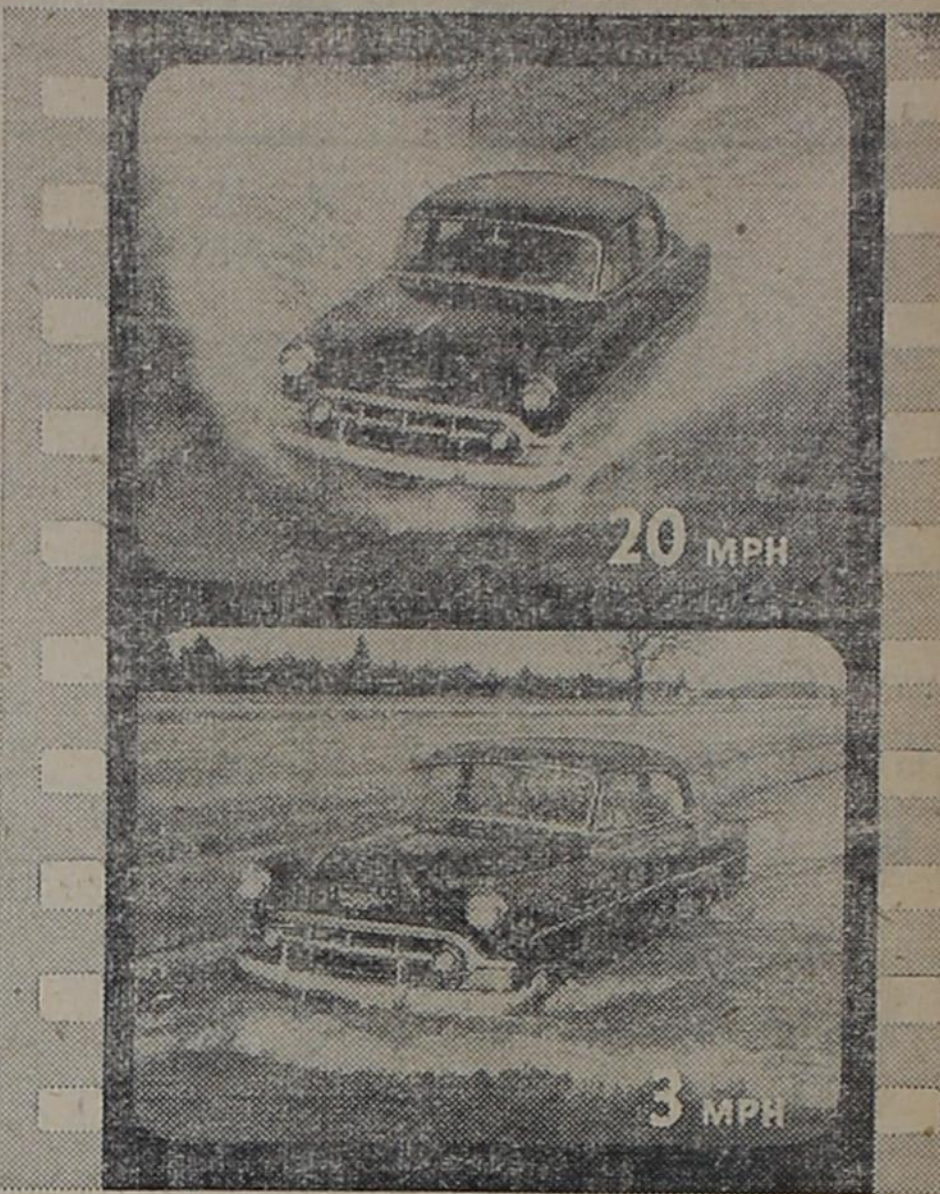

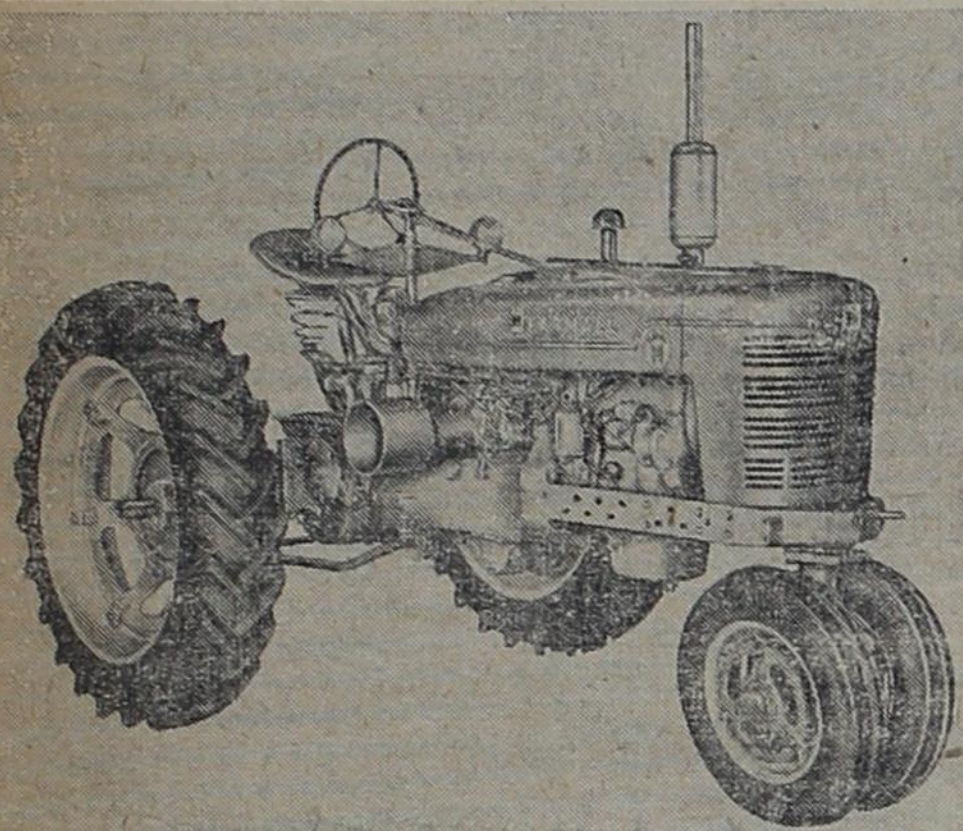

Driving Through Water is Not the Time to Make a "Big Splash"



Although today's automobile has progressed far beyond the point where a severe spring rain will stall the engine, it still is not an amphibious vehicle. Failure of the engine to bring you through normal flood waters, which might cover highways, can be attributed mostly to water on the ignition system caused by splashing. Today's engines are better equipped to combat excessive moisture and driving through water, by the use of such things as improved rubber housings on the spark plug terminals. These pictures show the splash effect when a car "plows" into a seven-inch depth on a flooded highway. At 20 m.p.h., the water shoots high, completely drenching the underneath part of the car. At 3 m.p.h., the forward motion of the car creates a small wave running ahead of the front bumper, with control of the vehicle greatly improved. When you encounter an inundated highway, slow your car down and approach with caution. As a safety tip, on driving through flooded areas, remember to try out your brakes at slow speed immediately after reaching dry ground. When wet brakes do not respond to pedal action, hold brake-pedal down moderately with left foot, while right foot feeds enough power to carry car forward and dry out brakes. This action, over a few hundred yards, should restore your brakes to safe driving condition.

