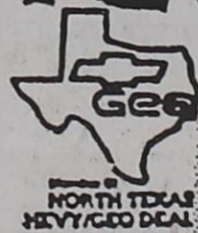

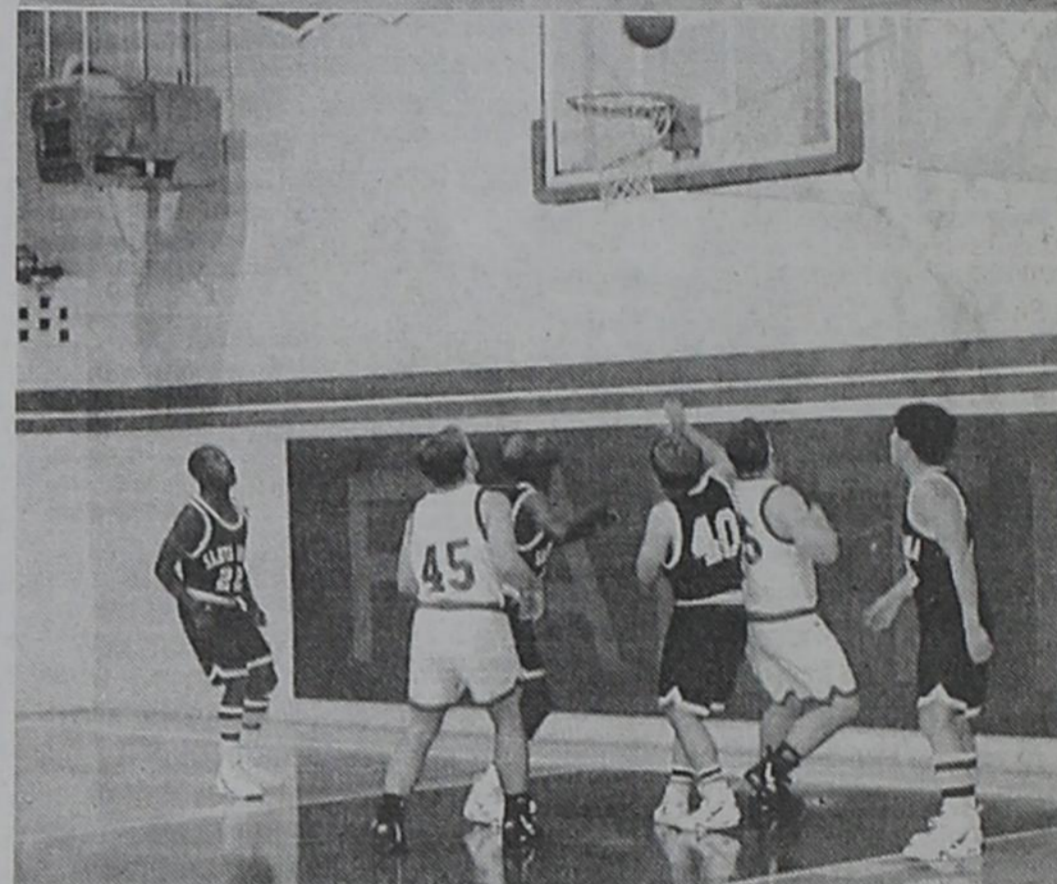

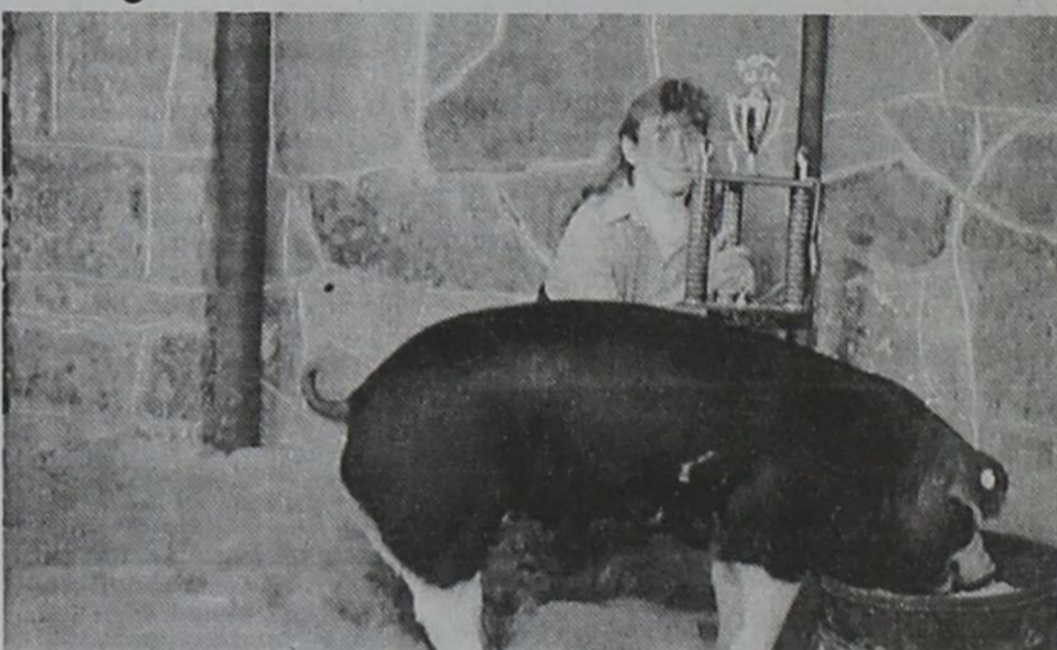

Family Farmers Meet To Debate '95 Farm Bill

"For over two hundred years, Congress has reaffirmed its historic commitment to strengthen the family farm system of agriculture in this country. In 1995, we are at a crossroads in determining whether the family farm will remain as the primary agricultural system for the United States," said Joe Rankin, president of the Texas Farmers Union, in announcing the 91st annual convention of the state's oldest farm organization.

The Texas Farmers Union will meet at the Holiday Inn South in Austin, January 27-28 to set policy and urge protection for the nation's family farmers and ranchers at the federal and state level. Delegates and leaders will debate recommendations for the 1995 Farm Bill and policies for enactment by the Texas Legislature.

"The family farm system continues to be the best choice for American society in terms of assured abundance, efficient production, care of land and water resources, economic development and enhancing the quality of life for all Americans," Rankin said. This can all dramatically change if the Congress dismantles agriculture programs which protect both producers and