

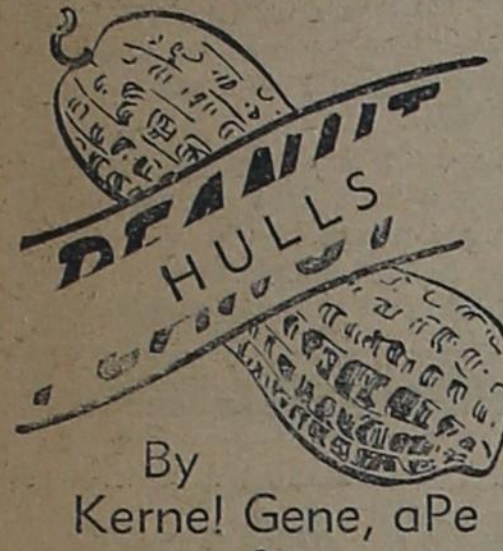

Vehicles Must Be Licensed In Your Residence County

Sam B. Stewart, investigator for the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department, was in the Tax Collector's Office this week and posted notices to all Motor Vehicle owners the requirements of The Texas Registration Law regarding the registration of your vehicle in the county of your residence.

Mr. Stewart said that operation of a vehicle registered elsewhere subjects you to a fine up to \$200 and re-registration in your home county.

During the 1953 registration year, the Highway Department filed a large number of complaints against vehicle owners for this violation. He said that by placing these posters in all Tax Collector's Offices, the Department hopes to place the motoring public on notice of this requirement of the law and avoid violations of this type during the 1954 Registration Year.

Favorites Advance In First Round Of Tournament

The Hamilton and Comanche girls and the Ranger boys who were all rated among pre-tournament favorites, safely passed the first hurdle of the Indian Trail Tournament. The Stephenville boys and the Lipan girls have yet to make their initial appearance in the tourney. The Ranger boys stopped Cross Plains 43-39 with Tommy Hinds leading the way with 15 points. Newton was high for Cross Plains with 13. The Hamilton girls waltzed to an easy 58-17 win over Eastland, Manning was high for the winners with 24 points and Roberts had 22 tallies for runner-up honors. Tri-favorite Comanche girls defeated Gorman 68-48 as Andress scooped 48 points for Comanche taking over the tourney lead in individual scoring. Melba Brown was high for Gorman with 21 points. In other first round games Mineral Wells boys defeated Gorman 43-24; Lingleville boys 60, Carbon 30; Lingleville girls 39, Carbon 28; De Leon boys 47, Desdemona 32; Dublin girls 37, De Leon 32.

The Much Discussed Amendment Of Senator Bricker of Ohio

The reading of the pros and cons of the Bricker Amendment leaves the reader with the assurance that the proponents of the Bricker Amendment seek to prevent the repetition of such infamous acts as agreements at Yalta, Potsdam and Teheran, the committing of the military to fight in Korea by a single voice, the seizure of the steel mills -

Shell of the Gorman Peanut Company and S. E. Cloninger.

Living about sixteen hours a day with in two doors of the Empire Southern Gas Company. I have watched the personnel of this company put in some long, hard hours during our recent freeze striving to give us all plenty of gas so that we could keep warm. Pressure got pretty low at our house once or twice but all in all I think they did a swell job. I do know we kept four stoves going day and night most of the month. What is this all about? I happened to hear a couple of fellows growling about the high cost of utilities and I checked to see if I was paying too much for my comfort. Now I can't compare this to chopping wood and carrying coal because in my youth I had two older brothers who took care of that. When it came my turn to do this work we moved to the city. Just the thought of doing such gruesome work on a freezing morning gives me the shivers. So I divided all the hours in a month into my bill and discovered it was costing me about three cents an hour to keep a six room house (that is well ventilated with age) warm. Me thinks I will stick to gas. The point of this is - before you growl at the folks who are really working for you check and see if you have a growl coming.

It is strange to me that people have to be urged to pay their Poll Tax when it is to their advantage to do so. Without it one cannot take any part in selecting officials to run your town or county or any other public office.

This year we will have a city election as well as electing officials to county, state and national offices. To the fellow who has paid his poll tax he really does not care whether you pay yours especially if you are voting against his favorite candidates.

In case you want to be an active citizen and help chose your public officials see E E Todd at Higginbotham's or you can buy them at the Court House in Eastland if you have any taxes to pay

And more than this the proponents seek to protect the citizen from present and future International Law which would supersed or make invalid provisions of the Constitution of the United States.