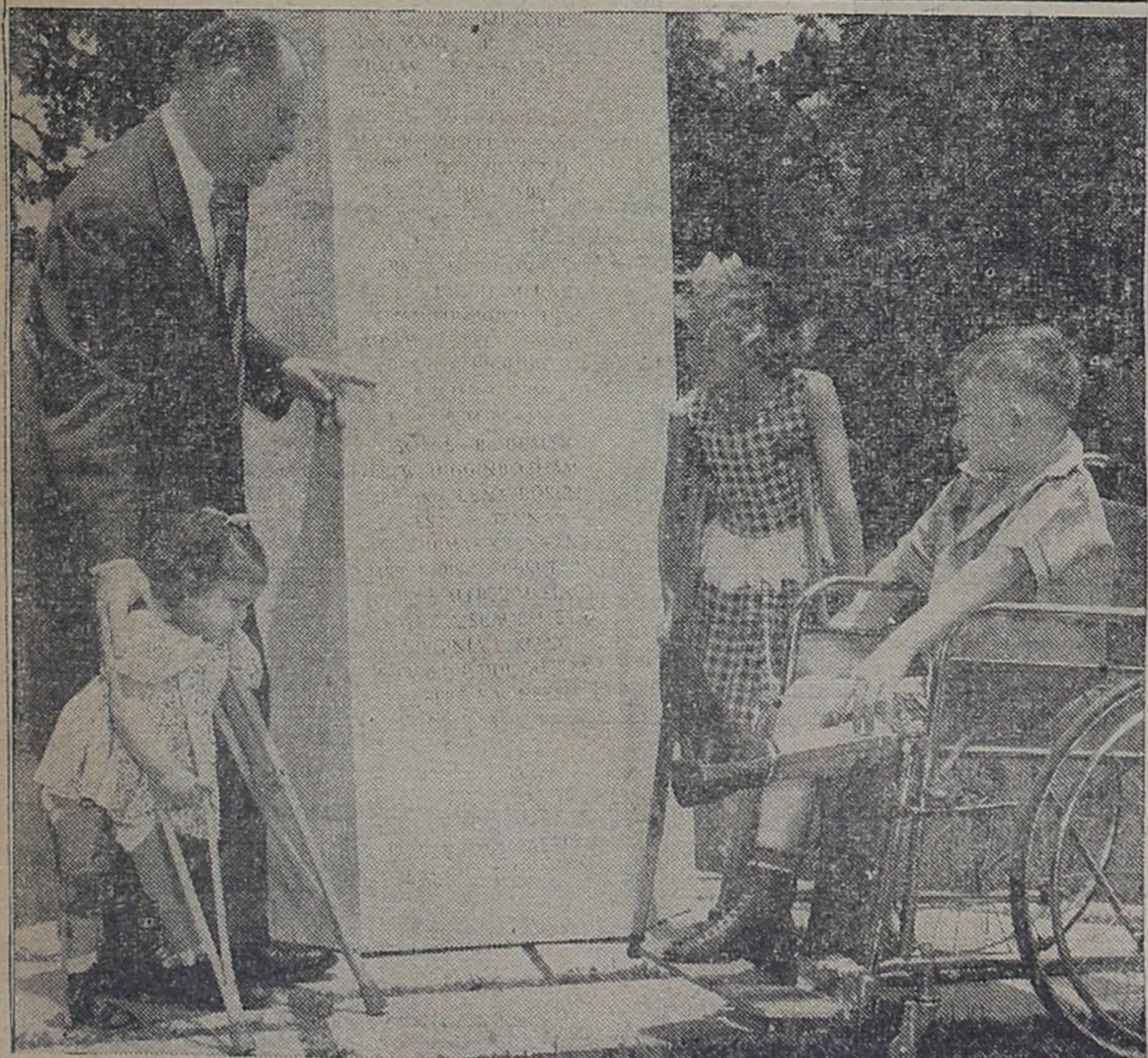

Potash from Behind "Iron Curtain" Threatens U.S. Fertilizer Industry



Congressional hearings in Washington have brought out the fact that Russian-produced potash is being brought into the United States at cut-rate prices in order to garner dollars for trade and disrupt the American potash industry. Potash is a major ingredient in mixed fertilizers.

Farmers in this area may have unknowingly bought mixed fertilizers containing Russian controlled potash brought into the United States from behind the "Iron Curtain."

Potash, along with nitrogen and phosphate, is one of the three principal ingredients of mixed fertilizers on local soils.

Reports that Russian potash was being "dumped" in the United States were heard at a recent Congressional hearing in Washington, D. C. The hearing brought out that Russian produced potash is being brought into this country at cut-rate prices in an effort to garner dollars for trade and to

disrupt the American potash industry.

One fertilizer organization told the hearing that it had recently bought a cargo of Russian potash, and others reported they had heard of additional sales and offerings being made in America.

The testimony immediately brought from a member of the Congressional group holding the hearing a challenge to "put a notice on the fertilizer bag" saying the fertilizer contained Russian potash.

The challenge came from Representative Thomas G. Abernathy, Democrat, of Mississippi, who said farmers should know when

they are getting fertilizer made from potash behind the Iron Curtain.

He asked if farmers who have sons in Korea were not entitled to know if the dollars they paid for their fertilizer are going back to Russia to buy war material.

The Russian potash has been coming into the United States at East Coast ports, such as Boston, Mass.; New York City; Wilmington, Delaware; Philadelphia, Penn.; Baltimore, Md.; Norfolk, Va.; Charleston, South Carolina; Savannah, Georgia; and Jacksonville, Florida.

For many years the United States depended on foreign countries, primarily Germany, for our potash supplies. Now, however, the domestic industry has developed to the point where it can meet all foreseeable domestic demands.

Testimony for the domestic companies was presented to the Congressional hearing by George E. Pettit, vice president of the Potash Company of America, who appeared as spokesman for his own and four other major New Mexico producers. Ninety percent of the United States potash is produced in the Carlsbad area of New Mexico.

Mr. Pettit stressed the fact that the American potash industry was not asking protection against any fair competition, but pointed out that Russian potash production is a state monopoly which has neither to make a profit, pay taxes, nor pay labor a fair wage.

"If the pursuit of this policy means sales for an indefinite period of time below costs of production, that means nothing to the Communists," Mr. Pettit declared. "They can ignore economic laws which we must obey if we are to survive."

"And the record proves that they do," he added. "They gouge the American user when supplies are short - they undercut the American producer when that suits their purpose."

"In addition, I am absolutely certain no loyal American farmer wants to buy fertilizer containing Russian potash when he knows the dollars thus taken in will go to buy war materials for possible use against American boys."

Twenty Years Ago With The Progress

Among other ads were those of Smith Brothers Garage, First National Bank, Texas Electric, Ritz Theater, Dr. George and Dr. Edward Blackwell, Dr. M. L. Stubblefield, and Dr. J. B. Brandon.

