



Peanut Hay Worth More As Fertilizer

San Saba (Tex.) News. - Does it pay to remove and sell peanut hay after harvest, or is it more profitable to return it to the soil? That is a question that several San Saba County farmers have answered by experimentation on their own farms.

Since peanuts are grown primarily for the nuts, the income from the hay is a small item and the expense of baling and hauling takes nearly half of what it

An annual return of hay to the soil helps build up fertility, while removing the hay constantly lowers fertility. Low fertility leaves the soil more subject to erosion by wind and water. In addition to increasing fertility, crop residue on the soil increases its water holding capacity and substantially reduces wind and water erosion.

Farmers in the San Saba-Brady Soil Conservation District who have been returning peanut hay to their soil for the past two to four years include Anson Garrett, Eddie Vogel, T. N. Wood, Charlie Munsell, C. C. McKinnerney, R. A. Rankin, N. B. Bolinger, and James E. Land.



Almost Persuaded

A Gospel Singer Waits for a Train

One Sunday in the early 1870's a lone man stepped from a train in a small Eastern town. His name was Philip Bliss. After twenty years of impoverishment and heart-breaking work, he had risen to the front ranks of America's gospel singers and hymn composers.

Deeply religious, Bliss never missed an opportunity to attend church. He also had very practical reasons for his interest in sermons. It was from the pulpit that he drew ideas for most of his hymns. Dwight L . Moody had told the story of a shipwreck and Bliss had written "Let the Lower Lights Be Burning." He had heard Evangelist D. W. Whittle tell of a battle during the Civil War and he came up with his hymn, "Hold the Fort."

Waiting for his connecting train to Chicago, the composer slipped into a church. The preacher was reading from the Acts of the Apostles . . . ". . . 



charge of this unit. Located too in Fort Worth will be a Field Cartographic Unit, one of seven such units in the nation. These units are part of the Wash ington, D. C. staff located in the field to meet the needs for aerial photographic maps and other types of cartographic reproduction. The Fort Worth Cartographic maps and other types of car tographic reproduction. The Fort Worth Cartographic Unit will also serve Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. H. L. Dean will head this unit.

"Functions of the SCS in carry ing out the national program of soil and water conservation through soil conservation districts are not changed in any way," Smith said. This action transfers greater responsibility to the state SCS offices and gives these offices additional technical and administrative personnel. In practically every instance the same personnel now directly serving soil conservation districts will continue in their jobs."





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
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