With strict construction of the Constitution no amendment would be necessary. But our government has gone far beyond strict construction in past years.

Our Constitution has been so loosely constructed in application that we scarcely recognize that it is our Constitution.

It amazes the student of government and should amaze the man on the street that the Congressmen of the past several decades would let the State Department and the Chief Executive usurp the power of the two bodies.

The thinking citizen recovers from his or her amazement and realizes that citizens did not and do not demand action of Congressmen.

Americans have given and continue to give President Eisenhower a great vote of confidence -

However, recognizing him as a very great citizen and a potential great president does not belie the fact that the office and the department that is the Office of the Chief Executive and the Department of State - must be kept in their entirety and the original usage must be reverted to if the United States is to continue under Constitutional Government.

From the presidential point of view, it can be understood why the chief executive with the colossal international tangle, mounting higher and higher, would balk at what he believes would limit his authority to the point of curtailing his efficiency.

The president has shown that he knows his responsibilities to be grave and citizens have no reason to doubt this particular president's sincerity.

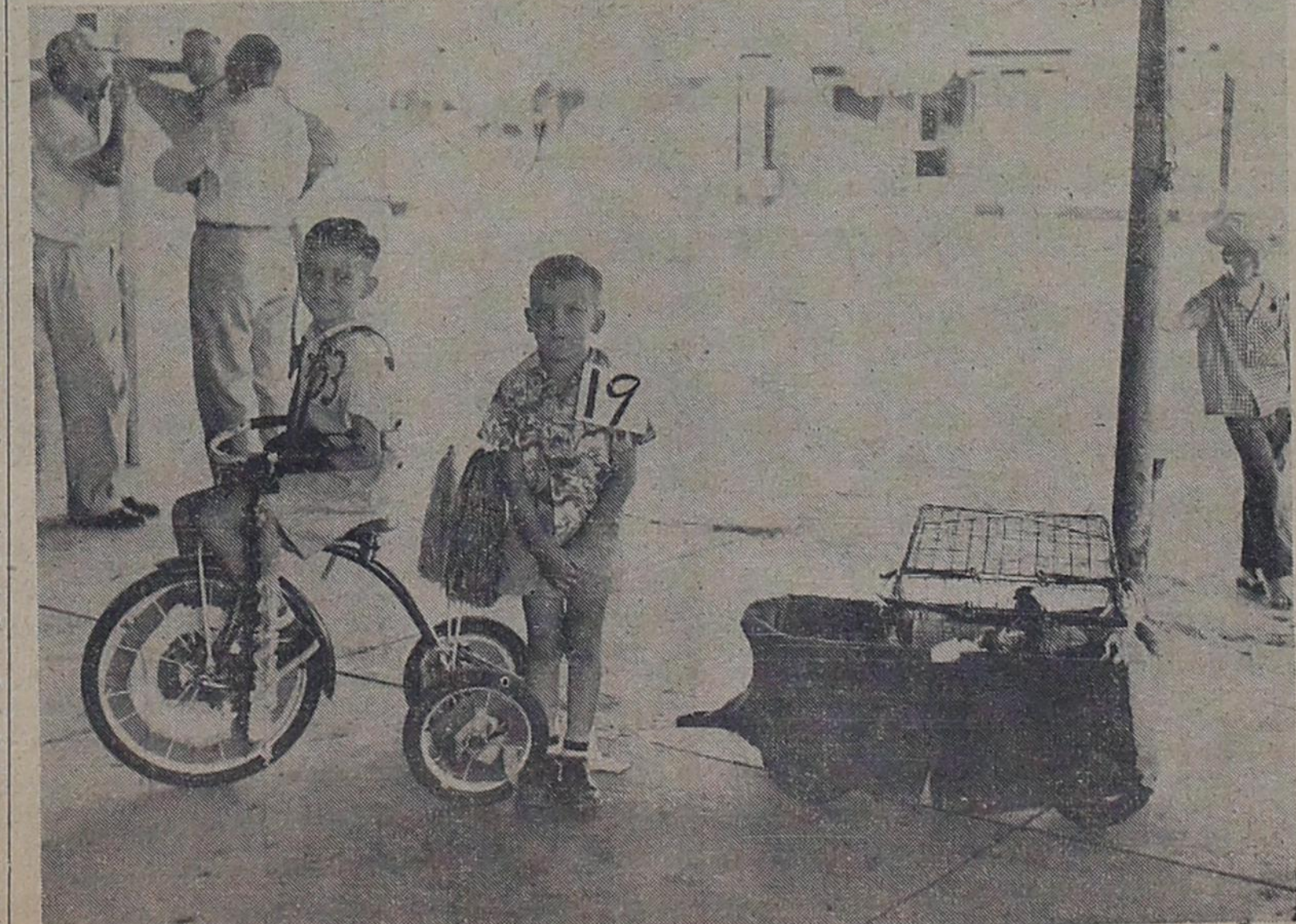

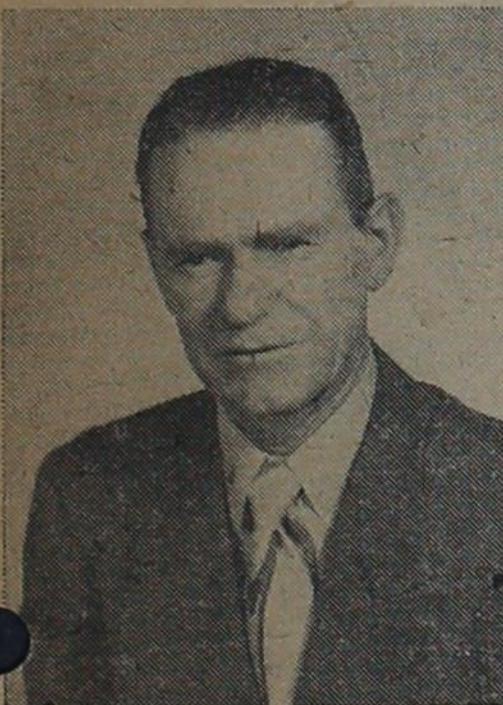
Shown in the picture are Mike and his brother, Denny of Fort

