



March Of Dimes Benefit Games Set For Feb. 11th



Not wanting to use local folk for judging the Peanut entries, Monday, February 15th, I called on my friend, I. E. McWhirter at the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He referred me to Anna Bines, Home Service Director for the Texas Electric Service Co. I called on Miss Bines and she was cooperative, but due to a previous commitment on that date she referred me to Tarleton College. President Howell of Tarleton solved all of my troubles and the judges will be announced next week.

Received a letter from Miss Bines Tuesday morning with the following peanut recipes. Miss Bines said Ballard's Restaurant of Monohans, Texas, specialized in peanut cream pie and they were experimenting on a similar recipe. Of course, Miss Bines recommended an electric range for easier cooking.

PEANUT BUTTER CREAM PIE
1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup shortening
2 to 4 tablespoons cold water

Peanut Butter Cream Filling Meringue
Combine flour and salt. Cut shortening into dry ingredients until crumbs are about the size of small peas. Add cold water, a little at a time, mixing with fork until dough forms a ball. Roll to about 1/8 inch thickness. Line 9-inch pie plate, allowing 1/2-inch crust to extend over edge. Fold edge of pastry under and crimp. Bake in hot oven (425°F) for 12 to 15 minutes. Cool. Pour Peanut Butter Cream Filling in pie shell. Top with Meringue. Bake in moderate oven (350°F) for 12 to 15 minutes. 6 servings.

PEANUT BUTTER FILLING
2 cups milk
1/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 egg yolks
1/4 cup peanut butter
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Scald milk. Combine sugar, brown sugar, flour, and salt. Gradually add hot milk. Return to medium heat - cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Beat egg yolks and add custard slowly. Heat until yolks are cooked, about 2 minutes. Add peanut butter and vanilla. Cool.

MERINGUE
3 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg whites and salt until they form soft peaks. Gradually add sugar, then vanilla, and continue beating until smooth.

The feature of this contest is Southwest Spanish Peanuts and Peanut Butter. Whatever you make be sure and attach your recipe and have your entry in by two o'clock Monday, February 15th.

While visiting my friend, Ralph Tucker, publisher of the De Leon Free Press, Tuesday, he remarked that he had heard a good bit about the Peanut Contest which probably means there will be several entries from Comanche County.

Local Superintendent Attends Conference State Administrators

Mr. Ross Wilson, local school superintendent, was among the 150 state public school administrators attending a conference on Tuesday held in Abilene at the Windsor Hotel. The conference attendees represented schools of Area 7.

There were 26 such conferences held throughout the State of Texas simultaneously.

Consultant for the conference was Bascom Hayes of the Texas Educational Agency. The purpose of the conference was "TO INITIATE METHODS BY WHICH THE INSTRUCTION PROGRAM OF EACH INDIVIDUAL SCHOOL MIGHT BE APPRAISED."

Mr. Hayes stated that Texas is the first of the 48 States to attempt the appraisal of the individual school by the plan presented.

The appraisal with its compiled results will not only benefit the Board of Directors in their work for the overall system of Public Schools but will be a source of information for the individual school and the individual teacher whereby they may be encouraged to correct error and to pride themselves on progress they are making with proved methods.

Check lists have been provided for schools of the various classes, A, AA, B, etc., in the 13-county area. The individual self-appraisal reports will be compiled by counties, areas and finally as a State Report. Reports are to be turned in by April 23rd from the individual school.

F. H. A. NEWS

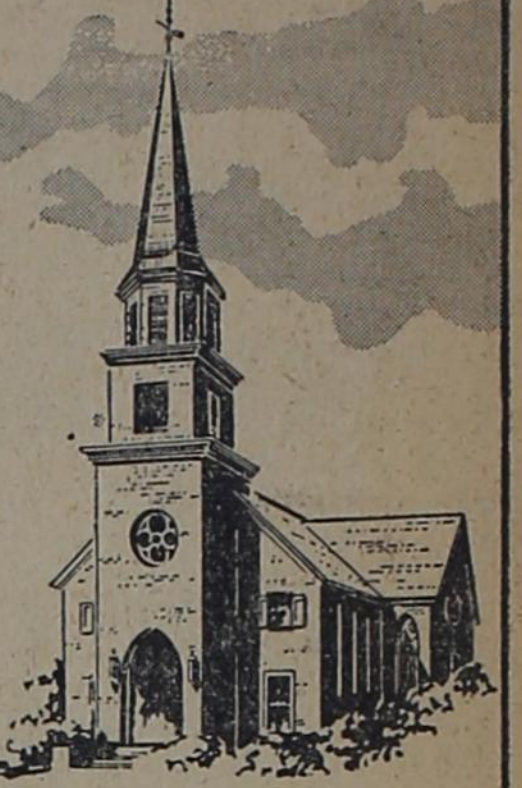
The Future Homemakers of America Club had a short meeting Monday night. We had planned to have a party but because of ball games we had to call it off.

