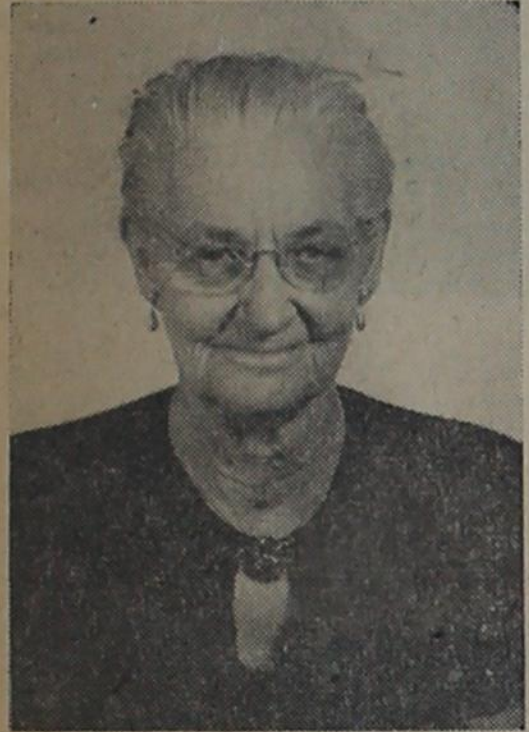

Houston Chronicle List King's Book Best Seller

The Houston Chronicle, Sunday issue listed Dick King's "Ghost Towns of Texas" as fifth best seller for the preceding week.

The Chronicle makes their list from the data from the seven book stores in Houston.

Dick King, formerly of Gorman and at present teaching at West Texas State College in Canyon, has given to the reading public vivid descriptions of the towns that once were, with thrilling and colorful accounts of happenings in sites, the thriving centers of pioneer populations.

Copies of a number of old photographers predicting life in the 19th and early centuries are shown in the introduction leaves.

Historical narrative of the town is divided into sections the first including towns settled almost entirely by Southern European immigrants.

The second sections which is to the writer most interesting tells of the Religious Havens, each of which was settled by different religious groups.

Then there are the Industrial Meccas.

Mr King has told the story of forty-two towns and he has listed 118 other towns. The ruins of many of these still remain.

Lovers of the historical will enjoy "Ghost Towns of Texas."

