who do not receive one, I shall ask this newspaper to retain several copies for the use of those who may wish to call for one.

**A REMINDER FOR WORLD WAR II PRISONERS OF WAR**

April 9th is the deadline for filing prisoner of war claims under Public Law 303. Funds for this purpose come from enemy assets in the hand of our Government. All communications should be addressed to War Claims Commission, Washington 25, D C.

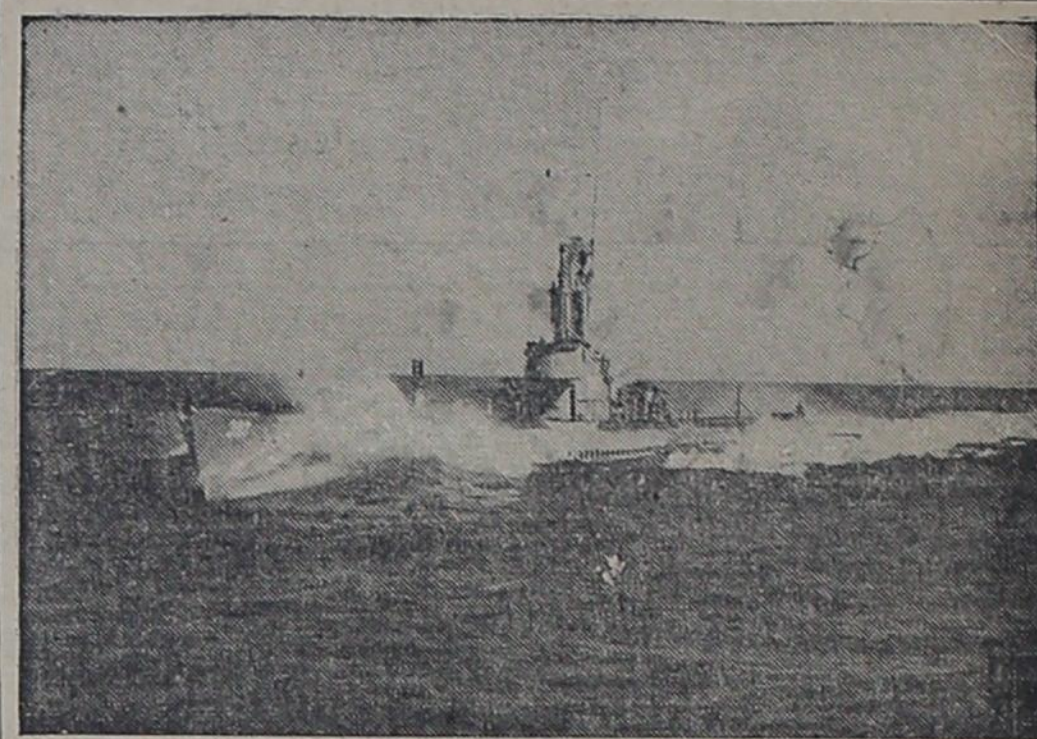

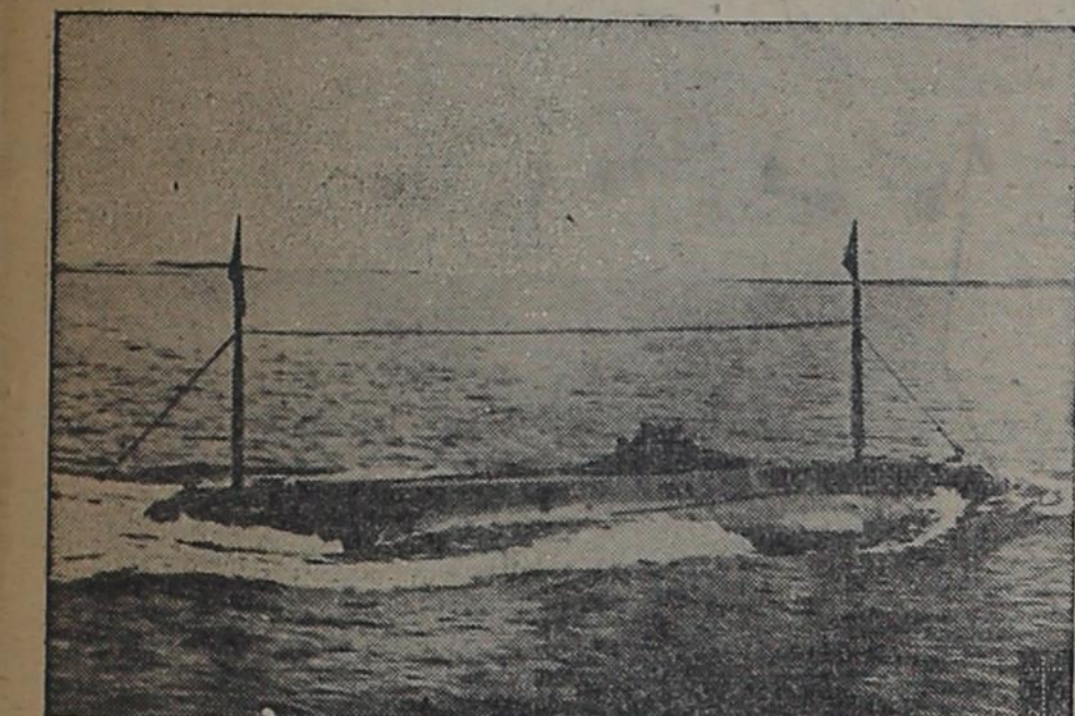
**VISIT CHANDOR GARDENS**

### MODEL A TO ATOM FIFTY-THIRD SUBMARINE ANNIVERSARY - APRIL 11

April 11 is the 53rd anniversary of the acceptance of the submarine Holland by the Navy Department.

John Phillip Holland built the first submarine for the Navy in 1900. It was a stubby cigar shaped craft powered by a four cylinder gasoline engine. The boat could submerge for short periods and was considered of slight military significance at the time.

Germany was the first to exploit the submarine as a major weapon of naval warfare. In the "unterseeboote", the Kaiser found the one weapon that could challenge the might of the British Navy.

In both World Wars of the 20th Century the Allies developed methods of combating the submarine menace before the German Navy completely strangled our war effort, but not before millions of tons of vital war materials and thousands of lives were lost.

In the Pacific, our fleet type submarines virtually dominated the sea lanes. They sank two thirds of Japan's merchant tonnage.