As to news Texas voted to ratify the 21st amendment which repealed the 18th amendment. Only one county, Duval, voted for repeal with a unanimous vote.

Gorman voted against repeal with 192 against and 81 for repeal. An even larger vote was cast against State Beer and still a larger vote against County Beer.

The approaching opening of school was announced. Miss Clara Mae Underwood and Roy Holliday were announced as new members of the teaching staff. Mrs. M. F. Allen was transferred to High School.

According to the paper editor all pupils were expected to report to their rooms and "get right down to work." Just imagine how hard that must have been on the teachers having such studious pupils.

An account of the wedding of Miss Hazel Harwell and Mr. Doyle Clark filled half a column.

The Congress is now grinding out Appropriations Bills for money to run the Government for the fiscal year beginning July 1 and running to the same period in 1954.

Reductions are being made in practically everything, but unfortunately the greatest reduction must come from National Defense is the cost of Government is greatly reduced.

Since 87 cents of every Federal tax dollar goes to pay for past Wars, foreign Military and economic aid, defense at home, veterans benefits, and the interest on the National Debt, it only leaves 13 cents to run all the other huge activities of the Government.

The National Defense budget has been reduced by over 5 billion dollars, and the Air Force is evidently bearing the brunt of it. The Secretary of Defense says that the efficiency of the Air Force will not be reduced. I hope he is right, but it is hard to see. It concerns me deeply because it just seems there is no choice but to be strong if we are to be safe in the dangerous world in which we live.

Incidentally, I am setting up a file on the requests I receive not to cut funds for this, that, and the other. It seems most of us are for cutting funds which affect the other fellow, but not for expenditures for those things in which we are particularly interested. Usually letters and telegrams start off with, "I am for economy, but - -" or "I am for economy, however - -"

This country is in somewhat the same position as the couple who got married and set up a budget for their living. The boy had a limited income. So they were going to set aside so much money

for this and so much for that. However, after about a month, the boy began to receive bills for things purchased by his wife before their marriage. The bills had to be paid and the budget went out the window.

This country has bought two World Wars for itself and a great many other countries and the bills are past due. These bills are represented by the Public Debt, the interest on which is around 6 billion dollars. In addition, since the present preparedness program started, there is left unpaid approximately 81 billion dollars. Those bills are now becoming due, and they can only be paid from the dollars wrung from the poor old taxpayer. The Congress is always trying to figure out how the bitter pill can be sweetened, but it "ain't" easy.

In the face of these tremendous responsibilities, there is no need for me or anyone else to say that

the path before us is strewn with roses. It is not too difficult for us to face a real crisis when we can see it - - such as War - - but it is human nature for us to lose sight of the essentials before our eyes if we can put it off to another day.

The Eisenhower Administration says that the Budget cannot be balanced this year, even if taxes are not reduced and even if considerable reductions are made in spending. They ask that the excess profits tax on corporations be extended from its expiration date on June 30th.

Regardless of the level of taxes one thing is certain. There is a great need for adjustment of taxes. We need an overhauling of our entire tax system in order to better equalize the burden.

I am often reminded to ask myself which is worse - - to have no convictions or no courage to back them up.

STATE DEPT. OF HEALTH APPROVED AS SPONSOR OF 5-STATE CONGENITAL HEART DISEASE CENTER

The Texas State Department of Health, after consideration by the Crippled Children's Advisory Committee, has been approved as sponsoring agency for a 5-state regional congenital heart disease center to be operated with funds provided by the Children's Bureau, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, State Health Officer George W Cox has announced.

Details of the program were outlined in a report from the Children's Bureau and the Dallas County Medical Society, many of whose members make up the staff of the Children's Medical Center in Dallas, where treatment will be given children admitted under terms of the program.

Five states - Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas - have been combined into a single region for convenience. Applications for admission of children to the Medical Center in Dallas will be accepted from all five states.

Children's Bureau officials said the Children's Medical Center in Dallas was selected as the treatment and diagnostic site for the five-state region because it has facilities for medical and surgical care for children with all types of heart disease, because of its geographical location in respect to the other states involved, and because the Dallas County Medical Society gave its approval and support to the program.

Upon approval of an admission application, the child will be admitted to care. The bills, including board and room for the parent while the child is in Dallas, will be paid with funds provided by the Children's Bureau.

Parents financially able to pay part of the cost are expected to do so, the plan states.

The plan pointed to the need for the program by declaring that congenital heart defects in children in southern states account for approximately 50 percent of all cardiac lesions.

Dr Cox's announcement said objectives of the program were to "provide a mechanism whereby children in this area may have access to existing diagnostic and treatment facilities for congenital cardiac diseases, and to augment training facilities whereby young physicians may become intimately acquainted with the various aspects of this type of disease."
