"Realities of Teen Sex" Discussion To Be Presented At De Leon High School

Nationally known speaker, Pat Socia, will address parents about the realities of teen sex and Thursday, April 17 at the De Leon High School. Mrs. Socia has been a public speaker for the past fifteen years on topics related to families, sexual relationships in marriage, preparing for adolescence, dating and drug & alcohol abuse. She speaks across the United States to over 250,000 students a year. Socia has degrees in education, and business with a minor in history. She graduated with honors and is a member of Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. As a former teacher of middle and high school students, Pat understands, loves, and has a special concern for teenagers and the challenges they face growing up in the 90's.

Many schools invite her to speak each year at the request of students who have heard her at a drug conference, or at the request of teachers, administration, and parents who have attended her training conferences or workshops. Her sincerity, understanding, and direct approach often bring the audiences to standing ovations.

And remember to smile-because God Loves You!

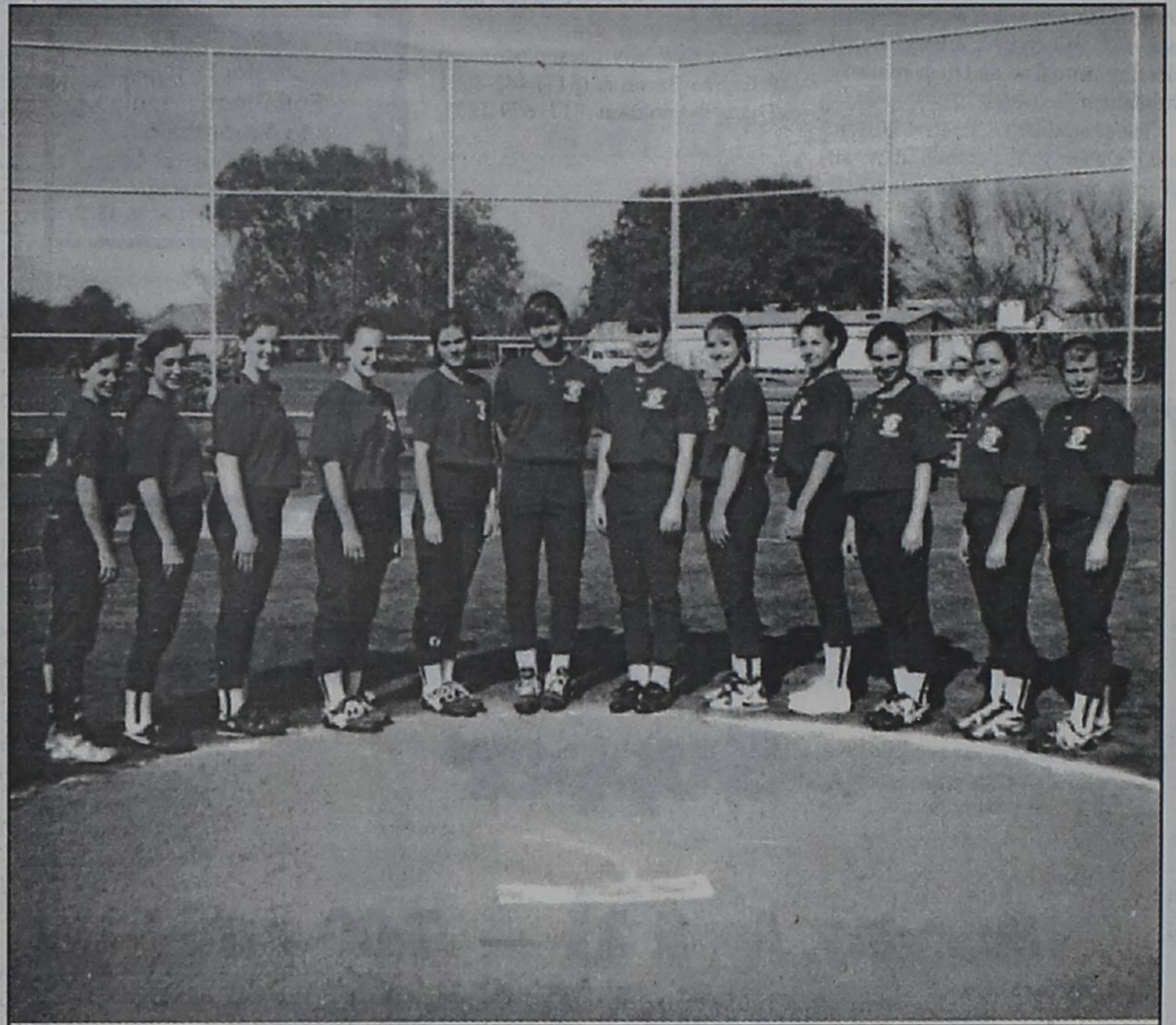

Dean Christian McNeill Retires From Heritage Manor



Dean Christian McNeill retires after thirty years of service in the Nursing Home Industry, where she worked as an nurses aide, charge nurse, training coordinator, director of nursing and nursing home administrator prior to her nursing home employment, she worked fourteen years for the Gulf States Telephone Company in Stephenville.

Dean began her employment in a nursing home as a nurses aide in July 1967 in Stephenville, and worked as a nurses aide until September 1974 when she was accepted into Mineral Well School of vocational nurses where she graduated on Sept. 4, 1975. At that time, she was awarded the Florence Nightingale Award by the Doctors and Nurses at the Palo Pinto General Hospital for the best all around nurse.

