Accident Fatal Mrs. Carl Ervin

Funeral services for Mrs Carl D Ervin, known to her many friends as Majorie, were held on Friday afternoon at 2:30 P M at the Methodist Church.

While driving to the Gorman Peanut Company Thursday afternoon the pan of her 1949 Ford hung on the rail of the railroad crossing near the mill. The impact brought the car to an instant stop and sent her forward on the steering wheel. Unaware of the seriousness of injury and being unable to move the car, she got out of the car and in her own words, "Tried to get to Carl."

Mr Melvin Shell and Mr Aubrey Grisham seeing her fall repeatedly in her effort to get to the mill rushed to her assistance. They carried her to Blackwell hospital where relatives were summoned and every aid possible was given her before she passed away at four-thirty o'clock.

Rev J L Ray and Rev Tom Small conducted the services.

Mrs Ervin was born August 7, 1922 in Gorman. She was educated in the Gorman school. After marriage she had been employed at several different places including the Gorman Peanut Company. At the time of her death she was working at the Emerson Cafe.

The purposes of this corporation are: "to develop and promote the exchange of ideas, experiences, and practices pertaining to the problems of American business management; to take aggressive action in support of those principles that will further the development of individual incentive; and to take any action necessary or appropriate to carry out the foregoing purposes."

Every since the floor of the old high school began to rot and fall through folks in Gorman have considered a new school. Some believed the building of a new school just couldn't be done. Some believed it shouldn't be done - - the building of a new school.

The school administrator became interested to the degree that he took a census of opinion. The census showed the majority of participants in favor of a new school if it could be financed.

Aware that the people had some two years previously set the tax rate high enough with other income to take care of the liquidation of proposed bonds over a period of years, the school authorities were able to show the people how a new school could be built.

Archie E Skaggs was president of the school board when the bond election was held. Other trustees were Dr D V Rodgers, Hulon Lasater, Cullen Rodgers, T O Shelley, A D (Pete) Mauney, and J W (Pete) Ramsey, who was

secretary of the board.

Architect H. Leo Tucker of Abilene must be credited with presenting the blue-print that proved to be the design for one of the most beautiful if not the most beautiful schools built in any town of less than 25 thousand population in the last ten years. The style is new and the building has some features that have been constructed for the first time among which is the corridor hall with its overhead lighting extending the length of the building.

Carl Butler, Jr and Buddy Williams of the B & W Construction Company of Olden and Bryan put a crew on the job with a foreman, Carl Butler, Sr, who knew how to use a blue-print, to get the desired results. In every type of their work from ceiling to mortar Butler and his men have produced a finish that bears close inspection.


No further meetings are contemplated at this time, however, the membership drive will be continued in the next issue of the Southwestern Peanut Growers News.



A Committee of the United States Senate has voted to increase the salary of Members of Congress and most Federal Judges to \$25,000 a year. I shall not support such a proposition if it comes to a vote in the House of Representatives.

If the Congress would cut out a lot of useless activities, pay more attention to strict legislative matters, and less politics, it would not be necessary for us to remain in almost continuous session every year. It would be cheaper for the individual Member of Congress and to the Nation if we did our work in six months and went home.

Another thing more important than increasing salaries for Members of Congress would be to extend the term of office and prohibit spending of huge sums of money to be elected. Common sense will tell anyone that a man who spends thousands of dollars to be elected is receiving it from sources to which he will be obligated after he is in office. At least he should be if he is going to accept such contributions.

Personally, I had rather have a little time off in order to attend to personal business back home than to have an increase in salary. It is true that in some parts of the United States, only rich men are elected to public office because they can spend great sums on a campaign. There are a number of millionaires in the Congress today, and I doubt if it would be good for the country if the Congress became a "rich man's club." President Eisenhower favors increasing salaries for Senators and Representatives and has said, "There is danger, conditions being what they are, that only the well-to-do could afford to serve in Congress."

Another argument is used that many people in Government receive more than a Member of Congress. Many "bureaucrats" appointed by the Executive and approved by the Senate are paid more than those who have jurisdiction over them. Congressman Martin Dies has suggested that no "bureaucrats" be paid more than a Member of Congress and maybe this is a good idea.

Be this as it may, I repeat, I shall oppose an increase in salaries at a time when we are making great efforts to economize

and balance the budget.

The returns from my annual Questionnaire have been exceedingly gratifying. A few are still coming, and to date, more than 7,500 have been received. A preliminary check shows that most people in the 17th Congressional District decidedly favor balancing the Budget and reducing the huge public debt before reducing taxes. People in our area also, by about 2 to 1 favor an equal percentage of reduction for all taxpayers when taxes are reduced.

Overwhelmingly, those in our area believe that Governmental authority and the expenses it entails, should be turned back to the States and that Government should get out of business and not compete with private enterprise.

The poll shows great favor for the continued effort at Government Reorganization.

People also believe that the United States should continue Military support to the Free Nations of the World if these countries do their part towards building up strength to oppose Russian aggression and Communism.

More strict immigration laws are overwhelmingly favored, and by 3 to 1, the outlawing of the "Union Ship" is favored.

A very great majority have also expressed themselves affirmatively requiring labor Unions to publish financial reports.

A final tabulation will be completed in the next few days and the total results will be furnished in a separate report to this news paper. I hope everyone will find in of interest.

This method of giving people the opportunity to express themselves is, in my opinion, true representative Government I certainly feel it is my duty to know how the people whom I represent think and feel on the various issues with which I must deal.

I am most grateful for the many encouraging words which have accompanied the Questionnaires.

OUR HEREDITY INCREASES OUR DEBT TO POSTERITY

Far be it from the citizens of Gorman to look at the school building and boast, "Look what we have done." But rather they must say, "Our heredity increases our debt to posterity, so we have built the best. We cannot afford to do less considering those who have done so much for us."

About sixty years ago there were those who said, "We must have a school for our children," but where?

The Masonic Lodge is, in history, coupled with philanthropy. By some arrangement school was kept on the lower floor of the hall, a frame building situated on the site presently occupied by the Tom Bennett home.

The Gorman Progress would appreciate hearing from anyone who knows incidents about this school, its pupils or teachers.

According to Walter Underwood (and we don't know whether anyone gets fined for quoting Walter or not) the late Dr A M Allen taught in the school. He recalls that Allen was a great athlete, a talented man and smart enough to use his talents. School teaching as always was "Poor Pay." A vocation with Allen was bricklaying. Evidencing this fact is the building occupied by Frossard's Department Store.

Gorman's second school building was a two story frame located near the site now occupied by the Curtis Spence home.

In 1911 a red brick three story was built on the present grade school site. In 1923 the old high school was built. In 1936-37 the red brick was razed and replaced by the present white brick grade school and gym.

The Homemaking Cottage was built in 1939 and 40. The ball park was built in 1940-41. It was after World War II that the school obtained buildings from the government surplus supply and remodelled them into a bus garage, V A and Shop building and an apartment house.


Citizens, School Board, and Teachers of the past have made these and the new building possible.

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



When the Christmas tree was decorated with care


And there was a new member our excitement to share
