Desdemona Named For A Pretty Girl Post Office, 1882

The following news article appeared in a 1939 special edition of the Desdemona Gusher:

"It was approximately 1882 when Desdemona was named for one of the early white girl settlers, Miss Desdemona Wynn. The town had for many years been known as Hogtown but when the post office was located the name was changed.

Miss Wynn was the daughter of uire Wynn, the first Justice of eace in Desdemona. Her mother was a cultured Southern woman although she was an invalid. Miss Wynn, legend has it, was also well educated and a lovely girl. She taught one of the first schools in Desdemona.

It is probable, although not certain, that a town meeting was called to select the name. At any rate R H Pierce, one of the lead ing merchants of the town sent in the name and it was used.

Miss Wynn was a sister of the late Mrs Tom Henry, and aunt of Tip Henry and Mrs Eula Jones of Desdemona. She taught school for a time in Fort Worth.

The girl for whom Desdemona was named has been dead for several years.