1 cup sugar	1 teaspoon salt	1 tablespoon cold water
1 cup brown sugar	1 teaspoon bak. powd.	1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs	1 teaspoon bak. soda	
1 cup Peanut Butter	1/2 cup salted peanuts	

Cream shortening, add sugar and eggs. Beat until light and creamy. Then add PEANUT BUTTER and blend thoroughly. Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. 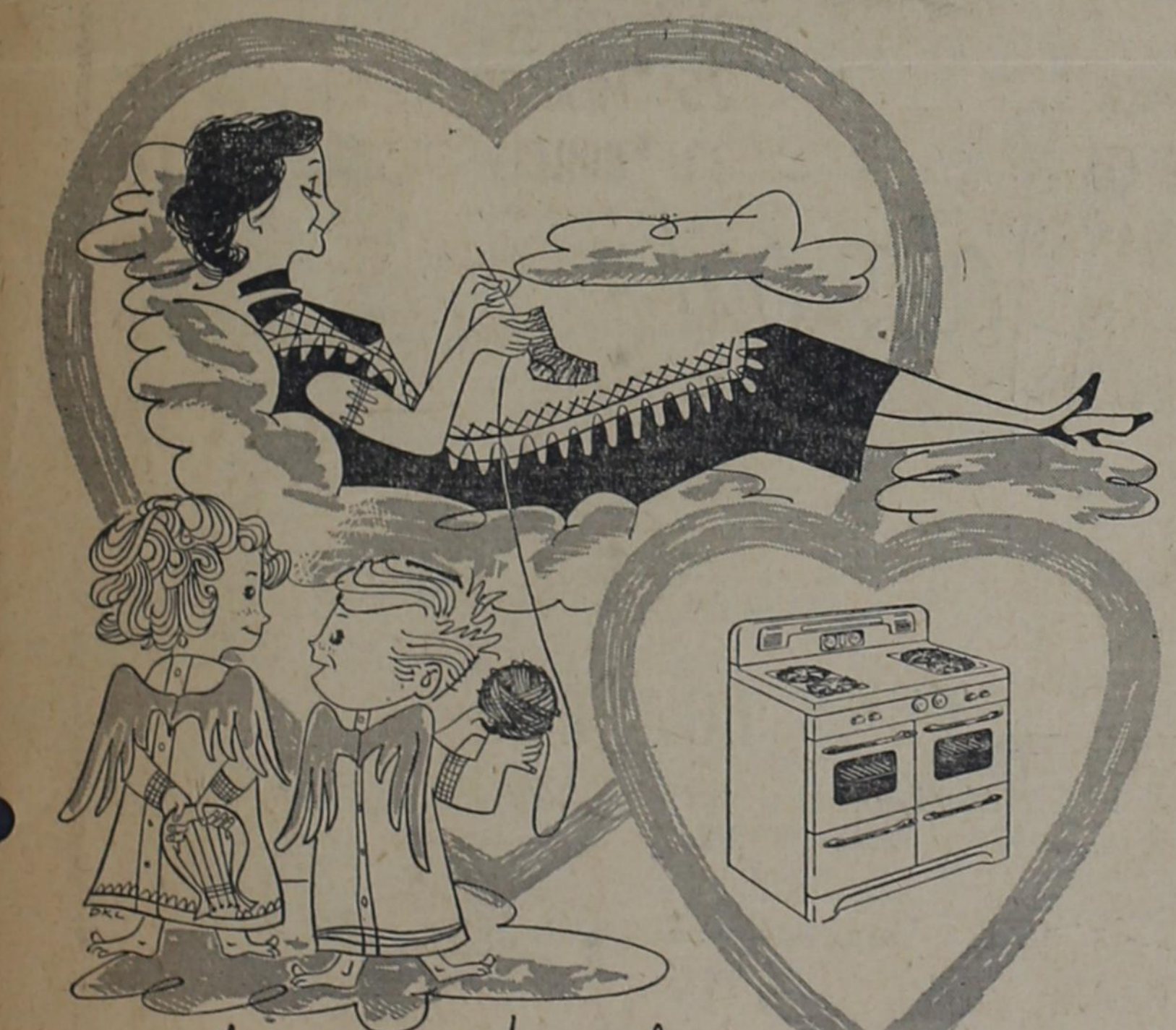

