





But in thousands of cases the soldier does not get off so easily. He has something that he cannot simply file away with his memories: a painful reminder that he can

never escape from-not even for a moment, as long as he may live-of the price that is sometimes exacted of the man who serves his country in battle. That man is the disabled veteran: the man who took wounds that will not heal, who went back to the peace-time round wholly or partially handicapped and for whom

He cannot forget. His tragedy is that the rest of us unfortunately can. Too often there can never be a complete and final healing.



Korean Christians have begun rebuilding their churches, schools and hospitals. Many bring sacrificial offering. Helping the native Christian is an act toward World Peace.