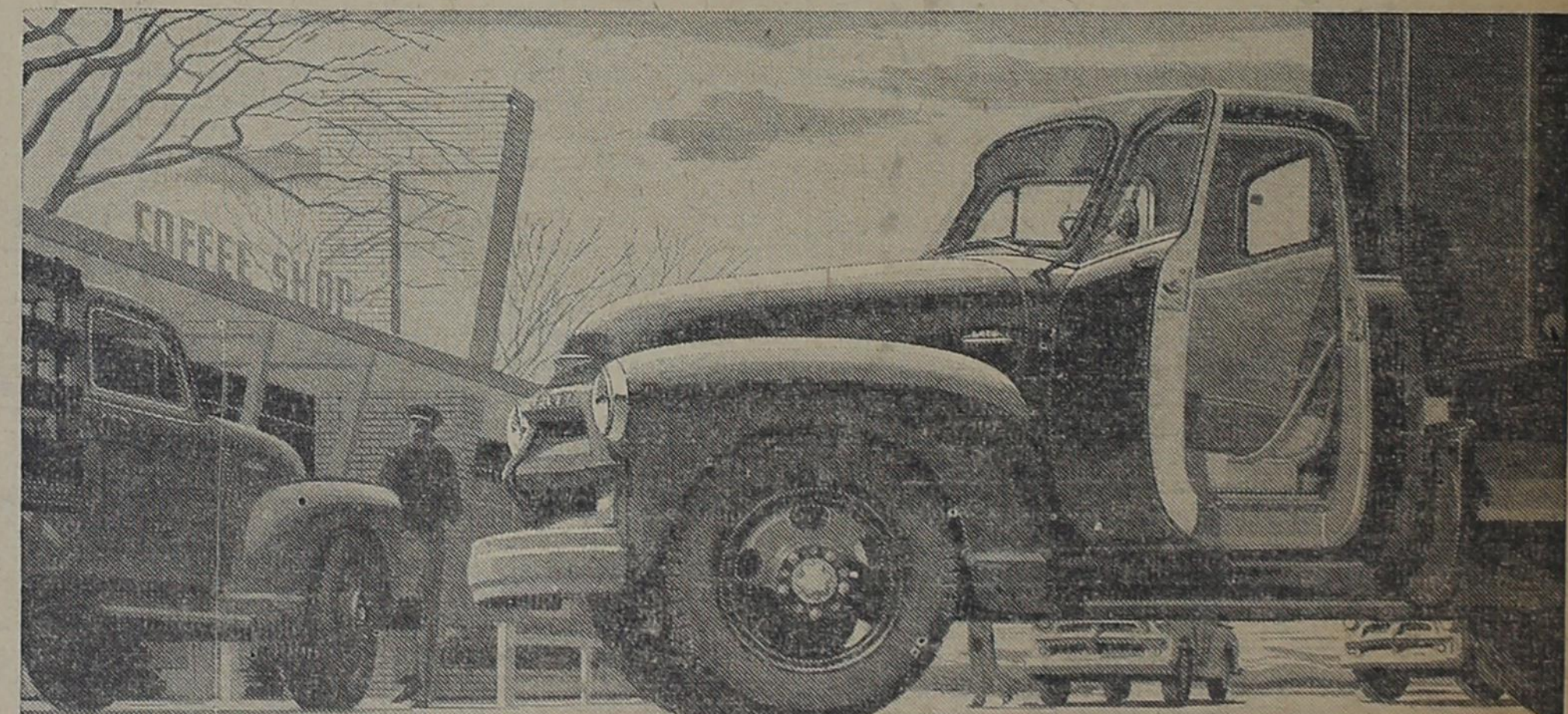

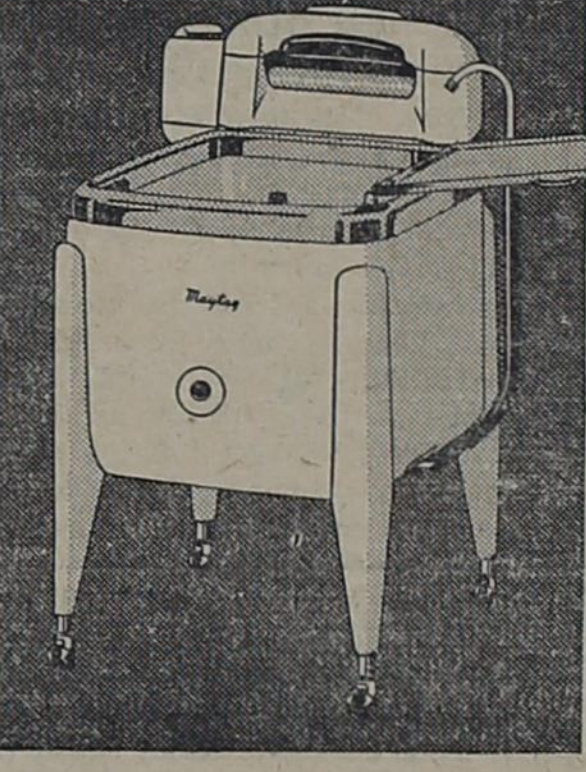

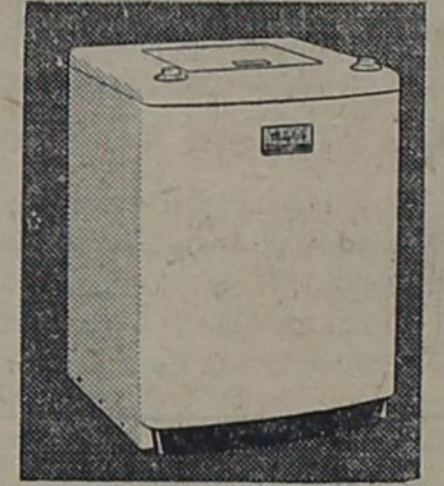

WORLD WHERE A TREATY BE COMES EFFECTIVE AS DOMESTIC LAW BEFORE LEGISLATION HAS BEEN REGULARLY PASSED MAKING IT SO.

The following is a quote from a pamphlet published by the Committee for Constitutional Government:

"Due to the pressure of other business treaties can be ratified with only a few senators present. Last year (probably 1952) a treaty was ratified with only Senator Sparkman of Alabama in the chair and Senator Tye of Minnesota in the Senate Chamber. Treaties with Greece and Turkey which could put us into war in defense of these countries were ratified with only six senators present and voting."

The Bricker Amendment proposes to prevent any treaty, which is not valid under Our Constitution, from becoming a law of our land.

Senator Bricker is showing the qualities of a statesman that our finest Democrats failed to show in denying, retrieving, or curtailing their treaty powers so freely used by the late Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Truman at so great a loss to our nation.

Bricker is bucking his own party. He is putting his country first. It behooves us as citizens to make a study of this amendment with its year-long pending legislation and to thus express ourselves.