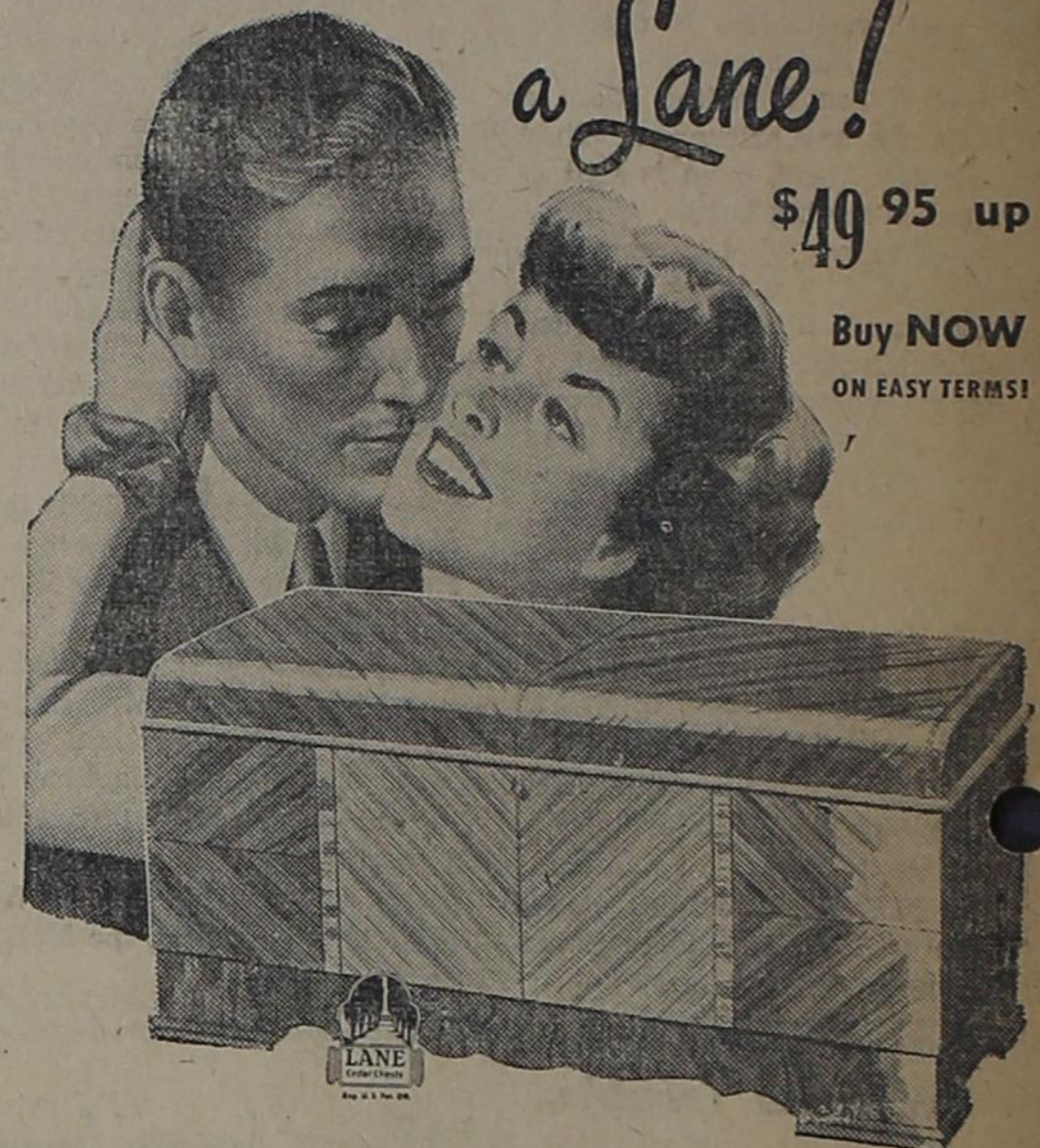

| 2 eggs, separated | 1/2 teaspoon vanilla |
| 1 3/4 cups cake flour sifted | 3/4 cup chopped peanut confect |
| 2 teaspoons baking powder | |

Work shortening until creamy - then add sugar gradually continuing to cream. Beat egg yolks well and stir into mixture. Sift together flour, salt and baking powder and add alternately with milk and vanilla to mixture, beating well after each addition. Then beat whites until stiff an fold into mixture. Marble peanut confect through the mixture. Place in two greased and floured 8" cake pans. Bake in moderate oven of 375°F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until layers are done.

NOTE: 1/2 cup corn syrup and 1/2 cup sugar may replace 1 cup sugar, in which case reduce milk to 6 tablespoons.

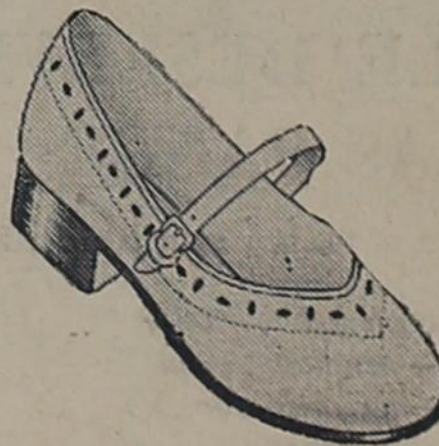
