



1 cup brown sugar 2 eggs

1 cup Peanut Butter

3 cups all-purpose flour l teaspoon salt I teaspoon bak, powd.

l teaspoon bak. soda ½ cup salted peanuts

chopped 1 tablespoon cold water l easpoon vanilla
