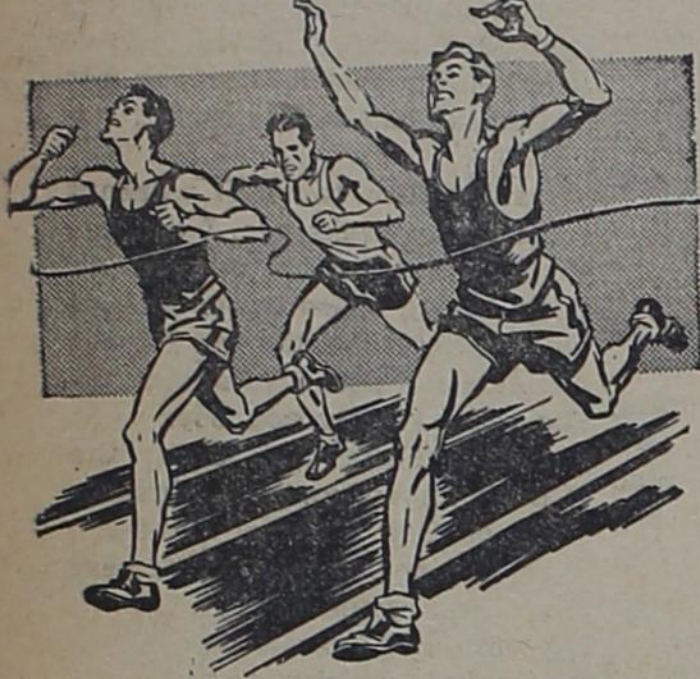

"As It Looks From Here"



OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

In the absence of Congressman Burleson, who is now back home, the column for this week is being written by his office staff.

After the Congressman visits with his mother in Anson, he will cover as much of his District as possible. He said before leaving that he expects to at least visit in all the County Seats of his twelve-county District, and in as many of the other towns and communities as time will permit.

The Congress recessed on April 2nd until Monday, the 13th. According to those who set the order of business, there will not be very much activity during the week of the 13th, although there is a possibility that the Appropriations Bill for the Interior Department will come up for consideration during the latter part of the week. It is Mr Burleson's expectation to remain back home during this week and return about the 18th of April.

It is hoped that the Congressman will have the opportunity of seeing many of you while he is there. This is the first chance he has had to leave Washington since the Congress convened, and likely it will be the last time before the Session ends.

Washington in April is perhaps at its most beautiful - and certainly at its most populated.

Over 500,000 visitors from all parts of the country were in town last week for the biggest Spring-time tourist attraction - the annual Cherry Blossom Festival.

This year's celebration was held from April 8th through the 12th, and the schedule of events included a Spring fashion show, a torchlight parade of floats bearing the princess representatives of the various States and Territories, a water carnival featuring a water ski show and speedboat racing contests, and was climaxed by the crowning of the Cherry Blossom Queen by Mrs Eisenhower.

Texas' lovely representative in the pageant was Miss Betty Ann Kilday, eighteen-year old daughter of Congressman and Mrs Paul J Kilday of San Antonio.

Visitors report that the affair was just perfect - except for one small detail. It seems that in scheduling the festivities, the planners completely overlooked Mother Nature and her "mind of her own." The unprecedented warm and wet weather brought forth the blooms a full two weeks before they were expected, and little was left of their loveliness by the time of the festival.

The younger generation, too, had "their day" in the Nation's Capitol last week. On Easter Monday, President Eisenhower revived an old and honored Washington custom and threw open the gates of the White House for an "Egg Roll."

The "ticket of admission" was a basket of colored eggs, and no adult was admitted unless accompanied by a youngster. Some 19,000 guests responded to the President's invitation to roll eggs on his lawn, and both he and the First Lady, as well as their small grandchildren, took part in the fun.

