FIRE CHIEF THOMPSON SAYS, "GORMAN HAS BEST IN FIGHTING APPARATUS"

Volunteer Firemen sizing up the new fire truck on its arrival Friday agreed with Chief Quail Thompson's, "Gorman now has the best in fire fighting apparatus."

In a brief interview Thompson said, "The new 2 1/2 ton GMC coming to us at a cost of 9600 dollars not only affords added protection it will cut down on the towns insurance rate even if we don't have to use it."

The accompanying pump will throw 500 gallons per minute under high pressure.

The City's 23 firemen with visiting firemen from De Leon lost no time in getting out to Frank Gray Park for a test of the engine's energy capacity. Needless to say they were not disappointed.

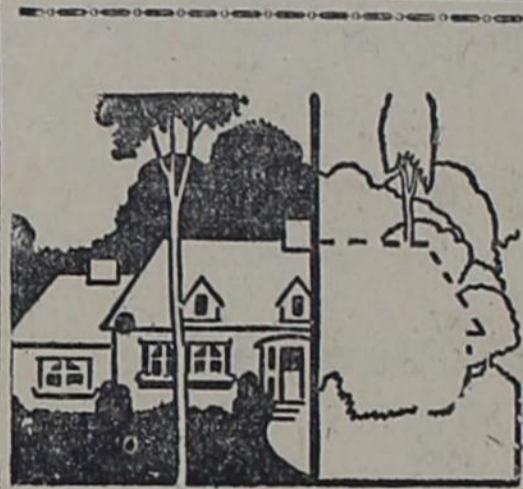