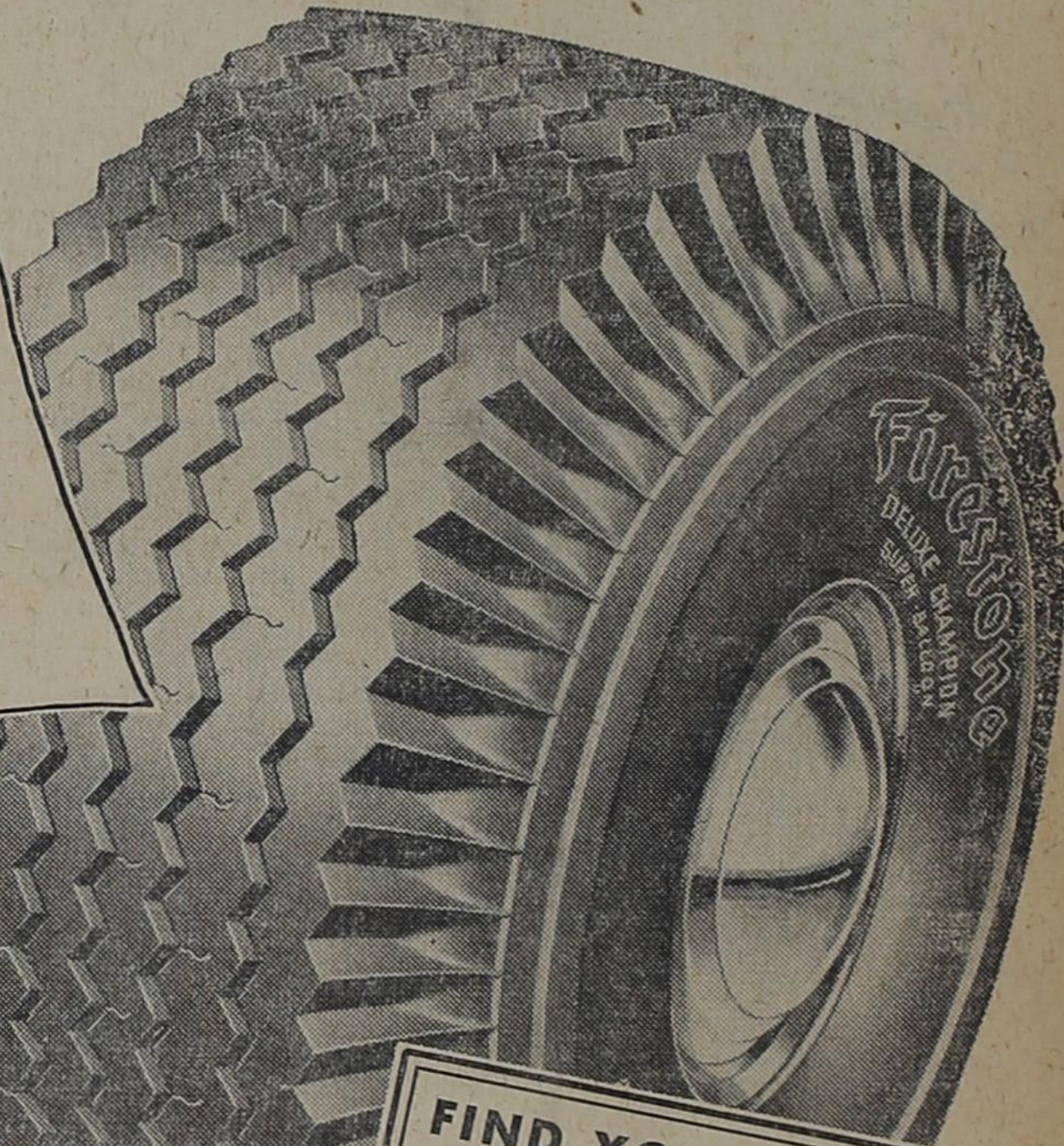

The closing days of the Congress are always hectic and rushed. The closing of this Congress was no different. If we would think of this situation back in the earlier part of the year, probably we would not talk away so many valuable days.

However, it is our system and remains the best in the world. As everyone knows, the House and Senate do not always pass bills in the same form. The result is that these bills must go to a Conference Committee, composed of Members of both House and Senate. In the Conference Committee the differences of opinion are reconciled.

After this is done, the representatives of each of the legislative Bodies report back on their compromise and the Bill must then be approved or rejected by each House of the Congress.

This practice means that final action on much legislation is necessary in the last week or ten days of the Session. The Congress

was in session from early morning until late at night during the last days before adjournment. Such pressure takes its toll in patience, tempers, and sometimes even life itself.

Everyone has his own idea as to whether this First Session of the 83rd Congress has been a success or not. One thing is certain - it is humanly impossible to take up the reins of leadership and responsibility in this huge and complicated government and immediately start doing a perfect job of driving. President Eisenhower and his selected officials have had to learn a lot of things the hard way. The President and most of his top officials admit as much.

Another thing is certain - it is easier to criticize when something goes wrong than to add constructive efforts to see that it doesn't go wrong.

Personally, I know that in this Session of the Congress, as in the past, I have voted and acted on each issue as it was presented, regardless of party or any other

influence. I never contend that I do not make mistakes. Sometimes only the future can prove whether proper judgement has been exercised.

President Eisenhower has already laid out a part of the program for the Second Session of the 83rd Congress, which convenes next January 6th. He indicates that he will ask for certain revisions in the Taft-Hartley Act. He will ask for a revamping of the tax structure; expansions of Social Security to cover another 10 million people or more; probably changes in the Farm Program; a program for the conservation and development of natural resources, particularly water; and other legislation vitally affecting the lives of all of us. From all indications, the next Session of Congress will be an extremely busy one.

The only salary increase I have supported in this Session of the Congress was for the Chaplain of the House of Representatives. He devotes his full time to the Members and employees. From day to day he takes the place of the local Minister back home.

His salary had been forgotten and he never mentioned it. Several of us, however, happened to find he was only being paid \$2800 a year, which could only mean a bare living in Washington. We were able to raise his pay to \$4200. He was getting less than some of the lowest paid employees.

As this is published, I shall be on my way back home and will soon be visiting over my Congressional District. It is my hope that I shall see many of you for a visit.