White House gardeners report that the lawns will recover from the eggshell barrage, and state that the grounds will be much improved for their egg shampoo. Few casualties were reported, and kiddies "missing in action" were quickly returned to their anxious parents by the White House police force.

It was the first Egg Roll in twelve years. The practice was discontinued during the war years and the period of White House renovation. The event was so successful, it will likely be brought back again next year by popular demand.

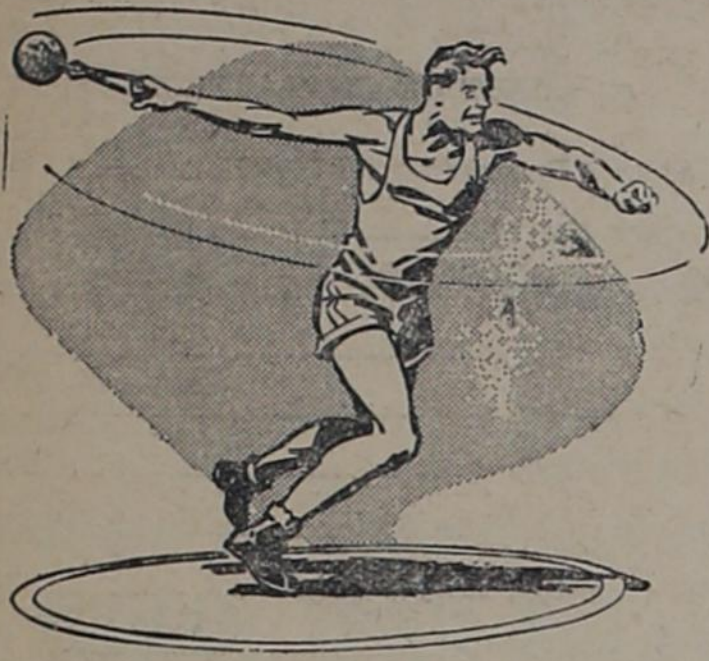

Methodist Make Plans Vacation Bible School To Begin May 25th

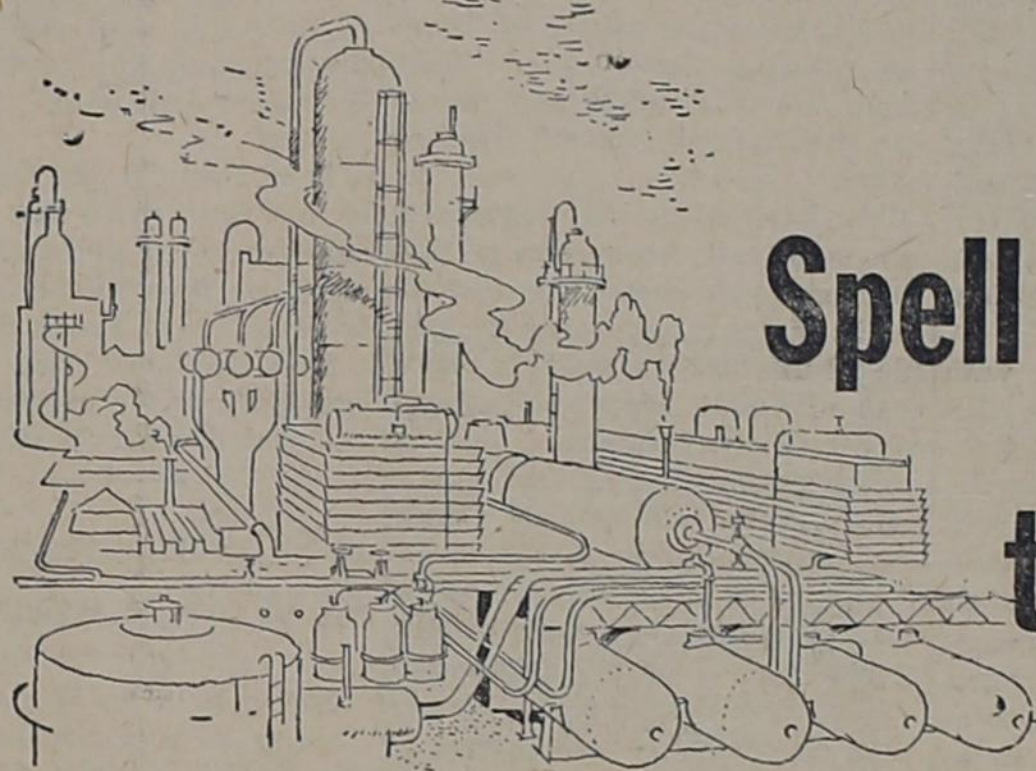

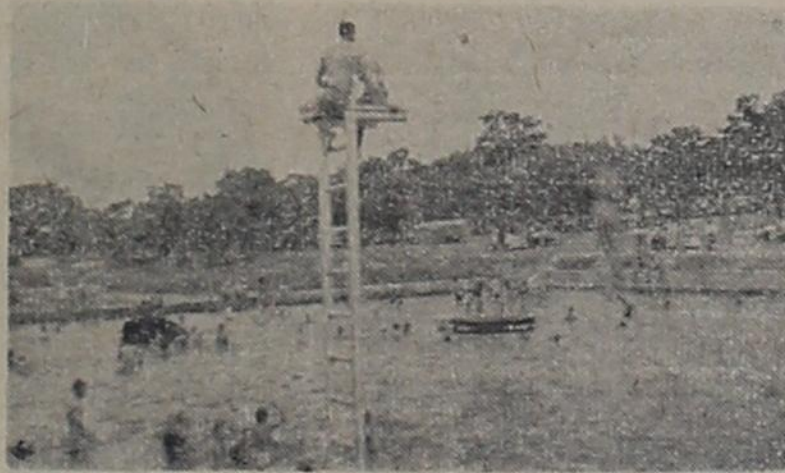

REPORT PEANUT PROGRAM Continued From Page One

Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, and Mr and Mrs Melvin Shell and Mr and Mrs Wilbur Shell of the Gorman Peanut Company.

One of the requests made by the group from Texas was for an increase in the allotted acreage due to the low production in this area during the past two years. The group talked with Congressmen Poage, Steed, and Thornberry, Congressman Poage, of Waco, is on the House Agriculture Committee and stated that he was in favor of the farmer receiving a full 90 percent of parity for peanuts.

The big problem facing the new administration at this time on peanuts is how to support the price. The shellers from the Southwestern States want a "Re-purchase Agreement", which would guarantee them a "bail-out". About one-half of the Southwestern Shellers want this type and the others would like to see the price supported by a loan or direct purchase by the Co-ops.

Mr Shell and Mr Cloninger stated that they talked with Secretary of Agriculture Benson and Mr John W Davis, President of Commodity Credit Corporation,

Tuesday, April 7th Is Eighty-fourth Birthday For Mrs. Hollifield

To one who desires to deepen his religious faith, to develop a true philosophy of life, and to avoid thinking too highly of himself, a visit with elderly folk is often most profitable. It is possible to learn a great deal by listening.

A woman of years recently expressed her joy in living with, "As far as I know I am the happiest woman in the world. My children including my son-in-laws and my daughter-in-law are all so good to me. I never want for anything."

This woman is Mrs Naomi Allie

who made the principal address at the luncheon of the Council. In this address Mr Davis compared the increase in efficiency in industry to the increase in efficiency in farming which shows farming to have fallen behind. However, farmers have made progress and have made many advances in comparison to other countries. He further stated that the Government is going to fulfill its obligations of price supports under the present laws and study the individual problem of each commodity with an eye towards formulation of new and more efficient programs after 1954.

He further stated that the Government could not and would not finance inefficient operations, that they do not intend to support the price of any commodity when commodity continues to be a surplus and a burden on the tax payer. At the present time the Government owns over \$2,000,000,000 worth of commodities.