In addition to sinking enemy ships, submarines scouted enemy waters, took reconnaissance photo graphs, landed pre-invasion scout ing parties, supported guerillas in occupied countries, evacuated enemy encircled outposts, mined Japanese home waters, and rescued downed airmen.

After the war, the Navy modernized and improved submarines. One of the improvements was the addition of the snorkel or breathing tube. This tube enables submarines to cruise submerged at periscope depths on their diesel engines since air needed for the diesels is inducted via the tube.

Another improvement was the modification of fleet type boats into "guppies". Guppy means greater underwater propulsion power with the "Y" added for euphony. The greater speed was attained by installing higher capacity electric storage batteries and streamlining the submarine.

Last summer, the keel of the USS Nautilus, the Navy's first atomic powered submarine was laid. Its launching is expected in less than two years. When this submersible slides down the ways it will probably surpass even the mechanical perfection and performance of Jules Verne's fictional Nautilus.

The operational data of the new submarine is classified information, but we can be sure that she'll outfight our "souped up" submarines of post war days, make our World War 11 boats look like pre-war autos in the used car lot and our first submarine like something out of the Smithsonian Institute.

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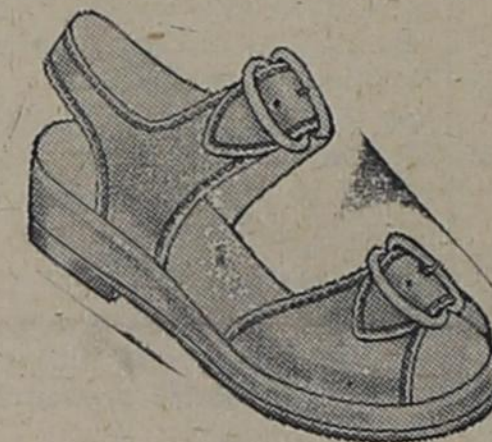
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
