# Britain Intervenes In Syrian Crisis

### Shuri Flank Attack Is Pressed Jap Garrison **Fanatically Holds To City**

By HAMILTON W. FARON GUAM, May 31 (AP) -First Division Marines, who yesterday raised the American flag in victory over Shuri castle, pressed a flank attack today against the Nipponese Shuri town garrison fanatically holding out against two divisions north and east of the ruined city.

The advance patrols of the Fifth regiment met slight opposition as they shoved ahead toward the western flank of the almost encircled enemy. The already knee-deep mud

which has slowed the whole Okinawa campaign for weeks was made more soupy by fresh down-All available Tenth army men

carrying munitions, water and rations afoot to the fighting fronts. Company A of the Fifth regiment under Capt. Julius D. Dusenberry of Charlotte, S. C., first occupied Shuri castle, medieval fortress which was the home of 16th century Ryukyu kings and in recent months the headquarters of the Japanese command on Oki-

The invading Leathernecks found only 50 Japanese troops, which they killed, and two women and a baby. The garrison had withdrawn with most of its equipment before the attack into the pile of shattered ma-

One of the first acts of the occupying company was to raise the Civil War Confederacy, which was the company's victory flag at bloody Peleliu. The American standard was officially raised approximately 25 hours later.

Marines of Maj. Gen. Pedro A. Del Valle's First division hoisted the colors at 1:45 p. m. yesterday. Advance units of Maj. Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr.'s Sixth Marine division on the west flank and Maj. Archibald V. Arnold's Seventh infantry division on the east were, at last reports, less than two miles apart. Their expected juncture about a mile south of Shuri will ring that second city of Okinawa and halt ap-

Adm. Chester W. Nimitz' communique today said Marine reinforcements reached the castle. Naha, the Okinawa capital on the west coast, was wholly in American hands except for isolated groups of Japanese.



### **Churchill Calls** On French To **Recall Troops**

LONDON, May 31 (AP)-Britain ordered her commander in the Middle East to intervene in the fighting between French and Syrians today. Prime Minister Churchill called upon Gen. De Gaulle to withdraw French troops to their barracks to prevent further bloodshed in the strategic Levant.

"In order to avoid a collision beween British and French forces we request you immediately to order French troops to cease fire and to withdraw to their bar-

racks," Churchill told Degaulle. British forces have been in Syria since 1941 when they and the Free French knocked out German control.

The actions was announced in emergency session of the British cabinet in 24 hours.

"Once firing has ceased and order has been restored we shall be prepared to begin tripartite discussion here in London," the message to De Gaule continued. Eden said the British minister in Damascus had reported a fur-

ther grave deterioration of the

Churchill told DeGaulle that Britain's order to Gen. Sir Bere nard Paget, British commander in the middle east, to intervene had been issued with "profound re-

The note said Britain's communications in the war with Japan and the security of the whole middle east were involved in Britain's course of action.

Eden's statement was repeated by Lord Woolton in the house of Lords and was cheered by that

Eden said Britain was in close touch with all the governments concerned, including the United States, but declined details on the ground that nothing should be said "which would make the diplomatic initiative more difficult."

In his Paris statement the Syrian Minister, Adnan Bey Atassi, declared the Syrian position was that the presence of French troops in the country was unnecessary for strategic purposes as Syria was



#### Spread Sugar For Your Sweet Spreads

By RHEBA MERLE BOYLES

County Home Dem. Agent Foresighted home canners who intend to make sweet spreads this year are checking favorite recipes and planning ahead how best to spread out the 5-pound-per-person canning sugar ration allowed for sweet spreads and relishes. Fruit sweets make appetizing spreads for bread, especially when table fats are scarce, and pickles and relishes add zest to meals needing a flavor lift.


families may choose to forego number of square feet in the floor sweet spreads and use the sugar of the chicken house and putting for canning. Five pounds of su- in just that many chicks. gar is enough to sweeten 20 quarts

20 to 40 average-sized jelly glasses-that is, one-third pint. Yields vary with type of spread, method of cooking, and whether or not sugar stretchers are used.

Fruit butters are the most sugar economical of the sweet spreads, requiring only half as much sugar as fruit pulp used. A little chicks means healthier fowls pound of sugar will make about 3 pints of a butter.

In jam and preserve recipes that ordinarily call for equal parts by weight of sugar and fruit, the proportion can satisfactorily be cut to 3-4 as much sugar. With this proportion, 1 pound of sugar will make around 1 1-2 to 2 pints, or 4 to 6 jelly glasses of jam.

For jellies, a pound of sugar made up with a pint of fruit juice yields on the average 1 1-2 pints. which would fill about 4 glasses. When jelly recipes call for 3-4 to 1 part of sugar for every part by measure of fruit fuice, use the smaller proportion of sugar. Jellymaking is a delicate art, and tinkering with jelly recipes by any but experienced jelly makers is unwise. Failure may mean loss of precious sugar.

1. Higher wages have drawn many to the Michigan beet fields and into defense plants. 2. Mexico has repatriated thousands, and tightened up on immigration restrictions.

3. The valley laborers have an inclination to remain there and work on year-round jobs. 4. The alien registration law forced many workers back into Mexico.

5. Selective service, and volunteering, have taken many of the Mexican men who are natives of this country.

Communities which depend upon cotton, and the farmers around those communities wanted to do something, and the Good Neighbor Commission, and the farm labor office of Texas A. & M. College etxension service offered a way to meet the problem. How they did it is quite a story.

First was the problem of control of the available labor supply. lovelier, be more alive in Shoes; Pumps, Sandals and a glorious array! farm agents, who keep in constant touch with the need for piekers in their counties, and pass along their information for coordination. Then field agents, all Spanish-speaking, from the farm labor office tell the workers where they are needed, and when, and how many are needed in each area. Pamphlets have been printed in Spanish to sell the program to the pickers. And the agents will go into beer joints, churches, plazas and stores to tell and sell the story of what the picker may expect in the field this year.

Pickers, used to camping out under conditions calculated to give hysterics to health officers, will find in the pamphlets pictures which may be startling to them: Sanitary centers are being provided for them, along with offices away from the dreaded "law" of the courthouse where they may get information.

More than a hundred communities have committed themselves to ties have committed themselves to spend real money on these civic centers for the itinerant population. Typical examples are Lubbock, \$10,000; Big Spring, \$6,000; Haskell, \$3,500; Post, \$5,000; Lamesa, \$4,200; Slaton, \$7,200; Stamford, \$4,000; Colorado City, \$3,000; Levelland, \$5,000; Littlefield,





### Forward - Looking Move

### The War Today

The increasingly bloody clash in Syria between natives and French troops is based on a fundamental which should cause peace-makers the world over to pause for reflection, and it's this:

The Syrians have the Atlantic Charter in the melting-pot and they're applying the heat to discover what its promises of sovereignty mean to

The matter isn't confined to Syria. We see it in another significant development in the Middle East. This is the demand by Iran (Persia) that British, Russian and American troops be withdrawn from the country. There the Atlantic Charter crops up again.

The British and Russians are self-invited guests at the Persian board. They invaded the country in 1941 when the Teheran government failed to oust thousands of Germans who were using Persia as a base for activities against the Allies.

There was fighting and the Persians changed their minds. A British-Russian-Persian alliance was signed - and it was based on the Atlantic

American troops were sent to Persia to run one of the world's greatest transport jobs-movement of war supplies to Russia from the head of the Persian Gulf by rail and desert highways. The Yanks appeared to be welcome, though it wasn't quite clear whether this was because the Persians loved us the more or our Allies the less. Anyway, I was told in the Persian capital that the people frankly