It is his opinion that the Government should administer and guide a program but that the industry should decide for itself what that program should be.

He advocated a protective tariff to keep out commodities grown with cheap labor in foreign countries. Also, more research to find more uses for peanuts. Of more interest to the farmers he advocated protection in order to preserve the family size farm. He stressed that the aim of the administration was security for the farmer.

Mr Melvin Shell discussed with Mr Gordon of the Department of Agriculture and his assistants, the problem now facing the farmers and shellers of the Southwest: Spanish peanuts in order to be classed as U S No 1 peanuts must contain less than .75 of one percent damage. Runner peanuts can make U S Grade and contain 2.50 percent damage. This creates a big difference between the prices obtained and Mr Shell states that many end-users who formerly used only Spanish peanuts are now using Runners especially in peanut butter. The prices paid for the farmers stock to the farmers is virtually the same. The Washington officials stated that this problem had been discussed but that nothing had been done about it. The urgency of the situation was pointed out by showing that though the Southwest has had a very poor production for two years there is very light demand for peanuts and a normal crop would have provided a surplus. At the same time Runner peanuts are moving steadily at about 2 1/2 cents per pound less than Spanish.

Mr Cloninger stated that he was pleased with the attitude of the officials towards the support price and was assured that the farmers would be given fair treatment.

Gray Hollifield, who on April 7th passed her eighty-fourth birthday. She is not one who believes in present day miracles. But it is nothing short of a miracle to find a woman, widowed twenty-nine years, whose heart is filled with gratitude for life with health and the joys it has brought.

Mrs Hollifield was born in Idea, Arkansas where she was married to William Bryce Hollifield. Coming to Texas they settled in Eastland County where she has lived most of her married life except for a few years spent in Throckmorton County. Her husband who followed farming passed away in 1924 at their farm between Okra and Rising Star.

At this time her daughters, Carrie and Mae, had married. George was single and had been working in an oil field.

What to do? What does any woman do at such a time? Especially a woman who had expected that her husband would outlive her by years. Carrie, Mrs Henry Capers, and Mae, Mrs Barnes of Rising Star, with their husbands were ready to welcome her into

their homes. But George thought she should go with him to live in Corsicana.

Mrs Hollifield said she had prayed and the Lord let her know that she would have guidance. She sold out all except her cattle which she put on pasture with a neighbor.

When she and son George, were about ready to leave, the 40-acre farm on which she now lives was for sale. It was just too close to Carrie. She couldn't break two hearts by leaving nor one by staying, so George stayed too. She noted that the years had been wonderful having all of them so close.

Recalling the dry spell of 1893, Mrs Hollifield said, "Why folks don't know a thing in the world about dry weather. We came to Texas in 1893, January, and there was not enough rain to wet pocket handkerchiefs except a splash when Cisco blew away. Why there wasn't a foot of clay road in the county. Talk about sand, we had it."

It was in 1919 that the family had their first car. Afraid to ride

in the front seat she said she rode in the back holding the latch back so she could jump out if anything happened. Fortitude is certainly one of Mrs Hollifield's traits as she expressed it, "I always set out to win. I just wasn't going to be whipped at anything." Definitely she was not minded to be killed by a car. She'd jump out first.

A brother of Mrs Hollifield, Dr A J Gray of Comanche died December 25th, 1952 at the age of ninety. Other brothers are James Gray and Jeremiah Gray. She is half-sister to Mrs Kate Murphy, Mr Dick Gray and Mr Gilford Gray, all of them being the children of the late Dr G W Gray, who was an early practitioner in Gorman.

Of the three grandchildren Mrs Hollifield said, "You can say they have all done their part in serving their country, Bernie, Perry and Ray. Ray is at Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland."

May there be more happy birthday days for Mrs Hollifield, eighty-four years young.
