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New Years and Superstition Go

Mankind has always been superstitious about New Years.

In olden times families south a glimpse into the future by the "dipping" custom. The head of the family, with his eyes closed, opened the family Bible and inpreted was indictive of the luckgood or bad-that was in store for them.

Probably one of the most widespread superstitions concerned the first person to cross the threshold and light-haired men were considered unlucky, as where people who walked pigeon-toed.

In some villages, the superstition was taken so seriously that a dark-haired man was hired to be the first-footer. Going from house to house, he would be the first person to cross the threshold, thus preserving the good fortune of the

Anglo-Saxons, believing that something might happen when the New Year occurred often climbed upon the roof on New Year's eve so as to have a good view of any such event.

We moderns make as much noise as possible, presumably because our primitive ancestors believed that noise would keep evil influences at a distancé.

New Year's Day

On January New Year's was not always celebrated on January 1. In fact,

even today New Years comes on different dates for some peoples. Prior to September 14, 1752, England and her colonies regarded January 1 with indifference be-

cause New Year's day was observed on March 25. Today, many people who continue to use the Gregorian calendar still solemnize traditional feasts, including New Year, on different days. The Gregorian calendar was not presented to the world until 1582 by Pope Gregory XIII.

The Jews observe a 10-day New Year season at the time of the autumn equinox, beginning on Rosh Hashana and ends on Yom Kippur. The Moslem calendar (dating from 626, A. D.) has 12 months of the year that begin with the approximate new moon without any intercalation to keep them geared to the seasonal equinoxes. As a result New Years and months re-




the seventh century B. C. It was revised several times, but by Julius Caesar's time it was two months behind the sun. When Caesar's experts revised


the calendar in the 16th century there was the problem of catching up with the sun. So two months were inserted between the months of November and December. As a result 46 B. C. contained 445 days.

Modern research has developed a new time clock, which uses the principle of radioactivity. Wood samples can be radioactively dated back as far as 4,600 years.


Pre-Red Russia Observed New Years