consumers from shortages and high prices. "If your farming operation is so successful that you can make your income without planning and stability, then you don't have to worry if farm programs are abolished," Rankin said. "But if you rely on the U.S. Department of Agriculture and farm programs to provide for a reliable supply of food at an affordable price, then you need to be concerned with what may happen in Washington this year."

Areas of concern for family farmers and ranchers at the federal level are:

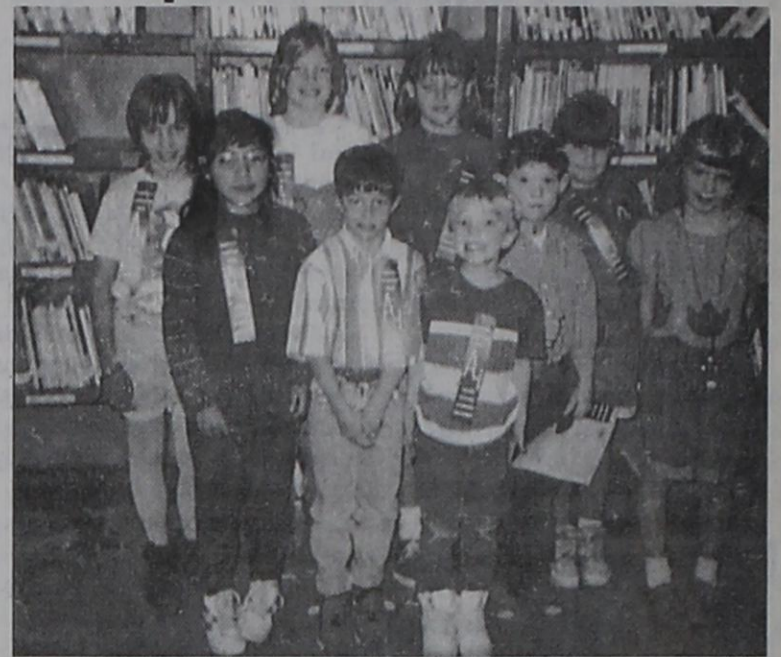
- *Preservation of commodity loan programs which guarantee an adequate food supply at a fair price for protection of American families and business.

- *Retention of the Disaster programs which provide low cost loans and benefits to producers who are impacted by a natural disaster.

- *Reauthorization of the Conservation Reserve Program which removes less productive lands from tillage and encourages land and water conservation.

"Agriculture programs are beneficial to the producers and consumers of this nation. The annihilation of farm programs and our traditional rural way of life will take place if producers just sit around and talk about it at the local coffee shop," Rankin concluded.

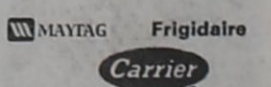