After she received her nurses license, she worked as Charge Nurse at the Loving Care Nursing Home in Stephenville and two years later went to work at the Community Nursing Home as Training Coordinator and Director of Nurses.

In June 1978, Dean began her courses for Nursing Home Administrator and worked in nursing after school. She attended Tarrant County Jr. College, Tarleton State University, and University of Texas. She received her associate degree in Long Term Care and Social Sciences in Sept. 1980. After receiving her Administrator license, she worked at the Dublin Nursing Home as administrator and the Blue Bonnet Nursing Home in Albany.

Feb. 1, 1986 she began her employment with The Management Group in Gorman, at the facility which is now known as Heritage Manor of Gorman.

On June 22, 1993, Dean was transferred to another The facility in Cisco, Tx. In July 1994, she was awarded a plaque as distinguished member of Who's Who of Business Leaders for 1194-95.

View Point PECANS

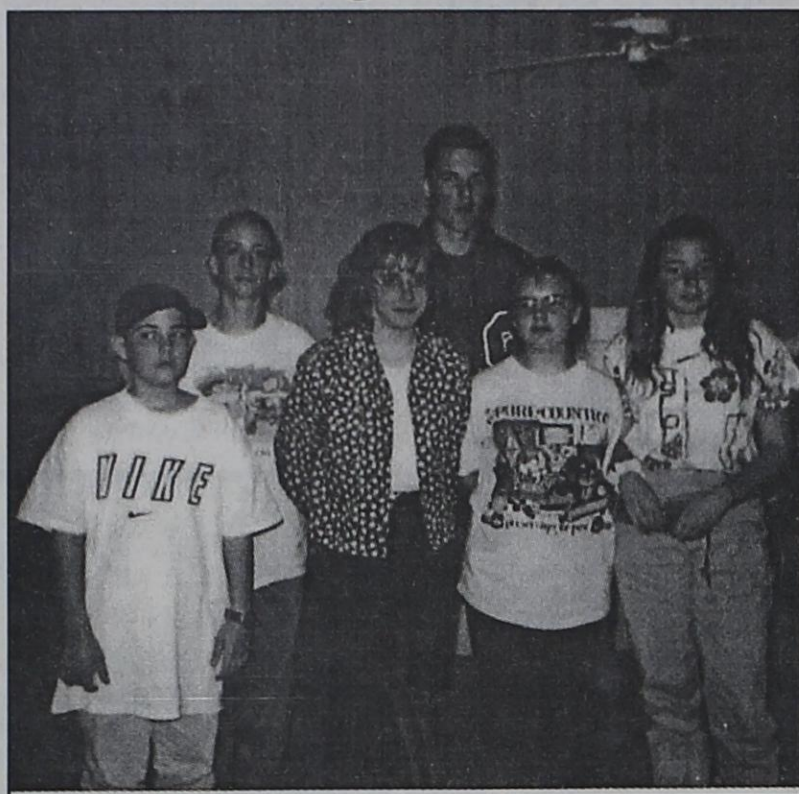
At Kirtland Air Force Base, he serves as the chief of policy, plans, and programs at the Air Force Safety Center.

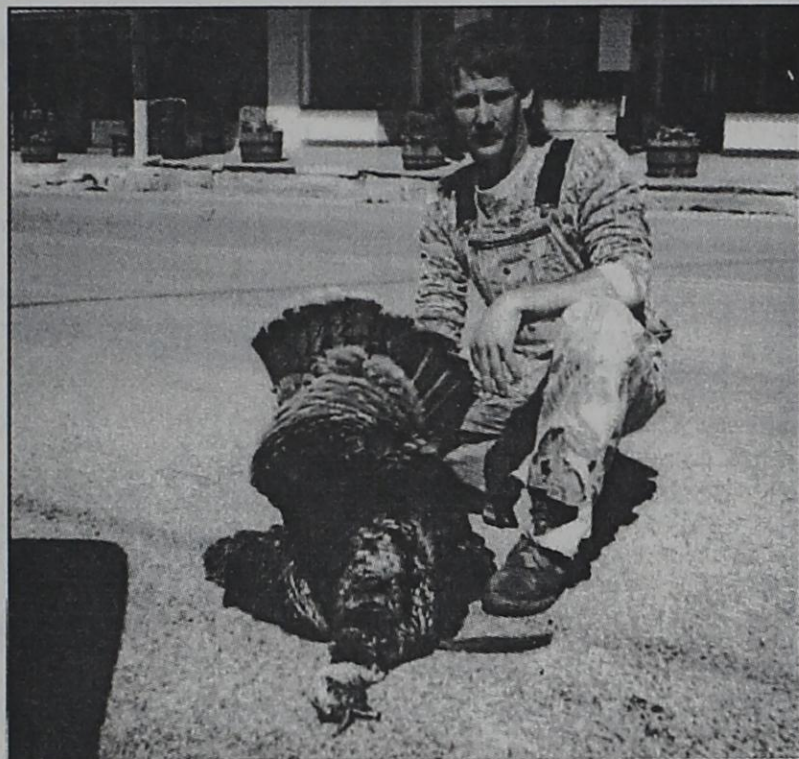


Rabies Clinic April 19th
